At St. Charles Borromeo and Resurrection all are welcome at Mass. However, if you are elderly and have not been vaccinated against the Coronavirus, it is better for the unvaccinated elders to stay at home. If you are sick and have a fever, you are also encouraged to stay home, whether you are vaccinated or not. If you have an underlying health condition, like respiratory disease or heart disease or a compromised immune system or type 1 or type 2 diabetes, AND are not vaccinated, you should stay at home. Evidence suggests that this is for your own safety.

The Vatican has recently released the English text of Pope Francis' appeal for all people of goodwill to take any COVID-19 vaccine "authorized by the competent authorities." The global Covid-19 pandemic has affected all of us. Our Parish, in conjunction with the archdiocese will support His Holiness appeal by arranging for a NYC van to be stationed in front of St. Charles and Resurrection churches in the near future.

## *The Pastor's Page*

### Sunday, September 12, 2021

Dear Parishioners,

Almost 2 weeks later, we continue to read the horrifying news stories as well as view the disturbing pictures appearing on our electronic devices, TV and in our local newspapers regarding the aftermath of Hurricane Henri in Haiti and Hurricane Ida in Louisiana notwithstanding the record deluge which stunned the Northeast. We can then become Job and question God about why this has happened.

As I travelled along the Major Deegan last Thursday and Friday, cars and vans were abandoned resembling a graveyard and now learning of the passing of 2 parishioners from my home parish, Our Lady of Mercy, in Port Chester, I did not question God, but reflected on how precious life truly is and how life can be snuffed out in a “twinkle of an eye.” Through the intercession of St. Joseph, patron saint of the dying, let us pray for those who have recently died as the result of these tropical storms whether marked with the sign of faith or without.

Mother Nature has caused havoc. The loss of personal property and most importantly the loss of human life are difficult to comprehend. Her effects by no means compare to the loss of human life caused by abortion, guns, wars, and violence that continue to plague our society. Added to this list are those who have died from COVID-19 and those who died twenty years ago on 9/11. Karen Armstrong described in her autobiographical work, *The Spiral Staircase*, the events of September 11<sup>th</sup> as a “dark epiphany, a terrible revelation of what life is like if we do not recognize the sacredness of all human beings, even our enemies...” The Church consistently and continuously teaches that life is sacred at the moment of conception to natural death. All life is precious, and all life is to be valued, because we are made in the image of our Creator!

It was 11 years ago that Hurricane Katrina hit Haiti and 11 years later Hurricane Henri, which battered southwestern Haiti. Members of the Parish have relatives there who are affected by the storm, and we reach out in prayer and solidarity to those families who have suffered great loss. As you have responded in the past, I ask you to join in the humanitarian effort by being generous in this weekend's Second Collection for the Recovery/Rebuilding Efforts in Haiti.

I wish to highlight two celebrations this week. First, today (September 12) is National Grandparents Day. Grandparents are very special people, often assisting in the rearing of their grandchildren. I was so blessed to be reared by mine! We thank them for their presence in our lives and for their wisdom. **HAPPY GRANDPARENTS' DAY** to all our parishioners who have been bestowed this awesome title! Cherish it and all the beautiful memories. The second celebration is the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross (September 14) which dates to the year 320 AD. During Holy Week, we focus on the sufferings of Christ crucified. Today our focus is more on the glory and victory of the cross, the universal image of Christian belief. Jesus turned the cross into a symbol of victory, a symbol of hope, a symbol of sacrifice and love. *“How splendid the cross of Christ! It brings life, not death; light, not darkness; Paradise, not its loss. It is the wood on which the Lord, like a great warrior, was wounded in hands and feet and side but healed thereby our wounds. A tree has destroyed us, a tree now brought us life”* (Theodore of Studios).

# La Página del Párroco

## Domingo 12 de septiembre del 2021



Estimados Feligreses,

Casi 2 semanas después, continuamos leyendo las horribles noticias y viendo las imágenes perturbadoras que aparecen en nuestros dispositivos electrónicos, Televisión y en nuestros periódicos locales sobre las secuelas del huracán Henri en Haití y el huracán Ida en Louisiana a pesar de que del diluvio récord que aturdió al noreste. Entonces podemos convertirnos en Job y preguntarle a Dios por qué ha sucedido esto.

Mientras viajaba por el Major Deegan el jueves y viernes pasado, los autos y camionetas fueron abandonados como un cementerio y ahora me enteré del fallecimiento de 2 feligreses de mi parroquia natal, Nuestra Señora de la Misericordia, en Port Chester, no cuestioné a Dios, pero reflexioné sobre lo preciosa que es realmente la vida y cómo la vida se puede ir en un "abrir y cerrar de ojos". Por la intercesión de San José, santo patrón de los moribundos, recemos por aquellos que han muerto recientemente como resultado de estas tormentas tropicales, ya sean marcadas con el signo de la fe o sin él.

