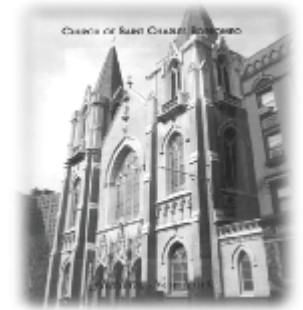

The Third Sunday of Lent: The Woman at the Jacob's Well

In my preaching during the first two Sundays of Lent I tried to draw for the Congregation the connection between the journey of Lent's Forty Days and our Christian experience of a religious RETREAT. Most of the members of our Parish have had some experience of a RETREAT, even if only from Catholic High School. The Forty Days that Jesus spent in the Desert after he was baptized was a RETREAT. All RETREATS have as their primary purpose: renewing our relationship with God. On the First Sunday of Lent I explained how our own temptations to sinfulness are usually a part of our experience of RETREATS because temptations have a strong effect on our relationship with God. On the Second Sunday of Lent I spoke of how much God desires to strengthen our relationship with Him because he loves us and has sent His Son as the source of salvation for us.

This Sunday we come face to face with the person of Jesus Christ. Our Lenten RETREAT is not simply about ideas, like sin and love and salvation. Our retreat is about building a personal relationship with God through his Son, Jesus Christ. This Sunday in our RETREAT we are invited to use the strength and power of our imagination to see Jesus at Jacob's well in Samaria. He is alone with one woman at the well. In our imagination we can see Jesus tired from his travels on a hot day. Yet in spite of his fatigue he reaches out to speak with a woman who is alone, and who is busy getting water for her own family. She is surprised that Jesus would speak with her, since she is of a different culture than Jesus' culture. But He asks her for a drink of water.

In our imagination we can feel the tension of this encounter. The woman is resisting, and Jesus continues requesting. He says to her, "if you knew who was asking you for water, you would ask Me to give you water instead." This causes the woman to get her back up against Jesus because to her He is no one special.

Then Jesus leads her into a conversation about the thirst for water. Would it not be good never to have to thirst again, Jesus asks? He shows the woman the ways in which the many different husbands in her life reveal a thirst which has yet to be satisfied. In our imagination we can see and we can feel that Jesus has disturbed the woman's composure. She is not just upset, she is exposed to herself and to Jesus.

The encounter between Jesus and the woman reveals an important truth about men and women, as well as an important truth about Jesus. Jesus offers Himself as a source of "living water" which can provide the satisfaction we are seeking.

In this excursion into Scripture it is not difficult, using our imagination, to see Jesus speaking to us about our thirsts and about His living water. Let us meditate on what that kind of encounter with Jesus may mean individually for each of us.

El tercer domingo de Cuaresma: la mujer en el pozo de Jacob

En mi predicación durante los primeros dos domingos de Cuaresma intenté dibujar para la Congregación la conexión entre el viaje de los Cuarenta días de Cuaresma y nuestra experiencia cristiana de un RETIRO religioso. La mayoría de los miembros de nuestra parroquia han tenido alguna experiencia de un RETIRO, aunque solo sea de Escuela secundaria católica. Los cuarenta días que Jesús pasó en el desierto después de ser bautizado fue un RETIRO. Todos los RETIROS tienen como su propósito principal: renovar nuestra relación con Dios. El primer domingo de Cuaresma, expliqué cómo nuestras propias tentaciones al pecado generalmente son parte de nuestra experiencia de RETIROS porque las tentaciones tienen un fuerte efecto en nuestra relación con Dios. El segundo domingo de Cuaresma hablé de cuánto desea Dios fortalecer nuestra relación con Él porque nos ama y ha enviado a Su Hijo como fuente de salvación para nosotros.

Este domingo nos encontramos cara a cara con la persona de Jesucristo. Nuestro RETIRO Cuaresmal no se trata simplemente de ideas, como el pecado, el amor y la salvación. Nuestro retiro se trata de construir una relación personal con Dios a través de su Hijo, Jesucristo. Este domingo en nuestro RETIRO estamos invitados a usar la fuerza y el poder de nuestra imaginación para ver a Jesús en el pozo de Jacob en Samaria. Está solo con una mujer en el pozo. En nuestra imaginación podemos ver a Jesús cansado de sus viajes en un día caluroso. Sin embargo, a pesar de su cansancio, se acerca para hablar con una mujer que está sola y que está ocupada buscando agua para su propia familia. Ella se sorprende de que Jesús hablara con ella, ya que ella es de una cultura diferente a la cultura de Jesús. Pero él le pide un trago de agua.

En nuestra imaginación podemos sentir la tensión de este encuentro. La mujer se resiste, y Jesús continúa solicitando. Él le dice: "si supieras quién te está pidiendo agua, me pedirías que te diera agua". Esto hace que la mujer se fuera en contra de Jesús porque para ella Él no es nadie especial.

Entonces Jesús nos lleva a una conversación sobre la sed de agua. ¿No sería bueno nunca tener sed otra vez, Jesús pregunta? Él le muestra a la mujer las formas en que los diferentes esposos en su vida revelan una sed que aún no se ha satisfecho. En nuestra imaginación podemos ver y podemos sentir que Jesús ha perturbado la compostura de la mujer. Ella no solo está molesta, está expuesta a sí misma y a Jesús.

El encuentro entre Jesús y la mujer revela una verdad importante sobre hombres y mujeres, así como una verdad importante sobre Jesús. Jesús se ofrece a sí mismo como una fuente de "agua viva" que puede proporcionar la satisfacción que estamos buscando.

En esta excursión a las Escrituras, no es difícil, usar nuestra imaginación, ver a Jesús que nos habla sobre nuestra sed y sobre Su agua viva. Meditemos sobre lo que ese tipo de encuentro con Jesús puede significar individualmente para cada uno de nosotros.
