## *The Pastor's Page* Sunday, October 17, 2021

Dear Parishioners,

On my desk are many items to help me “do my job” or perform my varied and many pastoral duties and responsibilities. One of the tools is my *2021 Liturgical Desk Calendar*, a manuscript for the liturgical year. For nearly 20 years, this tool has become my compass. On the left-hand side, I record ALL sacramental events. On the right-hand side, appointments, meetings, and social events are recorded. (To be somewhat techy, I also use the calendar on my cell phone) While reviewing this week's calendar, I noticed Sunday, October 17 is designated as “Laity Sunday”.

Laity Sunday focuses on the celebration of the ministry of all Christians, especially those who aren't ministers of Word and sacrament. It offers a chance for members of all ages to pause and consider their own unique calling to ministry within the community of believers. It is our baptism that gives us the joy and genuine faith that rekindles and fans the flame of faith in us to use our individual and unique gifts for God's Church and His people.

Growing up as a member of the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church, Laity Sunday was an annual celebration where the laity actively participated in the 11:00 a.m. Worship Service. Involvement from deacons/deaconesses/stewards and stewardess, choirs, ushers, acolytes, and parish organizations were front and center. The Pastor took the ‘day off’ from performing his preaching duties but was still present in the sanctuary. Members were involved by their full-active participation in the service.

The Catholic Church shares this: “Lay people, too, sharing in the priestly, prophetic and kingly office of Christ, play their part in the mission of the whole people of God in the Church and in the World.” (The Second Vatican Council, *Decree on the Apostolate of the Laity*, #2, 1965.) However, according to one source “Fifty-four years after Vatican II, it seems to the researcher that the role of the laity in the Roman Catholic Church is still problematic to some clergy and the laity. Some clergy and the laity still see the laity's role as passive and overstretching their bounds when they wish to participate fully in the mission of the Church as priests, prophets, and kings. Tension exists between some clergy and the laity as to the proper role of the laity in the Church whereas Vatican II clearly defined the role of the laity in the Church and in the world. The clergy and the laity are both called by their baptism and confirmation to take active roles in the Church and collaborate in the mission of Christ for the spreading of the kingdom of God on earth.” We all would concur this tension must be resolved sooner than later as we all experience the effects of lack of vocations, aging clergy, and nearly the extinction of religious communities who once staffed our schools and healthcare institutions.

I am extremely blessed by the Laity, who week after week, give their time, talent, and treasure. When I arrived in July, I was quite impressed with how many of you introduce yourselves, not in secular terms “Hi, I am Betty Smith, the CEO of Harlem National Savings, but as “Hi, I am Betty Smith, Chair of the Parish Council, a Gospelite, and a member of the Environmental Ministry.” What a beautiful thing! It is my sincere hope that there will be an increase in participation of you, the Laity, here at Parish when our annual “Sign Me Up Sunday” is scheduled. Yes, the adage, “Many hands make light work” is a truism. I need your hands, fellow co-workers, in the Lord's vineyard!

# *La Página del Parroco*

## **Domingo 17 de Octubre del 2021**



Queridos Feligreses,

En mi escritorio hay muchos elementos para ayudarme a “hacer mi trabajo” o realizar mis variados y tantos deberes y responsabilidades pastorales. Una de las herramientas es mi Calendario Litúrgico de Escritorio 2021, un manuscrito para el año litúrgico. Durante casi 20 años, esta herramienta se ha convertido en mi brújula. En el lado izquierdo, registro TODOS los eventos sacramentales. En el lado derecho, se registran las citas, reuniones y eventos sociales. (Para ser algo técnico, también uso el calendario en mi teléfono celular) Mientras revisaba el calendario de esta semana, noté que el domingo 17 de octubre está designado como “Domingo de los Laicos”.

El Domingo de los Laicos se centra en la celebración del ministerio de todos los Cristianos, especialmente de aquellos que no son ministros de la Palabra y los sacramentos. Ofrece una oportunidad para que los miembros de todas las edades hagan una pausa y consideren su propio llamado único al ministerio dentro de la comunidad de creyentes. Es nuestro bautismo lo que nos da el gozo y la Fe genuina que reaviva y aviva la llama de la Fe en nosotros para usar nuestros dones individuales y únicos para la Iglesia de Dios y Su Pueblo.

