He was a man who believed in the great value of toil and sweat that went into study that led to an honest career. I don't know if this quote is original to him or if he coined it from elsewhere, but over the stage of the old High School, which was incorporated in the dedication section to Professor O'Neill in the new High School, was this quote: "WORK IS THE GREATEST GIFT OF GOD TO MANKIND".
