### **Now Hiring: Emergency Snow Laborers for Winter Season**

Snow Laborers Crucial in Clearing Snow and Ice After Big Winter Storms;

New for this Season: Advance Online Registration Required

The New York City Department of Sanitation has announced that registration is now open for those interested in working as Emergency Snow Laborers for the upcoming winter season. Emergency Snow Laborers are per-diem workers who shovel snow and clear ice from bus stops, crosswalks, fire hydrants and step streets around the five boroughs after heavy snowfalls. Snow Laborers earn \$15 per hour to start, and \$22.50 per hour after 40 hours are worked in a week. To better allow for social distancing and COVID- related protocols, those interested in becoming a Snow Laborer must register for a 15-minute application at [nyc.gov/snow](http://nyc.gov/snow). To comply with COVID-related safety protocols, potential Snow Laborers should wear a mask or face covering while at the registration appointment. Applicants should not attend the appointment if they have any COVID-19 symptoms, if they recently traveled to a state with high rates of COVID-19 transmission, or if they recently had close contact with someone who has tested positive for COVID -19

## **Thanksgiving Day: 2020**

Thanksgiving Day. Has it ever been so needed in our lifetimes and yet so difficult to consider celebrating? We all do well to make the best Thanksgiving choices for ourselves and our family or friends in this particular year.

Since I am not a cook who anyone has turned to for talent or ideas, the most difficult aspect of Thanksgiving Day for me has been getting to the celebration on time. In College, whether going by train, plane or car, travelling home on the Wednesday before Thanksgiving was almost impossible. The roads and rails from Boston to New York were like a very extended and crowded parking lot. Even when I lived in California getting home to New York for Thanksgiving was more than a notion. It was awfully expensive and pretty uncomfortable to make the necessary connections for arriving on time.

Nevertheless, I rarely missed Thanksgiving with my family. The older I got; the more important Thanksgiving became for me. I appreciated that this annual event is purely a celebration of affection between those in attendance. There are no gifts to exchange. There are no special decorations. There is no specialized music and usually no snow. We come to Thanksgiving simply to share a meal with those we love. How good is that!!

In this particular year we have to balance the desire and need to express our affection for those we love with the absolute importance of keeping those we love safe. The truth about the coronavirus is that the disease is transmitted in conditions where groups of people are in close proximity with one another over an extended period of time. That, of course, is the very definition of Thanksgiving. An alternative to the needed, but unhelpful, extended family gathering might be a smaller and more limited gathering of persons who keep a distance from one another. This would be particularly helpful for family gatherings which include elder members or include family members who are recovering from illnesses. The choice is yours, but the effect of your choice affects those you love who will share Thanksgiving with you. God Bless You

### **Good News: Fr. George Okeahialam, MSP**

Following the sudden and unexpected departure of Fr. Anthony Iroh from our Parish, the Archdiocese of New York has assigned Fr. George Nnaemeka Okeahialam, MSP, as Parochial Vicar here. I am pleased that the Archdiocese acted so quickly in bringing another priest to help with ministries in the Church that require Clergy. He is most welcomed to this Parish and to our Rectory. May he be a great blessing for our Parish in the years to come. Still I hope that matters may soon be settled for the future priestly ministry of Fr. Anthony, either in Nigeria or here in the United States. Below is a short review of Fr. George's life which he wrote himself:

*Rev. George Nnaemeka Okeahialam, MSP is a priest of the Missionary Society of St. Paul. Fr. George was born in Nigeria on January 6, 1971. Fr. George grew up in the South Eastern part of Nigeria where he did his primary and secondary schools before joining the Missionary Society of St. Paul in 1989. Fr. George has six other siblings. His deceased parents were civil servants and educationists who instilled in them the values of integrity, diligence, education, service, and deep faith in God.*

*After his ordination in the Missionary Society of St. Paul in 2002, Fr. George was assigned as the Promotion Assistant in the Promotions Office in Nigeria. In 2003, he was appointed the Director of Mission Affairs Office in Nigeria. In 2006, Fr. George was assigned to work in the United States of America. He became the Parochial Vicar of Our Mother of Mercy and Our Lady Star of the Sea Catholic Churches in Houston, Texas. In 2008, Fr. George was appointed the Pastor of Sacred Heart Church in the Diocese of Beaumont, Texas and in 2010, he also became the pastor of Our Mother of Mercy Church, Liberty, Texas.*

