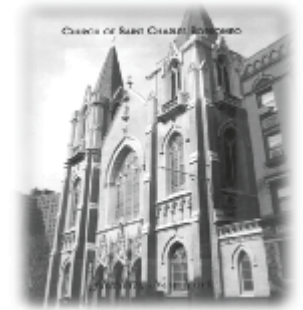

NOT KNOWING YET TRUSTING

Life can be challenging. We prioritize our time, treasures and talents in choosing and making daily decisions that affect us and others. It seems that these decisions are influenced in part by what we know and who or what we believe, therefore, KNOWLEDGE AND BELIEVE are important in decision making.

“Not Knowing” or “Not Knowing Enough” of things and people we encounter daily is part of life’s challenging experiences. We are not biologically nor spiritually equipped to know everything. Oftentimes we don’t know enough and “Not knowing” can be a CROSS and can create great anxiety. Imagine the anxiety of not knowing why you are feeling sick; not knowing if you will pass or fail an important exam; not knowing if you are choosing the right person for marriage; not knowing if you will survive a surgery; not knowing what is God’s plan for you; etc.

I didn’t know God’s plan for my future that I would be a priest. This year 2019 I celebrate my 25 years in the priesthood. I remember the many years of dialogue, debates and squabbles I had with my dad from age 10 about what is God’s plan for me. According to my Dad, God’s plan for me is to become a priest but I had other plans. By the time I finished 8th grade I convinced myself that I knew what I wanted to be in the future. Though I was in the minor seminary then, being a priest was not my desire or plan, but my dad was doing all he could to persuade me to stay in the seminary and become a priest.

As a freshman in major seminary (university level) my dialogue with my dad continued about God’s plan for me. And in the early part of my 2nd year I had the last discussion about my future with my dad before he died few months later. We were facing each other in the living room and he asked me, “Are you going to be a priest?” I answered him, “Dad I don’t know, if God wants me to be a priest I will be”. My father’s death put me in a confusion. Culturally, as the oldest son I am obligated to take charge of my father’s business and home. At that time, I was still desiring to pursue medical studies, but I was still in the seminary and now faced with business and family responsibilities: What is God’s plan for me?

Relatives and friends had much to advise me but mostly to leave the seminary. It was Christmas holidays and school will soon reopen. I didn’t know what plans God had for me and I didn’t know how to find out. One thing I did was to TRUST myself and what I was doing and to TRUST that God has a plan for me. I came to realize that not Knowing for sure about the future is okay and not to worry about it reduces unnecessary anxiety. When school reopened I went back to the seminary because I needed time to think and to figure out what God is saying to me personally. That decision to go back changed everything in me and for me. It was as if I fell in love with something that took away all my confusion, anxiety and worry. I remembered feeling contentment and unafraid of my future. As I reflect on my life and ministry, I appreciate more deeply that God figured out my future long before I was born, so my dad told me once, “son, you are not mine”. I asked him, “what do you mean?”, he said, “the reason I want you to be a priest is because I can’t claim you. I made a promise to God that if he gives me a son I will sacrifice him to God. So, you are not mine to claim”. I remember saying to him, “Dad that is your promise to God not mine”. How wrong I was. Do we need a promise to belong to God? Don’t we all belong to God who has a plan for creating us? The question is: Do I Trust myself and stay with the good that I am doing right now and do I trust God’s plan for my future? Remember “Not Knowing” the future is not the problem, rather “Believing” in him who makes the future is key to peace and contentment (John 20:29 “blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed.”). KEEP BELIEVING, HE’S WORKING IT OUT FOR YOU!!

## NO SABES AÚN CONFIANZA

La vida puede ser desafiante. Priorizamos nuestro tiempo, tesoros y talentos para elegir y tomar decisiones diarias que nos afectan a nosotros y a los demás. Parece que estas decisiones están influenciadas en parte por lo que sabemos y en quién o lo que creemos, por lo tanto, el CONOCIMIENTO Y CREER son importantes en la toma de decisiones.

