# TRIUMPH: Transforming your Mental Health through Prayer and Healing



If you or someone you know is struggling with **stress, anxiety, or loss**, we invite you to contact us about the [TRIUMPH research study](#) at Columbia University Irving Medical Center.

We are working with **Black Churches** in New York City to identify community members who are at risk of experiencing depression. **Community Health Workers** from each church will conduct a screening survey that lasts about 15 minutes to assess your eligibility for the study. Adults ages **18 and older** who live in the 5 boroughs of NYC are eligible to participate.

This study is being led by Drs. Sidney Hankerson and Olajide Williams from the Columbia University Irving Medical Center. All study activities are being conducted **virtually through Zoom or telephone.**

Participants that are enrolled in the study are eligible to receive a Target Gift Card.

### **BULLETIN MESSAGE: FIFTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME**

Last weekend, we celebrated our Declaration of Independence. Families, friends, communities, churches, and the nation gathered to thank God for the blessings they have received. They also prayed for the country's freedoms that are still in peril. The celebration of our Independence will continue to be a call for us to proclaim the good news of freedom, justice, fairness, equity, and reaching out to the poor, the weak, and those marginalized on account of race, religion, or color. This is what we saw in the first reading of today from the Book of Amos 7:12-15. Though Amos was a country boy, a shepherd, and a pruner of sycamore trees; a nobody chosen by God to prophecy to the nation of Israel (Am 7:14ff), Amos did not look down on those God sent him to prophecy to. He prophesied in humility but with courage.

The same pattern is continued in the second reading and the Gospel of today. Jesus is the same today as yesterday (Heb 13:8). He continues to insist on choosing "the world's lowborn and despised, those who count for nothing, to reduce to nothing those who were something; so that mankind can do no boasting before God" (1 Cor 1:28-29). When Jesus sends us forth in weakness, His power reaches perfection (2 Cor 12:9). Jesus promised that the lowly will inherit the earth (Mt 5:5). Will you agree to become lowly? Let us allow the Lord to work through us like He did with Amos.

We welcome again Fr. Tim Wiggins to the Parish of St. Charles Borromeo, Resurrection, and All Saints. Fr. Tim celebrated the mass at St. Charles last weekend and was warmly ushered in by Fr. Greg Chisholm, S.J. Let us keep Fr. Tim Wiggins in our prayers that the Lord Jesus will make him a channel of His healing power and merciful love, so that our community of faith may find abundant life and freedom in the Lord. We extend our thanks and gratitude to Fr. Greg Chisholm, S.J for his pastoral leadership of the parish for these many years and we pray for God's abundant blessings in his new assignment.

The Parish has lost some persons close to the community; Lloyd Garner passed away this week. He is the brother of Deborah Garner who is currently our Parish Pastoral Council president. Sr. Jane Norton, SBS who died last week. She worked as Pastoral Associate for the Parish and lived at the Rectory at Resurrection. And Sr. Maria Goretti Mannix, FHM, a member of the Franciscan Handmaids of Mary, a largely Black Order of Religious Sister who came to Harlem in service of the Church in the early 1920's. She taught Mathematics at Cathedral High School for Girls and worked closely with the community. Let us keep these our faithful ones in prayers for eternal repose.

The Delta Variant of Covid-19 was declared a "variant of concern" by the World Health Organization in May. It also made clear that this variant is more transmissible, and causes more severe illness. Therefore, we continue to appeal to all parishioners to be cautious of this strain and to get vaccinated to protect themselves and others.

### **MENSAJE BOLETÍN: DÉCIMO QUINTO DOMINGO DEL TIEMPO ORDINARIO**

El fin de semana pasado celebramos nuestra Declaración de Independencia. Familias, amigos, comunidades, iglesias y la nación se reunieron para agradecer a Dios por las bendiciones que habían recibido. También rezaron por las libertades del país que aún están en peligro. La celebración de nuestra Independencia seguirá siendo un llamado para que proclamemos las buenas nuevas de libertad, justicia, rectitud, equidad y alcance a los pobres, los débiles y los marginados por motivos de raza, religión o color. Esto es lo que vimos en la primera lectura de hoy del Libro de Amós 7: 12-15. Aunque Amos era un muchacho de campo, pastor y podador de sicomoros; un don nadie elegido por Dios para profetizar a la nación de Israel (Am 7: 14ff), Amós no menospreció a aquellos a quienes Dios le envió a profetizar. Profetizó con humildad pero con valentía.

El mismo patrón se continúa en la segunda lectura y el Evangelio de hoy. Jesús es el mismo hoy como ayer (Hebreos 13:8). Sigue insistiendo en elegir “a los humildes y despreciados del mundo, los que no cuentan para nada, para reducir a la nada a los que eran algo; para que los hombres no puedan jactarse ante Dios”(1 Cor 1, 28-29). Cuando Jesús nos envía en debilidad, Su poder alcanza la perfección (2 Corintios 12: 9). Jesús prometió que los humildes heredarán la tierra (Mt 5:5). ¿Estarás de acuerdo en volverte humilde? Dejemos que el Señor trabaje a través de nosotros como lo hizo con Amós.

Damos la bienvenida nuevamente al P. Tim Wiggins a la Parroquia de San Carlos Borromeo, Resurrección y Todos los Santos. P. Tim celebró la misa en St. Charles el fin de semana pasado y fue recibido calurosamente por el P. Greg Chisholm, S.J. Mantengamos al P. Tim Wiggins en nuestras oraciones para que el Señor Jesús lo convierta en un canal de Su poder sanador y amor misericordioso, para que nuestra comunidad de fe pueda encontrar vida abundante y libertad en el Señor. Extendemos nuestro agradecimiento y gratitud al P. Greg Chisholm, S.J por su liderazgo pastoral de la parroquia durante estos muchos años y oramos a Dios por Su abundantes bendiciones en su nueva asignación.

La Parroquia ha perdido a algunas personas cercanas a la comunidad; Lloyd Garner falleció esta semana. El cual es hermano de Deborah Garner, quien actualmente es nuestra presidenta del Consejo Pastoral Parroquial. Hna. Jane Norton, SBS que murió la semana pasada. Trabajó como Asociada Pastoral de la Parroquia y vivió en la Rectoría en Resurrección. Y la Hna. Maria Goretti Mannix, FHM, miembro de las Esclavas Franciscanas de María, una orden mayoritariamente de Hermanas Religiosas Negras que llegó a Harlem al servicio de la Iglesia a principios de la década de 1920. Enseñó matemáticas en la escuela secundaria Cathedral para niñas y trabajó en estrecha colaboración con la comunidad. Mantengamos a estos nuestros fieles en oraciones por el reposo eterno.

La variante Delta de Covid-19 fue declarada una "variante preocupante" por la Organización Mundial de la Salud en mayo. También dejó en claro que esta variante es más transmisible y causa una enfermedad más grave. Por lo tanto, seguimos haciendo un llamamiento a todos los feligreses para que tengan cuidado con esta cepa y se vacunen para protegerse a sí mismos y a los demás.
