Crafted from the foundation beams of our Church, we continue to build up the reign of God with living stones. Jesus Christ is our true cornerstone.

Dear friends,

Appetites are good things. Our appetite for food and drink is a good thing and must be satisfied or our bodies will collapse through malnutrition. Our appetite for affection and acceptance is a good thing and must be satisfied or we disintegrate socially. The universal appetite for knowing where we are in the Big Picture of the universe is a good thing. What sort of work of art am I? How do I deserve eternal life?

All these appetites, bodily, social, and spiritual, need to be satisfied if we are to be fully human. Jesus Christ proclaims in today's Gospel that he is the satisfaction of our deepest human appetites.

Jesus says: "I am not like the manna which ordinarily perishes overnight. I am not like the manna of the ancient Jewish people given to them alone. I am the Bread from Heaven which gives life to the world."

"To the world," not to some tribe of human beings, but to the whole of creation, of course to every human being. And the life is nothing less than participation in Divine Life: eternal life.

There are hundreds upon hundreds of people and organizations claiming that they can satisfy our hungers and thirsts as human beings. You and I are challenged to take a stand (and a risk, because that is what faith is) and agree with the Gospel when it says that this itinerant Jewish preacher and healer is indeed "the Bread of God who comes down from heaven and gives life to the world."

Jesus Christ is the One, the only One, who can satisfy the real deep-down hunger which each one of us has, the hunger for life beyond the seeming extinction of death.

We Catholic Christians make another profound act of faith at our Mass today. The bread which is brought up at the Offertory: "fruit of the earth and work of human hands", after invoking the Holy Spirit and speaking the words of consecration, is no longer short-term food like the manna in the desert. It becomes for us the bread of life.

But, more than that, St Paul says in Romans that the whole of creation is yearning to share in the resurrection life of Christ in a way beyond our imagining. This Heavenly Bread which we receive in holy communion with Jesus is the effective start of the process of transformation of the whole cosmos.

American Catholic Writers

Catholics have made great contributions to American literature. Walker Percy, Flannery O'Connor, Alice McDermott, and Frank McCourt are just four examples. Catholic writers have also contributed to the large body of popular literature. William Peter Blatty, Anne Rice, and Fr. Andrew Greely.

Two Catholic writers of fiction who may be of interest are:

J. F. Powers. His first novel was *Morte d'Urban* (1962), which won the 1963 National Book Award for Fiction. The novel tells the story of Father Urban Roche, a member of a fictitious religious order named the Clementines. Fr. Urban has developed a reputation as a gifted public speaker but is sent by the superior to a remote retreat house in rural Minnesota.

Deacon Ron Hanson. He is known for writing westerns and at least one of his novels was the basis for a major film. *Mariette in Ecstasy* is his novel set in a cloister in New York in 1906. It examines the fine line between holiness and madness.

Both are powerful and entertaining works of fiction.