La Madre Naturaleza ha causado estragos. La pérdida de propiedad personal y, lo que es más importante, la pérdida de vidas humanas son difíciles de comprender. Sus efectos de ninguna manera se comparan con la pérdida de vidas humanas causada por el aborto, las armas, las guerras y la violencia que continúan plagando a nuestra sociedad. Por igual se agregan a esta lista los que partieron a causa del COVID-19 y los que murieron hace veinte años el 11 de septiembre. Karen Armstong describió en su obra autobiográfica, *La Escalera de Caracol*, los sucesos del 11 de septiembre como una "oscura epifanía, una terrible revelación de cómo es la vida si no reconocemos el carácter sagrado de todos los seres humanos, incluso de nuestros enemigos..." La Iglesia enseña de manera constante y continua que la vida es sagrada desde el momento de la concepción hasta la muerte natural. Toda vida es preciosa y toda vida debe ser valorada, ¡porque estamos hechos a la imagen de nuestro Creador!

Hace 11 años que el huracán Katrina azotó Haití y 11 años después el huracán Henri, que azotó el suroeste de Haití. Los miembros de la parroquia tienen parientes allí afectados por la tormenta, nos acercamos en oración y solidaridad a aquellas familias que han sufrido una gran pérdida. Como han respondido en el pasado, le pido que se una al esfuerzo humanitario siendo generoso en la Segunda Colecta de este fin de semana para los Esfuerzos de Recuperación / Reconstrucción en Haití.

Esta semana celebramos la Fiesta de la Exaltación de la Santa Cruz que se remonta al año 320 D.C. Durante la Semana Santa, nos centramos en los sufrimientos de Cristo crucificado. Hoy nuestro enfoque está más en la gloria y la victoria de la cruz, la imagen universal de la Fe Cristiana. Jesús convirtió la cruz en un símbolo de victoria, un símbolo de esperanza, un símbolo de sacrificio y amor. "¡Qué espléndida es la cruz de Cristo! Trae vida, no muerte; luz, no oscuridad; Paraíso, no su pérdida. Es la madera en la que el Señor, como un gran guerrero, fue herido en sus manos, pies y costado, pero con ello sanó nuestras heridas. Un árbol nos ha destruido, un árbol ahora nos ha dado vida" (Theodore of Studios).

### **~ REFLECTION FOR THE TWENTY-FOURTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME ~**

My dear people of God,

We all have a question put to us today from the gospel. Who is Jesus for you – and what difference does he make in your life? Many in Israel recognized Jesus as a mighty man of God, even comparing him with the greatest of the prophets. Peter, always quick to respond whenever Jesus spoke, professed that Jesus was truly the “Christ of God” – “the son of the living God” (Matthew 16:16). No mortal being could have revealed this to Peter, but only God. Through the “eyes of faith” Peter discovered who Jesus truly was. Peter recognized that Jesus was much more than a great teacher, prophet, and miracle worker. Who Jesus is to you makes a huge difference in your relationship with him as well as the outcome of your faith. Because Peter recognized him as the “Christ of God”, he publicly declared that Jesus was the Anointed One, consecrated by the Father, and followed Jesus to the end.

Jesus wants us to truly know him. That was why in the gospel of today, Jesus began to explain the mission he was sent to accomplish to his disciples, because Jesus was aware that the disciples did not yet understand his mission and how he would accomplish it. Jesus told his disciples that it was necessary for the Messiah to suffer and die in order that God’s work of redemption might be accomplished. How startled the disciples were when they heard this word. How different are God’s thoughts and ways from our thoughts and ways (Isaiah 55:8) It was through humiliation, suffering, and death on the cross that Jesus broke the powers of sin and death and won for us eternal life and freedom from slavery of sin and from freedom from oppression of our enemy, Satan, the father of lies and the deceiver of humankind. Jesus wanted his disciples to understand this mission of his as a reminder to their own mission.