"No saber" o "No saber lo suficiente" de las cosas y las personas con las que nos encontramos a diario es parte de las experiencias desafiantes de la vida. No estamos biológicamente ni espiritualmente equipados para saberlo todo. A menudo no sabemos lo suficiente y "No saber" puede ser una CRUZ y puede crear una gran ansiedad. Imagine la ansiedad de no saber por qué se siente enfermo; sin saber si aprobará o reprobará un examen importante; sin saber si está eligiendo a la persona adecuada para el matrimonio; sin saber si sobrevivirá a una cirugía; sin saber cuál es el plan de Dios para ti; etc.

No sabía el plan de Dios para mi futuro de ser sacerdote. Este año 2019 celebro mis 25 años en el sacerdocio. Recuerdo los muchos años de diálogo, debates y disputas que tuve con mi padre desde los 10 años sobre cuál es el plan de Dios para mí. Según mi papá, el plan de Dios para mí era ser sacerdote, pero yo tenía otros planes. Cuando terminé el octavo grado, me convencí de que sabía lo que quería ser en el futuro. Aunque estaba en el seminario menor entonces, ser sacerdote no era mi deseo o plan, pero mi padre estaba haciendo todo lo posible para convencerme de que me quedara en el seminario y me convirtiera en sacerdote.

Como estudiante de primer año en seminario mayor (nivel universitario), mi diálogo con mi padre continuó sobre el plan de Dios para mí. Y en la primera parte de mi segundo año tuve la última discusión sobre mi futuro con mi padre antes de que muriera unos meses después. Estábamos frente a frente en la sala de estar y él me preguntó: ¿Vas a ser sacerdote? Le respondí: "Papá, no sé, si Dios quiere que yo sea sacerdote, lo seré". La muerte de mi padre me puso en una confusión. Culturalmente, como hijo mayor, estoy obligado a hacerme cargo de los negocios y el hogar de mi padre. En ese momento, todavía deseaba seguir estudios médicos, pero aún estaba en el seminario y ahora me enfrentaba con responsabilidades comerciales y familiares: ¿Cuál es el plan de Dios para mí?

Los familiares y amigos tenían mucho que aconsejarme, pero principalmente para abandonar el seminario. Eran vacaciones de Navidad y la escuela pronto volverá a abrir. No sabía qué planes tenía Dios para mí y no sabía cómo averiguarlo. Una cosa que hice fue CONFIAR en mí mismo y lo que estaba haciendo y CONFIAR en que Dios tiene un plan para mí. Me di cuenta de que no saber con certeza el futuro está bien y no preocuparme por eso reduce la ansiedad innecesaria. Cuando reabrió la escuela, regresé al seminario porque necesitaba tiempo para pensar y entender lo que Dios me está diciendo personalmente. Esa decisión de regresar cambió todo en mí y para mí. Era como si me enamorara de algo que me quitó toda mi confusión, ansiedad y preocupación. Recordé sentirme contento y sin miedo de mi futuro. Mientras reflexiono sobre mi vida y ministerio, aprecio más profundamente que Dios descubrió mi futuro mucho antes de que yo naciera, así que mi padre me dijo una vez: "hijo, no eres mío". Le pregunté: "¿qué quieres decir?", Dijo, "la razón por la que quiero que seas sacerdote es porque no puedo reclamarlo". Le prometí a Dios que si me da un hijo, lo sacrificaré a Dios. Entonces, no eres mío para reclamarlo". Recuerdo haberle dicho: "Papá, esa es tu promesa a Dios, no la mía". Qué equivocado estaba. ¿Necesitamos una promesa de pertenecer a Dios? ¿No pertenecemos todos a Dios que tiene un plan para crearnos? La pregunta es: ¿Confío en mí mismo y me quedo con el bien que estoy haciendo ahora y confío en el plan de Dios para mi futuro? Recuerde "No saber" que el futuro no es el problema, más bien "Crear" en aquel que hace el futuro es clave para la paz y la satisfacción (Juan 20:29 "Bienaventurados los que no han visto y sin embargo han creído"). MANTENGANSE ! ¡CREYENDO, ÉL ESTÁ TRABAJANDO PARA TÚ FAVOR!