Creciendo como miembro de la Iglesia Sion Episcopal Metodista Africana, el Domingo de Laicos fue una celebración anual en la que los laicos participaron activamente en el servicio de adoración de las 11:00 a.m. La participación de diáconos / diaconisas / mayordomos y azafatas, coros, ujieres, acólitos y organizaciones parroquiales estuvieron al frente y al centro. El Pastor se tomó el "día libre" para realizar sus deberes de predicación, pero todavía estaba presente en el santuario. Los miembros participaron activamente en el servicio.

La Iglesia Católica comparte esto: “También los laicos, participando en el oficio sacerdotal, profético y real de Cristo, desempeñan su papel en la misión de todo el pueblo de Dios en la Iglesia y en el mundo” (El Concilio Vaticano II). Decreto sobre el Apostolado de los Laicos, # 2, 1965.) Sin embargo, según una fuente “Cincuenta y cuatro años después del Vaticano II, al investigador le parece que el papel de los laicos en la Iglesia Católica Romana sigue siendo problemático para algunos clérigos y los laicos. Algunos clérigos y los laicos todavía ven el papel de los laicos como pasivo y sobrepasando sus límites cuando desean participar plenamente en la misión de la Iglesia como sacerdotes, profetas y reyes. Existe tensión entre algunos clérigos y los laicos en cuanto al papel propio de los laicos en la Iglesia, mientras que el Vaticano II definió claramente el papel de los laicos en la Iglesia y en el mundo. El clero y los laicos son llamados por su bautismo y confirmación a asumir un papel activo en la Iglesia y colaborar en la misión de Cristo para la difusión del Reino de Dios en la Tierra". Todos estaríamos de acuerdo en que esta tensión debe resolverse más temprano que tarde, ya que todos experimentamos los efectos de la falta de vocaciones, el envejecimiento del clero y la casi extinción de las comunidades religiosas que alguna vez formaron el personal de nuestras escuelas e instituciones de atención médica.

Estoy sumamente bendecido por los laicos, que semana tras semana dan su tiempo, talento y tesoro. Cuando llegué en julio, quedé bastante impresionado con la cantidad de ustedes que se presentan, no en términos seculares "Hola, soy Betty Smith, la directora ejecutiva de Harlem National Savings, pero como" Hola, soy Betty Smith, presidenta de la Consejo Parroquial, Gospelite y miembro del Ministerio del Medio Ambiente ". ¡Qué cosa más hermosa! Tengo la más sincera esperanza de que haya un aumento en la participación de ustedes, los laicos, aquí en la parroquia cuando esté programado nuestro “Domingo de inscripción” anual. Sí, el refrán, "Muchas manos facilitan el trabajo" es una perogrullada. ¡Necesito sus manos, compañeros de trabajo, en la viña del Señor!

## **Reflection for the Twenty-Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time**

### **Jesus Knows Us**

In this Sunday's second reading, the Letter to the Hebrews tells us that "*we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who has similarly been tested in every way, yet without sin.*"

The trials and tribulations we experience in our homes, jobs, and yes, even the Church can make us feel the weakness referred to in the second reading. In our weakness, we may feel like no one understands our burdens. However, I would suggest there is always one person who understands, and that is Jesus. He has felt the frustration and exhaustion caused by being rejected by family members. He encountered obstacles that were in the way of doing the work he came to do. And yes, he even experienced feeling unwelcomed and ignored by his religious community

We might, in our weakness, react to the burdens of life in sinful ways, but Jesus didn't. Jesus knows our pain, so we have a God who knows us, who has experienced human life. Every Mass that is said allows us to remember that Jesus knows our weaknesses and knows we are tested by sin (and negatively impacted by the sins of others) because he humbled himself to share in our humanity. This should give us hope, strength, and energy to keep going and not succumb to sin.

Know my family in Christ that I am praying for you and me when I mix the water and wine on the altar. When a deacon (or priest when a deacon is not present) pours wine and little water into the chalice, they say this silent prayer: *By the mystery of this water and wine may we come to share in the divinity of Christ who humbled himself to share in our humanity.* In that prayer, I am asking Jesus, who knows what we are going through, to forgive our sins and bring us closer to sharing in his divinity.