We too have a share in the mission and victory of the Lord Jesus. If we want to share in the victory of the Lord Jesus, then we must also take up our cross and follow where he leads us. What is the “cross” that you and I must take up each day? When my will crosses (does not align) with God’s will, then his will must be done? To know Jesus is to know the power of his victory on the cross where he defeated sin and conquered death through his resurrection. The Holy Spirit gives each of us the gifts and strength we need to live as sons and daughters of God. The Holy Spirit gives us faith to know the Lord Jesus personally as our Redeemer, and the power to live the Gospel faithfully, and the courage to witness to others the joy, truth, and freedom of the Gospel. **WHO DO YOU SAY THAT JESUS IS?**

Mi querido pueblo de Dios,

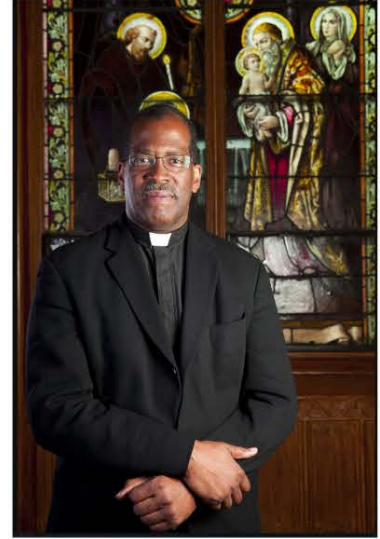
Hoy todos tenemos una pregunta del evangelio. ¿Quién es Jesús para ti y qué diferencia hace Él en tu vida? Muchos en Israel reconocieron a Jesús como un poderoso hombre de Dios, incluso comparándolo con el más grande de los profetas. Pedro, siempre dispuesto a responder cada vez que Jesús hablaba, profesaba que Jesús era verdaderamente el "Cristo de Dios", "el hijo del Dios viviente" (Mateo 16:16). Ningún ser mortal podría haberle revelado esto a Pedro, sino solo Dios. A través de los "ojos de la Fe", Pedro descubrió quién era realmente Jesús. Pedro reconoció que Jesús era mucho más que un gran maestro, profeta y hacedor de milagros. Quién es Jesús para ti hace una gran diferencia en tu relación con Él, así como en el resultado de tu Fe. Debido a que Pedro lo reconoció como el "Cristo de Dios", declaró públicamente que Jesús era el Ungido, consagrado por el Padre, y siguió a Jesús hasta el final.

Jesús quiere que lo conozcamos de verdad. Por eso, en el evangelio de hoy, Jesús comenzó a explicar la misión que fue enviado a cumplir a sus discípulos, porque Jesús estaba consciente de que los discípulos aún no entendían su misión y cómo la cumpliría. Jesús les dijo a sus discípulos que era necesario que el Mesías sufriera y muriera para que la obra de redención de Dios se pudiera llevar a cabo. Cuán sorprendidos se quedaron los discípulos cuando escucharon esta palabra. Cuán diferentes son los pensamientos y caminos de Dios de nuestros pensamientos y caminos (Isaías 55: 8). Fue a través de la humillación, el sufrimiento y la muerte en La Cruz que Jesús quebró los poderes del pecado y la muerte y ganó para nosotros la Vida Eterna y la libertad de la esclavitud del pecado y de la libertad de la opresión de nuestro enemigo, Satanás, el padre de la mentira y el engañador de la humanidad. Jesús quería que sus discípulos entendieran esta misión suya como un recordatorio de su propia misión.

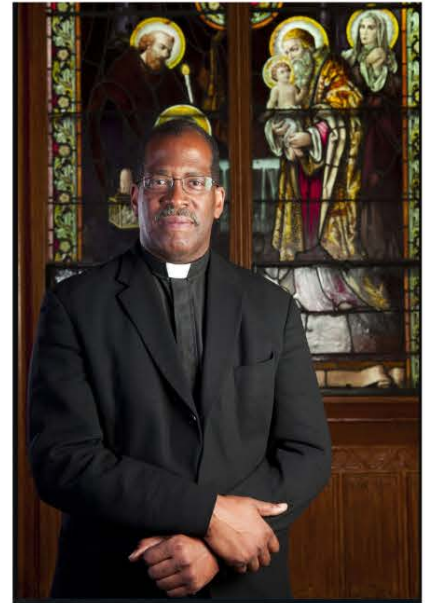

## Protocols for Fr. Chisholm's Farewell Mass



*On Sunday, September 26, the Parish will be honoring our beloved pastor, Father Gregory Chisholm, SJ for his 10 years of dedicated service to our Parish and the Harlem Community. Time is quickly approaching, and we are happy to announce a celebration held in his honor. We are anticipating a greater number of attendees than usual. Whenever there is an event of this magnitude, and notwithstanding the pandemic, safety and security protocols must be in place so keep everyone safe. That said, the following directives will be strictly enforced:*

### **1. COVID PROTOCOLS**

COVID protocols remain in place for the Parish of St. Charles Borromeo, Resurrection and All Saints: For contact tracing, **ALL** attendees must be checked in, temperatures will be taken, masks are required to be worn during the Services, social distancing is also required. Sanitizing liquids are available when you enter our Churches and **ARE** to be used.
