From the Desk of Father Ed:

Dear Parishioners,

As a Priest there have been many times when I have had the privilege of visiting people and ministering to them the sacraments shortly before their dying. It is a great joy as a Priest to help people to pass from this world into our homeland in Heaven. Often those dying have a wonderful peacefulness about them after receiving the Sacraments of: Reconciliation, Anointing of the Sick, and Viaticum (Holy Eucharist).

For a Priest it is extremely difficult and disheartening when ministering to someone on their death bed and they refuse the Sacraments or they have been away so long from the Church and are unable to make a good confession because of the inability to examine their conscience and the reality of clinging to sin for so long. St. Paul in his letter to the Romans reminds us that nothing can separate us from the love of Christ; the only thing that can separate us from him is our sin.

In our Gospel today Jesus speaks clearly to us of the deadly result of living a life of sin. And if we remain in sin and not cut it out of our lives we could jeopardize our salvation. As Catholics we bristle at hearing those words because we all want to be assured of our salvation. In Mark's Gospel today, Jesus makes use of hyperbole (overstatement) to emphasize the need to avoid sin.

If your hand causes you to sin, cut it off. It is better for you to enter into life maimed than with two hands to go into Gehenna, into the unquenchable fire. And if your foot causes you to sin, cut it off. It is better for you to enter into life crippled than with two feet to be thrown into Gehenna. And if your eye causes you to sin, pluck it out. Better for you to enter into the kingdom of God with one eye than with two eyes to be thrown into Gehenna, where 'their worm does not die, and the fire is not quenched.'"

Jesus does not want us to mutilate our bodies but he wants us to be sure of the grave danger we place ourselves in when we fall into serious sin. The Church Fathers recognized this Gospel passage as referring to relationships and friendships that cause us to sin and the importance of cutting them out of our lives before resulting in the loss of salvation. Sin needs to be cut out of our lives, even small sin or venial sins because if left by themselves over time begin to accumulate and eventually lead us to fall into deadly or mortal sin.

The Church teaches us that if we deliberately miss a Sunday Mass or Holy Day of Obligation without a legitimate excuse such as caring for a child, elderly person, or an illness, or dangerous travel conditions we have committed a grave sin. Deadly sin cuts us off from the life and charity of God and we need to show ourselves to the Priest in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. This sacrament is the only ordinary means of getting our souls right before God. The more often we go to this sacrament the easier it becomes for us to recognize sin in our lives and to make a good confession. Let us go often to this healing sacrament – the Sacrament of Reconciliation which not only God forgives us all our sins but he totally forgets them and gives us his grace to grow stronger in the spiritual life and experience his peace until the day we rest with him forever in the Kingdom of Heaven.
