At St. Charles Borromeo and Resurrection all are welcome at Mass. However, if you are elderly and have not been vaccinated against the Coronavirus, it is better for the unvaccinated elders to stay at home. If you are sick and have a fever, you are also encouraged to stay home, whether you are vaccinated or not. If you have an underlying health condition, like respiratory disease or heart disease or a compromised immune system or type 1 or type 2 diabetes, AND are not vaccinated, you should stay at home. Evidence suggests that this is for your own safety.

The Vatican has recently released the English text of Pope Francis' appeal for all people of goodwill to take any COVID-19 vaccine "authorized by the competent authorities." Our Parish, in conjunction with the archdiocese will support His Holiness appeal by arranging for a NYC van to be stationed in front of St. Charles and Resurrection churches in the near future.



~ REFLECTION FOR THE TWENTY-THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME ~

In the first reading from the Book of Isaiah 33:4-5, Isaiah prophesied that the blind shall see, the deaf will hear, and the dumb shall sing for joy. This prophesy was fulfilled in the gospel passage of Mark 7:31-37 today. When Jesus approaches a man who is both deaf and a stutterer, Jesus shows his considerateness for this man's predicament. Jesus takes him aside privately, no doubt to remove him from embarrassment with a noisy crowd of onlookers. Jesus then puts his fingers into the deaf man's ears, and he touches the man's tongue with his own spittle to physically identify with his infirmity and to awaken faith in him. With a word of command, the poor man's ears were opened, his tongue was released, and he spoke plainly.

What is the significance of Jesus putting his fingers into the man's ears? Gregory the Great, a Church father from the 6th century, comments on this miracle: "The Spirit is called the finger of God. When the Lord puts his fingers into the ears of the deaf mute, he was opening the soul of man to faith through the gifts of the Holy Spirit." It means that the Lord's touch awakens faith and brings healing. It means that Our Lord Jesus is a transformative God, he is capable of bringing life to the wasteland and giving hope to people who appeared abandoned.

The people's response to this miracle testifies to Jesus' great care for others: He has done all things well. No problem or burden was too much for Jesus' careful consideration. The Lord treats each of us with kindness and compassion and he calls us to treat one another in like manner. The Holy Spirit who dwells within us enables us to love as Jesus loves. Dear brothers and sisters, the miracle of Jesus today is teaching us to show kindness and compassion to our neighbors, brothers and sisters. It teaches us to treat our fellow men and women with considerateness as Jesus did. It reminds us that we all have needs in one way or another, and if we show compassion to the needs of those around us, the world would be a better place for us. It is my prayer for us this week that the Lord Jesus will fill us with the Holy Spirit and inflame our hearts with love and compassion. Make us attentive to the needs of others that we may show them kindness and care. Lord, make us an instrument of your mercy and peace that we may help others find healing and wholeness in you, amen!

~ REFLEXIÓN DEL VIGÉSIMO TERCER DOMINGO DEL TIEMPO ORDINARIO ~

En la primera lectura del libro de Isaías 33: 4-5, Isaías profetizó que los ciegos verán, los sordos oirán y los mudos cantarán de gozo. Esta profecía se cumplió en el pasaje del evangelio de Marcos 7: 31-37 de hoy. Cuando Jesús se acerca a un hombre que es sordo y tartamudo, Jesús muestra su consideración por la situación de este hombre. Jesús lo lleva a un lado en privado, sin duda para alejarlo de toda la vergüenza con una multitud ruidosa de espectadores. Jesús luego pone sus dedos en los oídos del sordo y toca la lengua del hombre con su propia saliva para identificarse físicamente con su enfermedad y despertar la Fe en él. Con una palabra de mando se le abrieron los oídos al pobre hombre, se le soltó la lengua y habló con claridad.

¿Cuál es el significado de que Jesús ponga sus dedos en los oídos del hombre? Gregorio el Grande, un padre de la Iglesia del siglo VI, comenta este milagro: “El Espíritu es llamado dedo de Dios. Cuando el Señor pone sus dedos en los oídos del sordomudo, estaba abriendo el alma del hombre a la fe a través de los dones del Espíritu Santo”. Significa que el toque del Señor despierta la fe y trae curación consigo. Significa que Nuestro Señor Jesús es un Dios transformador, es capaz de traer vida al páramo y dar esperanza a las personas que parecían abandonadas.

La respuesta de la gente a este milagro atestigua el gran cuidado de Jesús por los demás: lo ha hecho todo bien. Ningún problema o carga fue demasiado para la cuidadosa consideración de Jesús. El Señor nos trata a cada uno de nosotros con bondad y compasión y nos llama a tratarnos unos a otros de la misma manera. El Espíritu Santo que habita en nosotros nos capacita para amar como Jesús ama. Queridos hermanos y hermanas, el milagro de Jesús hoy nos está enseñando a mostrar bondad y compasión a nuestro prójimo, hermanos y hermanas. Nos enseña a tratar a nuestros semejantes con consideración como lo hizo Jesús. Nos recuerda que todos tenemos necesidades de una forma u otra, y si mostramos compasión por las necesidades de quienes nos rodean, el mundo sería un mejor lugar para nosotros.

Es mi oración para nosotros esta semana que el Señor Jesús nos llene con el Espíritu Santo y inflame nuestros corazones con el amor y la compasión. Haz que estemos atentos a las necesidades de los demás para que podamos mostrarles bondad y cuidado. Señor, haznos un instrumento de Tu misericordia y paz para que podamos ayudar a otros a encontrar sanación y plenitud en ti, ¡amén!
