Message from the Pastor

Fr. Gregory Chisholm, SJ

Our Faith Is Not on the Ballot in November

Catholics are unapologetic in our attitude toward life. Life is all that happens to us from conception to physical death and beyond. Our attitude about life reflects our scriptural understanding that our Savior and Lord, Jesus Christ, came “that we may have life and have it to the full” (John 10:16). We are for life or, it may be said, we are pro-life.

That doesn’t mean Christians belong to any particular political movement. Most American political movements are too broad in their ideas and too varied in their actions to be identified simply with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Neither can most American political movements be disregarded by faithful Christians as standing in opposition to the Gospel.

Political positions are not necessarily determined by what is right regarding our relationship with God or what is charitable regarding our neighbor or what is just in any circumstance. It may be closer to the truth to say that political positions are popular in that they reflect broad points of view that are simply popular with one group of persons or another. Political positions are expedient in that they also reflect what is achievable with one group or another. Political positions are variable in that they rise, and fall based on what worked for people yesterday, what works today or what will work tomorrow. Nevertheless, **political movements are not wrong**. They are important because political outcomes affect the wellbeing of citizens. We simply do not want to confuse political allegiance with our responsibility as Christians

Our Christian faith, on the other hand, is not popular, neither is it expedient and not variable. The prophet Micah wrote, “You have been told, O mortal, what is good, and what the Lord requires of you: Only to do justice and to love goodness, and to walk humbly with your God” (Micah 6:8) Our faith always struggles to focus on what is right or what is charitable or what is just. Christians support the life of unborn children and they defend those whose lives and livelihood are threatened by racism. Christians help the living who risk death due to poverty and hunger. Christians seek justice for those treated unfairly. Christians protect the vulnerable who are endangered by abuse. Christians provide lifelines to those drowning in alcohol and drugs. Christians even stand against state sanctioned executions. These, and many more examples, are ways that Christians are pro-life.

When we vote in November, we will use the understanding of our faith (informed conscience) and our understanding of the conditions affecting our lives to choose the best candidate we can. Yet we will not be so naïve as to believe that the candidate’s political position will reflect everything we believe as Christians. The responsibility of achieving the Christian goal of supporting life will always be ours, individually and collectively. Instead we choose a candidate whose political positions and political behavior comes closest to achieving wellbeing for all.

Message from the Pastor

Nuestra fe no está en la boleta electoral de noviembre

Los católicos no se disculpan en nuestra actitud hacia la vida. La vida es todo lo que nos pasa desde la concepción hasta la muerte física y más allá. Nuestra actitud acerca de la vida refleja nuestro entendimiento bíblico de que nuestro Salvador y Señor Jesucristo vino “para que tengamos vida y la tengamos en abundancia” (Juan 10:16). Estamos a favor de la vida o, se puede decir, pro-vida.

Eso no significa que los cristianos pertenezcan a ningún movimiento político en particular. La mayoría de los movimientos políticos estadounidenses son demasiado amplios en sus ideas y demasiado variados en sus acciones para ser identificados simplemente con el Evangelio de Jesucristo. Los cristianos fieles tampoco pueden hacer caso omiso de la mayoría de los movimientos políticos estadounidenses por oponerse al Evangelio.

Las posiciones políticas no están necesariamente determinadas por lo que es correcto con respecto a nuestra relación con Dios o lo que es caritativo con respecto a nuestro prójimo o lo que es justo en una circunstancia particular. Puede estar más cerca de la verdad decir que las posiciones políticas son populares porque reflejan puntos de vista amplios que simplemente son populares entre un grupo de personas u otro. Las posiciones políticas son convenientes porque también reflejan lo que se puede lograr con un grupo u otro. Las posiciones políticas son variables en el sentido de que suben y bajan según lo que funcionó para la gente ayer, lo que funciona hoy o lo que funcionará mañana. Sin embargo, los movimientos políticos no se equivocan. Son importantes porque los resultados políticos afectan el bienestar de los ciudadanos. Simplemente no queremos confundir la lealtad política con nuestra responsabilidad como cristianos.