## *Reflexión para el Vigésimo Noveno Domingo del Tiempo Ordinario*

### **Jesús Nos Conoce**

En la segunda lectura de este domingo, de la Carta a los Hebreos nos dice que **"no tenemos un sumo sacerdote que no pueda simpatizar con nuestras debilidades, sino uno que ha sido probado de manera similar en todos los sentidos, pero sin pecado"**.

Las pruebas y tribulaciones que experimentamos en nuestros hogares, trabajos y sí, incluso la Iglesia pueden hacernos sentir la debilidad a que se refiere la segunda lectura. En nuestra debilidad, podemos sentir que nadie comprende nuestras cargas. Sin embargo, sugeriría que siempre hay una persona que entiende, y es Jesús. Ha sentido la frustración y el cansancio que le provoca el rechazo de sus familiares. Encontró obstáculos que le impedían realizar el trabajo que había venido a hacer. Y sí, incluso experimentó sentirse mal recibido e ignorado por su comunidad religiosa.

Podríamos, en nuestra debilidad, reaccionar a las cargas de la vida de maneras pecaminosas, pero Jesús no lo hizo. Jesús conoce nuestro dolor, por eso tenemos un Dios que nos conoce, que ha experimentado la vida humana. En cada Misa que se celebra nos permite recordar que Jesús conoce nuestras debilidades y sabe que somos probados por el pecado (y que los pecados de los demás nos impactan negativamente) porque se humilló para compartir nuestra humanidad. Esto debería darnos esperanza, fuerza y energía para seguir adelante y no sucumbir al pecado.

Que mi familia en Cristo sepa que estoy orando por ti y por mí cuando mezclo el agua y el vino en el altar. Cuando un diácono (o un sacerdote cuando un diácono no está presente) vierte vino y un poco de agua en el cáliz, dicen esta oración silenciosa: ***Por el misterio de esta agua y este vino, podemos llegar a compartir la divinidad de Cristo que se humilló a sí mismo a compartir nuestra humanidad.*** En esa oración, le pido a Jesús, que sabe por lo que estamos pasando, que perdone nuestros pecados y nos acerque a compartir Su divinidad.

## **THE COMMEMORATION OF ALL THE FAITHFUL DEPARTED**

### **(ALL SOULS' DAY) --- November 2nd**

*All Souls' Day is unique on the liturgical calendar. Neither a solemnity nor a feast, this commemoration outranks other feasts and even takes the place of a Sunday in Ordinary Time (should this commemoration fall on a Sunday). Prayer for the dead reaches deep into our human history and it has been our custom from the earliest days of the church. The belief that our prayers can be of assistance to the dead is a treasured tenet of our Catholic faith. We profess it every time we recite the Nicene Creed; "I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come."*

***All Souls Novenas:** During November, we are called in a special way to pray for the souls of those who have gone before us in faith. We recall the goodness of our family members, friends, coworkers, benefactors, fellow-parishioners.*

*We will have a Novena of Masses of Remembrance, nine Masses for your intentions, which will begin on Tuesday, November 2. Envelopes to list your beloved dead are to your offertory boxes or on the tables at the entrance of the church. Envelopes will remain on the altar for the entire month of November. Please return them by October 31st. **We will not have the Book of the Dead as in past years.** Masses on All Souls Day are:*

**8:30 AM Mass at SCB (School Mass)**

**7:00 PM Mass at SCB (English)**

**7:00 PM Mass at Resurrection (Bi-lingual)**

*During the evening Masses, we will pray for All Souls lost during the COVID-19 Pandemic and the names of those Deceased Parishioners who were buried out of the Parish from November 2, 2020 - November 1, 2021.*

*We will also have a Virtual All Souls Novena hosted by the Parish's Lazarus Project, our ministry of consolation beginning **Tuesday, November 2 at 8:30 p.m.** For more information, please see the separate flyer that follows this announcement.*

***At the Baptismal font** will be a list of those souls who were buried out of St. Charles Borromeo and Resurrection from November 2, 2020---November 2, 2021.*

***At the Blessed Mother's altar**, we will have the Table of Remembrance. Parishioners are invited to place framed pictures of their beloved dead, which will remain in place during the month of November.*
