Pastor's Letter
Notas del Pastor

Dear Parishioners and Friends of Ascension,

When the feast day of a saint falls on a Sunday, the Sunday celebration takes precedence and the saint's feast day gets bumped. Today is one of those days. Today, July 31st is the Feast of St. Ignatius of Loyola, a saint who is not spoken of nearly enough, the founder of the Jesuit Order.

Throughout much of the world, the Jesuits are best known for their colleges, universities, and high schools. But in a time when many are searching for greater meaning, another aspect of Jesuit life continues to attract wide interest. And that is the unique spirituality introduced nearly 500 years ago by St. Ignatius Loyola, founder of the Jesuits.

St. Ignatius was an aristocratic Spanish soldier who discerned his calling after suffering nearly fatal wounds on the battlefield. He established the Society of Jesus (The Jesuits) in 1540, instructing the early Jesuits — to go out and "find God in all things." That is the signature spirituality of the Jesuits.

Ignatian spirituality is grounded in the conviction that God is active in our world. As the great Jesuit paleontologist Pierre Teilhard de Chardin wrote: "God is not remote from us. He is at the point of my pen, my pick, my paintbrush, my needle — and my heart and my thoughts." The spiritual path laid out by Ignatius is a way of discerning God's presence in our everyday lives. And doing something about it.



The Jesuits have a handbook for this search. It is The Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius Loyola, composed by Ignatius himself before he was even a priest. These spiritual exercises are often described as Ignatius's greatest gift to the church. These exercises unfold a dynamic process of prayer, meditation, and self-awareness. The basic thrust is to make us more attentive to God's activity in our world, more responsive to what God is calling us to do.

One of the most popular Ignatian exercises is the Daily Examen. It's a spiritual self-review that involves prayerfully recollecting moments during the day and reflecting on how God was present at those times, followed by a decision to act in some way. The Examen is concrete: It focuses your mind on segments of time (no more than a day, preferably), and the feelings that stirred within you, at those specific moments. Finding God in all things is at the core of Ignatian Spirituality and is rooted in our growing awareness that God can be found in every one, in every place, and in everything. When we learn to pay more attention to God, we become more thankful and reverent, and through this we become more devoted to God, more deeply in love with our Creator.

One of the unique gifts Pope Francis has brought to the papacy is his Ignatian Spirituality. For Jesuits and for followers of Ignatian Spirituality, discernment plays a very important role. For St. Ignatius of Loyola, discernment "of spirit" is the attentive interpretation of the motions of the soul. These interior movements consist of thoughts, emotions, inclinations, desires, repulsions, and attractions. Discernment of spirits involves learning to be sensitive to these movements, reflecting on them and understanding where they come from and where they lead us. Discernment is always done in the presence of the Lord, looking at the signs, listening to the things that happen. It's probably safe to say that when Francis speaks on any given topic, he is not simply speaking 'off the cuff,' but rather he has 'discerned' a particular topic.

If you have a few extra minutes during these hot days, might I suggest that you read a little more on Ignatian Spirituality and the Ignatian Examen? Queridos Feligreses y Amigos de la Ascensión,

Cuando el día de fiesta de un santo cae en domingo, la celebración del domingo toma precedencia y la fiesta del santo es pospuesta. Hoy es uno de esos días. Hoy, 31 de julio, es la fiesta de San Ignacio de Loyola – un santo de quien no se habla lo suficiente – el fundador de la orden jesuita.

A través de la mayor parte del mundo, los jesuitas son mejor conocidos por sus universidades y escuelas secundarias. Pero en una época cuando muchos buscan un sentido mayor, otro aspecto de la vida jesuita continúa atrayendo gran interés. Y eso es la espiritualidad única demostrada hace casi 500 años por San Ignacio de Loyola, fundador de los jesuitas.

Continuado

San Ignacio era un soldado español aristócrata que percibió su vocación después de haber sufrido heridas casi mortales en el frente. Él estableció la Sociedad de Jesús (los jesuitas) en el 1540, instruyendo a los primeros jesuitas –a que salieran “a encontrar a Dios en todas las cosas.” Esa es la espiritualidad distintiva de los jesuitas.

La espiritualidad ignaciana tiene sus raíces en la convicción de que Dios está activo en nuestro mundo. Como el gran paleontólogo jesuita Pierre Teilhard de Chardin escribió, “Dios no está alejado de nosotros. Él está en la punta de mi bolígrafo, mi pico, mi pincel, mi aguja – y mi corazón y mis pensamientos.” El camino espiritual trazado por Ignacio es una manera de discernir la presencia de Dios en nuestras vidas diarias. Y tomando acción al respecto.

Los jesuitas tienen un manual para esta búsqueda. Es los Ejercicios Espirituales de San Ignacio de Loyola, compuesto por San Ignacio mismo antes de que fuera ni siquiera sacerdote. Estos ejercicios espirituales a menudo son descritos como el regalo más grande que Ignacio le ha dado a la iglesia. Estos ejercicios demuestran un proceso dinámico de oración, meditación y consciencia de sí mismo. El empuje básico es hacernos más atentos a la actividad de Dios en nuestro mundo, más sensibles a lo que Dios nos está llamando a hacer.

Uno de los ejercicios ignacianos más populares es el examen diario. Es un repaso espiritual de sí mismo que significa recordar en oración momentos durante el día y reflexionando cómo Dios estuvo presente en esos momentos, seguido por una decisión para actuar de alguna manera. El examen es concreto. Nos enfoca la mente en segmentos del tiempo (no más de un día, preferiblemente), y los sentimientos que nos conmovieron en esos momentos específicos. El encontrar a Dios en todas las cosas está en el centro del espiritualismo ignaciano y está arraigado en el aumento de consciencia de que Dios puede ser encontrado en cada persona, cada lugar y en todo. Cuando aprendemos a ponerle más atención a Dios, nos volvemos más agradecidos y reverentes y a través de esto nos hacemos más devotos a Dios, más enamorados de nuestro Creador.

Uno de los dones únicos que el Papa Francisco ha traído al papado es su espiritualidad ignaciana. Para los jesuitas y los seguidores de la espiritualidad ignaciana, el discernimiento juega un papel muy importante. Para San Ignacio de Loyola, el discernimiento “de espíritu” es la interpretación atenta de los movimientos del alma. Estos movimientos interiores consisten de pensamientos, emociones, inclinaciones, deseos, repulsiones y atracciones. Discernimiento de espíritu significa aprender a ser sensible a estos movimientos, reflexionando sobre ellos y comprendiendo de dónde vienen y a dónde nos llevan. El discernimiento se hace siempre en la presencia del Señor, viendo las señales, escuchando las cosas que ocurren. Probablemente se puede decir con seguridad que cuando Francisco habla sobre cualquier tema no está hablando improvisadamente, sino que ha sabido discernir un tema particular.

Si ustedes tienen unos minutos disponibles durante estas noches cálidas del verano, ¿me permiten sugerirles que lean un poquito más sobre la espiritualidad ignaciana y el examen ignaciano? 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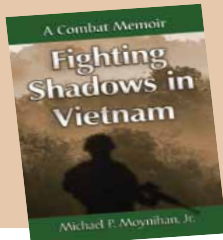


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In this memoir, set as deeply in his mind as in the Southeast Asian jungle, a young American soldier embarks on a journey to a war that, for him, will never be over.