Nuestra fe cristiana, por otro lado, no es popular, ni es conveniente ni variable. El profeta Miqueas escribió: "Se te ha dicho, oh mortal, lo que es bueno y lo que el Señor exige de ti: solo que hagas justicia y ames la bondad, y que andes humildemente con tu Dios" (Miqueas 6: 8). La fe siempre lucha por concentrarse en lo que es correcto o caritativo o justo. Los cristianos apoyan la vida de los niños no nacidos y defienden a aquellos cuyas vidas y medios de subsistencia están amenazados por el racismo. Los cristianos ayudan a los vivos que corren el riesgo de morir debido a la pobreza y el hambre. Los cristianos buscan justicia para quienes son tratados injustamente. Los cristianos protegen a los vulnerables que están en peligro por el abuso. Los cristianos brindan salvavidas a quienes se ahogan en el alcohol y las drogas. Los cristianos incluso se oponen a las ejecuciones autorizadas por el estado. Estos, y muchos más ejemplos, son formas en que los cristianos son pro-vida.

Cuando votemos en noviembre, usaremos la comprensión de nuestra fe (conciencia informada) y nuestra comprensión de las condiciones que afectan nuestras vidas para elegir al mejor candidato que podamos. Sin embargo, no seremos tan ingenuos como para creer que la posición política del candidato reflejará todo lo que creemos como cristianos. La responsabilidad de lograr el objetivo cristiano de sustentar la vida siempre será nuestra, individual y colectivamente. En su lugar, elegimos un candidato cuyas posiciones políticas y comportamiento político se acerquen más a lograr el bienestar para todos.

VOTERS REGISTRATION IMPORTANT INFORMATION

Registration Rules & Deadlines

New York

To register to vote, you must :Be a US citizen,
Be a resident of NY state for a minimum of 30 days before election day, Be 18 years old
Not be a prisoner or on parole for a felony
Not currently voting in another location
Not currently judged to be incompetent by a court

Please note: Governor Cuomo signed a bill that says New York residents can request an absentee ballot based on concerns for their health

New York

In person, you must register to vote 25 days (10/09/2020) before election day

By Mail: The registration application must be postmarked 25 days before election day and received 20 days (10/14/2020) before election day

Online -Registration: Application must be entered 25 days (10/09/2020) before election

New Jersey

To register to vote, you must: Be a US citizen
You must be a resident of New Jersey and at your address for at least 30 days before the next election
You must be 18 years old
Is not serving time on parole for a conviction in NJ or another state in the US
Must not be judged to be mentally incompetent by a court

New Jersey

In person you must register to vote 21 days (10/13/2020) before election day

By mail: The registration application must be postmarked 21 days (10/13/2020) before election day

Online : N/A

Connecticut

To register to vote, you must: Be a US citizen
Be a resident of Connecticut and reside in the town where you are voting
You must be 18 years old
You must have served your time and parole for a felony

Connecticut

In-person :apply 7 days (10/27/2020) before election day

By mail: The registration application must be postmarked 7 days (10/27/2020) before the election.

Online Registration: application must be entered 7 days (10/27/2020) before 11/03/2020



VOTERS REGISTRATION IMPORTANT INFORMATION

Absentee Ballot / Mail- In Ballot Rules & Deadlines

New York

You may vote by mail if : you are absent from your country or if you are a NYC resident, you are absent from New York on election day

You are ill, have a physical disability or because you are a primary caregiver of someone who is physically disabled

You are in jail awaiting action

You reside in VA facility as a patient or resident

You are in jail awaiting Grand Jury action or in prison, other than for a felony

New York

In person the absentee ballot must be received by 5PM -7 days before election day

By Mail: The absentee ballot must be received by 5PM 7 days (10/27/2020) before election day

Online: N/A

New Jersey

You may apply to vote by mail if you have registered to vote in NJ

In person -the absentee ballot must be received by 3:00PM the day before election day

By mail :7 days (10/27/2020) before election day

Online:N/A

Connecticut

You may vote by mail if you have an illness and cannot vote in person

You will be absent from your town during the voting hours

You are physically disabled and cannot vote in person

You are physically disabled and cannot vote in person

You are on active duty in the US military

Your religion forbids to be on duty as an election official during all voting hours and that site is not your voting location.

Must be received 1 day before election day
