It is with sadness that the Diocese of Brooklyn announces the passing of the Most Reverend Guy A. Sansaricq (Sansuh-reek), retired Auxiliary Bishop. Bishop Sansaricq died on Saturday, August 21, 2021.

Bishop Sansaricq was the first Haitian American Bishop in the United States, and a symbol of the progress of the Haitian people here and, as someone who served as a bishop, gave the Haitian community some recognition and stature as immigrant people, a ministry he served very well.

~ Twenty- Second Sunday in Ordinary Time ~

It is very common to see the leaders of the people of Israel fervently calling on the people to worship the true God and Him alone. In the first reading of last Sunday, Joshua had asked the tribes of Israel to decide which god they will serve. But for him and his household they will serve the living God. That call made the tribes of Israel to opt for the worship of the true God. Similarly, in our first reading today, Moses in preparation to reveal the commandments of God, calls on the people to observe God's word carefully and faithfully. Moses emphasized to the people of Israel that carefully and faithfully observing the Word of God would make them an intelligent nation filled with wisdom from above. Psalm 119:105 declares, "Your word is a lamp to my feet and light to unto my path".

The second reading from James 1:17-18 continues to ask us to welcome God's word and put it into action. James uses these verses to explain three important things about God: First, God is the giver of every good and perfect gift. In other words, nothing evil or imperfect can be ascribed to God. Second, James calls God the 'Father of Lights.' This reference is to God's role in creation. He is the creator of all the sun, moon, and stars. While James reveals God as powerful in His ability to create and control, he also reveals God's goodness. Third, James describes God as unchangeable. As humans, our perspective of the lights (sun, moon, and stars) is the constant change. But in God, no darkness can be found, and we can trust that God does not change. If God does not change, then we can trust that His giving of all things good also does not change.

In the gospel, Jesus warns the scribes and Pharisees that they confuse human tradition with God's commands. Jesus puts this question to all of us today; which is more important to God – clean hands or a clean mind and heart? God certainly desires a clean mind and heart from us. This is why it is important for us to take care of our mind and heart. Jesus informed the Scribes and Pharisees that the source of true defilement is evil desires which come from inside a person's innermost being. Sin does not just happen. It first springs from the innermost recesses of our thoughts and intentions, from the secret desires which only the individual soul can conceive. So, let us always strive to maintain a clean mind and heart. God in his mercy sent his Son Jesus Christ to free us from our sinful cravings and burden of guilt, and to restore us to wholeness of life and goodness. May we always seek his mercy and healing, amen.

Let us continue to be mindful of the increase of the Delta Variant of Covid-19 in our cities. The Delta Variant of Covid-19 was declared a "variant of concern" by the World Health Organization in May. It also made clear that this variant is more transmissible and causes more severe illness. Therefore, we continue to appeal to all parishioners to be cautious of this strain and to get vaccinated to protect themselves and others. Remember to keep our military men and women in your prayers this season. Remember also to keep some of our parish families who are going through the challenges of faith in your prayers.

~ VIGÉSIMO - SEGUNDO DOMINGO EN EL TIEMPO ORDINARIO ~

Es muy común ver a los líderes del pueblo de Israel llamando fervientemente al pueblo a adorar al Dios verdadero y solamente a Él. En la primera lectura del domingo pasado, Josué había pedido a las tribus de Israel que decidieran a qué dios servirían. Pero para él y su casa servirán al Dios viviente. Ese llamado hizo que las tribus de Israel optaran por la adoración del Dios verdadero. De manera similar, en nuestra primera lectura de hoy, Moisés, en preparación para revelar los mandamientos de Dios, pide al pueblo que observe la palabra de Dios con cuidado y fidelidad. Moisés enfatizó al pueblo de Israel que la observación cuidadosa y fiel de la Palabra de Dios los convertiría en una nación inteligente llena de sabiduría de lo alto. El Salmo 119: 105 declara: “Lámpara es a mis pies tu palabra, y lumbrera a mi camino”.

La segunda lectura de Santiago 1: 17-18 continúa pidiéndonos que acojamos la palabra de Dios y la pongamos en práctica. Santiago usa estos versículos para explicar tres cosas importantes acerca de Dios: Primero, Dios es el dador de todo don bueno y perfecto. En otras palabras, no se le puede atribuir a Dios nada malo o imperfecto. En segundo lugar, Santiago llama a Dios el 'Padre de las luces'. Esta referencia es al papel de Dios en la creación. Él es el creador de todo el sol, la luna y las estrellas. Si bien Santiago revela a Dios como poderoso en su capacidad de crear y controlar, también revela la bondad de Dios. Tercero, Santiago describe a Dios como inmutable. Como humanos, nuestra perspectiva de las luces (sol, luna y estrellas) es el cambio constante. Pero en Dios no se pueden encontrar tinieblas y podemos confiar en que Dios no cambia. Si Dios no cambia, entonces podemos confiar en que Su dar de todas las cosas buenas tampoco cambiará.

En el evangelio, Jesús advierte a los escribas y fariseos que confunden la tradición humana con los mandamientos de Dios. Jesús nos hace esta pregunta a todos hoy; ¿Qué es más importante para Dios: manos limpias o mente y corazón limpios? Dios ciertamente desea que tengamos una mente y un corazón limpios. Por eso es importante que cuidemos nuestra mente y nuestro corazón. Jesús informó a los escribas y fariseos que la fuente de la verdadera contaminación son los malos deseos que provienen del interior del ser más íntimo de una persona. El pecado no ocurre simplemente. Primero surge de lo más recóndito de nuestros pensamientos e intenciones, de los deseos secretos que sólo el alma individual puede concebir. Por lo tanto, esforcémonos siempre por mantener la mente y el corazón limpios. Dios, en su misericordia, envió a su Hijo Jesucristo para liberarnos de nuestros antojos pecaminosos y la carga de la culpa, y para restaurarnos a la plenitud de vida y bondad. Que siempre busquemos su misericordia y sanidad, amén.

Sigamos siendo conscientes del aumento de la Variante Delta de Covid-19 en nuestras ciudades. La variante Delta de Covid-19 fue declarada una "variante preocupante" por la Organización Mundial de la Salud en mayo. También dejó en claro que esta variante es más transmisible y causa una enfermedad más grave. Por lo tanto, seguimos haciendo un llamamiento a todos los feligreses para que sean cautelosos con esta cepa y se vacunen para protegerse a sí mismos y a los demás. Recuerde mantener a nuestros hombres y mujeres militares en sus oraciones esta temporada. Recuerde también mantener en sus oraciones a algunas de nuestras familias parroquiales que están pasando por los desafíos de la fe.