*He held these two positions until his election as the Regional Superior of the Missionary Society of St. Paul American region in 2014. While serving as the Regional Superior of the Missionary Society of St. Paul for six years, Fr. George was also the Pastor of St. Nicholas Catholic Church, Chaplain of the Nigerian Catholic Charismatic, Assumption Catholic Cameroonian, and East African Catholic Communities, Houston, Texas.*

*Fr. George holds a Bachelor of Sacred Theology from the Pontifical Urban University, Rome, a certificate in Philosophy, Master of Professional Studies in Humanitarian Services Administration from the University of Connecticut, and a PhD degree in Organizational Development and Leadership from Ashford University. Being a priest is simply being in the service of others. That was my inspiration to become a priest and it continues to be my driving force. Particularly, as a missionary priest, I derive great joy ministering to God's people and being present to those in need. I love traveling, sports, meeting new people, serving the community, and dancing.*

Como no soy un cocinero a la que alguien haya recurrido en busca de talento o ideas, el aspecto más difícil del Día de Acción de Gracias para mí ha sido llevar la celebración a tiempo. ### **Buenas noticias: P. George Okeahialam, MSP**

Tras la repentina e inesperada partida del P. Anthony Iroh de nuestra parroquia, la Arquidiócesis de Nueva York ha asignado al P. George Nnaemeka Okeahialam, MSP, como vicario parroquial aquí. Me complace que la Arquidiócesis haya actuado tan rápidamente al traer a otro sacerdote para ayudar con los ministerios de la Iglesia que requieren Clero. Es muy bienvenido en esta parroquia y en nuestra rectoría. Que sea una gran bendición para nuestra parroquia en los años venideros. Aún así, espero que pronto se resuelvan los asuntos para el futuro ministerio sacerdotal del P. Anthony, ya sea en Nigeria o aquí en los Estados Unidos. A continuación se muestra una breve reseña del P. La vida de George que él mismo escribió:

El Rev. George Nnaemeka Okeahialam, MSP es sacerdote de la Sociedad Misionera de San Pablo P. George nació en Nigeria el 6 de enero de 1971. El P. George creció en la parte sureste de Nigeria, donde hizo sus escuelas primarias y secundarias antes de unirse a la Sociedad Misionera de San Pablo en 1989. El P. George tiene otros seis hermanos. Sus padres fallecidos eran funcionarios y educadores que les inculcaron los valores de integridad, diligencia, educación, servicio y una fe profunda en Dios.

Después de su ordenación en la Sociedad Misionera de San Pablo en 2002, el P. George fue asignado como Asistente de Promoción en la Oficina de Promociones en Nigeria. En 2003, fue nombrado Director de la Oficina de Asuntos de la Misión en Nigeria. En 2006, el P. George fue asignado a trabajar en los Estados Unidos de América. Se convirtió en el Vicario Parroquial de las Iglesias Católicas Nuestra Señora de la Misericordia y Nuestra Señora Estrella del Mar en Houston, Texas. En 2008, el P. George fue nombrado pastor de la Iglesia del Sagrado Corazón en la Diócesis de Beaumont, Texas y en 2010, también se convirtió en el pastor de la Iglesia Nuestra Madre de la Misericordia, Liberty, Texas.

Ocupó estos dos cargos hasta su elección como Superior Regional de la Sociedad Misionera de la región americana de St. Paul en 2014. Mientras se desempeñaba como Superior Regional de la Sociedad Misionera de St. Paul durante seis años, el P. George también fue pastor de la Iglesia católica de San Nicolás, capellán de las comunidades carismáticas católica nigeriana, camerunesa católica de la Asunción y católica de África Oriental, Houston, Texas.

P. George tiene una licenciatura en Teología Sagrada de la Pontificia Universidad Urbana de Roma, un certificado en Filosofía, una Maestría en Estudios Profesionales en Administración de Servicios Humanitarios de la Universidad de Connecticut y un doctorado en Desarrollo Organizacional y Liderazgo de la Universidad de Ashford. Ser sacerdote es simplemente estar al servicio de los demás. Esa fue mi inspiración para convertirme en sacerdote y sigue siendo mi fuerza motriz. En particular, como sacerdote misionero, siento gran gozo al ministrar al pueblo de Dios y estar presente para los necesitados. Me encanta viajar, hacer deporte, conocer gente nueva, servir a la comunidad y bailar.
