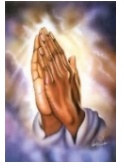

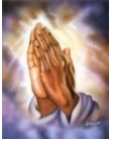

### **~ EIGHTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME ~**

Last week, our readings centered on the need for us to share our bread, treasure, blessings, and gifts with one another. The readings emphasized that God always multiplies whatever we share with one another, He increases our generosity and blesses our efforts. The readings of today are very similar to that of last week, except that Jesus laid emphasizes on the fact that we should look for the Bread of eternal life, the Bread of Heaven which produces spiritual life in us. Jesus makes the claim which only God can make I am the bread of life. The bread which Jesus offers is none else than the very life of God. This is the true bread which can truly satisfy the hunger in our hearts. The manna which the Lord sends from heaven in the first reading from Exodus 12:2-4, 12-15 prefigured the superabundance of the unique bread of the Eucharist or Lord's supper which Jesus gave to his disciples on the eve of his sacrifice. The manna in the wilderness sustained the Israelites on their journey to the promised land, but it could not produce eternal life for the Israelites.

The message for us today centered on only Jesus can satisfy our deepest hunger for everlasting truth, life and love'. Jesus' question to the crowd, and to each of us today, echoes the words of the prophet Isaiah: "why do you spend your money for that which is not bread, and your labor for that which does not satisfy" (Isaiah 55:2). There are two fundamental types of hunger – physical and spiritual. Only the Lord Jesus can satisfy the hunger in our heart – the hunger for everlasting truth, life, and love. Jesus alone can satisfy our hunger for truth because in Him alone is the truth which is found in God. Jesus alone can satisfy our hunger for life because He alone can give us abundant life, the supernatural life of God which transforms us now and lasts forever. Jesus alone can satisfy our deepest hunger for love – the love of God that knows no end, that never fails nor forsake us, that outlasts sin and death. Jesus alone can satisfy the eternal hunger of our heart, mind, and spirit. As St. Paul encourages us in the second reading to put aside our old self and put on the new, let us always seek Jesus who alone can satisfy our deepest hungers of life. When we seek and find Jesus, our old self is taken away and our new self is put on through the renewal of our minds and our hearts, so that, we can live as Children of God, and as sons and daughters of heaven.

Let us continue to be mindful of the increase of the Delta Variant of Covid-19 in our cities. The Delta Variant of Covid-19 was declared a "variant of concern" by the World Health Organization in May. It also made clear that this variant is more transmissible and causes more severe illness. Therefore, we continue to appeal to all parishioners to be cautious of this strain and to get vaccinated to protect themselves and others. Remember to keep our deceased parishioners and their families in your prayers this week.

La semana pasada, nuestras lecturas se centraron en la necesidad de compartir nuestro pan, tesoro, bendiciones y dones entre nosotros. Las lecturas enfatizaron que Dios siempre multiplica todo lo que compartimos, aumenta nuestra generosidad y bendice nuestros esfuerzos. Las lecturas de hoy son muy similares a las de la semana pasada, excepto que Jesús enfatizó el hecho de que debemos buscar el Pan de vida eterna, el Pan del Cielo que produce vida espiritual en nosotros. Jesús hace la afirmación que solo Dios puede hacer: yo soy el pan de vida. El pan que ofrece Jesús no es otro que la vida misma de Dios. Este es el verdadero pan que verdaderamente puede satisfacer el hambre de nuestro corazón. El maná que el Señor envía del cielo en la primera lectura de Éxodo 12, 2-4, 12-15 prefigura la sobreabundancia del pan único de la Eucaristía o Cena del Señor que Jesús dio a sus discípulos en la víspera de su sacrificio. El maná en el desierto sostuvo a los israelitas en su viaje a la tierra prometida, pero no pudo producir la vida eterna para los israelitas.

El mensaje para nosotros hoy se centró en "solo Jesús puede satisfacer nuestra más profunda hambre de verdad, vida y amor eternos". La pregunta de Jesús a la multitud, y a cada uno de nosotros hoy, se hace eco de las palabras del profeta Isaías: "¿Por qué gastan su dinero en lo que no es pan, y su trabajo en lo que no satisface?" (Isaías 55: 2). Hay dos tipos fundamentales de hambre: física y espiritual. Solo el Señor Jesús puede satisfacer el hambre de nuestro corazón: el hambre de la verdad, la vida y el amor eternos. Solo Jesús puede satisfacer nuestra hambre de verdad porque solo en Él está la verdad que se encuentra en Dios. Solo Jesús puede satisfacer nuestra hambre de vida porque solo Él puede darnos vida abundante, la vida sobrenatural de Dios que nos transforma ahora y perdura para siempre. Solo Jesús puede satisfacer nuestra más profunda hambre de amor: el amor de Dios que no tiene fin, que nunca falla ni nos abandona, que dura más que el pecado y la muerte. Solo Jesús puede satisfacer el hambre eterna de nuestro corazón, mente y espíritu. Como San Pablo nos anima en la segunda lectura a dejar a un lado nuestro viejo yo y vestirnos del nuevo, busquemos siempre a Jesús, quien es el único que puede satisfacer nuestras más profundas ansias de vida. Cuando buscamos y encontramos a Jesús, nuestro viejo yo se quita y nuestro nuevo yo se reviste a través de la renovación de nuestra mente y nuestro corazón, para que podamos vivir como Hijos de Dios y como hijos e hijas del cielo.

Sigamos siendo conscientes del aumento de la Variante Delta de Covid-19 en nuestras ciudades. La variante Delta de Covid-19 fue declarada una "variante preocupante" por la Organización Mundial de la Salud en mayo. También dejó en claro que esta variante es más transmisible y causa una enfermedad más grave. Por lo tanto, seguimos haciendo un llamamiento a todos los feligreses para que sean cautelosos con esta cepa y se vacunen para protegerse a sí mismos y a los demás. Recuerde mantener a nuestros feligreses fallecidos y sus familias en sus oraciones esta semana.
