Our Lady of Holy Rosary

Have you called your mom yet? October is the month of the Holy Rosary, the tremendous means to “get back in touch with mom.”

According to tradition, the devotion to the Rosary was revealed to St. Dominic by the blessed Virgin. It is one the most highly indulgenced of all devotions and both a vocal and a mental prayer. Vocally, we recite the Our Father, Hail Mary, and Glory Be. Mentally, we meditate on the great mysteries of our Faith. The church urges all of us to offer her a crown of roses, i.e., the Rosary. The church wants us not so much to recall a distant victory but to discover Mary’s place in the mystery of salvation and to greet her by saying Hail Mary without ceasing. When Mary gave her consent to God at the annunciation, “she committed herself wholeheartedly to God’s saving will and, impeded by no sin, she devoted herself totally, as the handmaid of the Lord, to the person and work of her Son, under with Him, serving the mystery of the redemption by the grace of Almighty God” Praying the Rosary has many, many benefits. It’s a traditional prayer based on meditation. For Catholics looking for more contemplative modes of prayer, encourage the Rosary. The rosary can bring families together; gathering for just a few minutes after the dinner will change a family! But meeting to pray the rosary will also change groups in the parish. Bringing people together doesn’t have to involve rolling out a complicated program. Why not gather in front of an image of our lady on Saturday or Sunday pray the Rosary? The most beautiful thing about the rosary, to borrow from Saint Augustine, is that it is “ever ancient, ever new.” We can pray it over and over again, always discovering something new in the course of our prayer.

The gospel it is lesson for the week explains how Jesus accomplished his mission of saving mankind by becoming the “suffering servant.” *Whoever wishes to be great must be servant”*

Dear Parishioners, in addition to being the month of the rosary, October is Respect Life month. “It [a baby] is a human life, this human life must be respected, this principle is so clear!” says Pope Francis in a recent interview. “To those who cannot understand, “the pope continues, “I would ask this question: is it right to kill a human life to solve a problem?” in the year of saint Joseph, we can look to saint Joseph as the protector of the holy family, the defender of life!” Like St. Joseph, we are also called to care for those God has entrusted to us especially vulnerable mothers and children,” says Archbishop Naumann, chairman U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishop’s Committee to welcome and defend those vulnerable human lives, particularly mother and their children, entrusted to our car. To imitate Saint Joseph, we must put our trust in god. We must, like Saint Joseph did, respond to god’s call. Despite our own weaknesses, he will provide an abundance of his grace o sustain us: “with god all things are possible” (Mt.19:26).
