#### ND MARCH FOR LIFE AND RALLY JANUARY 29

You are invited to partake in the first-ever North Dakota March for Life, taking place at the **North Dakota State Capitol on January 29, 2021.** On January 22, 1973, the United States Supreme Court handed down the Roe v. Wade decision that made abortion legal, allowing many to choose to have an abortion without government intervention. Since then, over 62 million lives have been lost due to abortion. To begin the event on January 29, **Bishop Kagan will celebrate Mass at 11:00 AM for the general public at the Cathedral,** (separate Masses are being arranged for Catholic School junior high and high school students to allow for adequate social distancing). **Following Mass, groups are welcome to march (or drive) to the Capitol grounds for a program beginning at 12:30 PM** to include a keynote speaker and a period of silence for the 62 million lives who have been silenced by abortion in the United States since 1973. ### JANUARY 24: SUNDAY OF THE WORD OF GOD

In 2019, Pope Francis announced that each year the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time would be celebrated as the Sunday of the Word of God. In his Apostolic Letter in this regard he wrote: "The Bible is the book of the Lord's people, who, in listening to it, move from dispersion and division towards unity. The word of God unites believers and makes them one people ... Regular reading of sacred Scripture and the celebration of the Eucharist make it possible for us to see ourselves as part of one another. As Christians, we are a single people, making our pilgrim way through history, sustained by the Lord, present in our midst, who speaks to us and nourishes us ... we urgently need to grow in our knowledge and love of the Scriptures and of the risen Lord, who continues to speak his word and to break bread in the community of believers ... we need to develop a closer relationship with sacred Scripture; otherwise, our hearts will remain cold and our eyes shut, struck as we are by so many forms of blindness."

### STEWARDSHIP THOUGHT

Jesus reminds us that material things, even something as basic as water, can never satisfy us for long. When we build our lives around material possessions we always want more. True satisfaction only comes when we follow Jesus.

*There is a certain urgency in today's Gospel as Jesus calls His first disciples – Andrew and Simon, James, and John. Each one follows Jesus immediately, unhesitatingly abandoning nets and boats and father and fellow workers. To what is Jesus calling me – at this moment, in these circumstances? What will I need to abandon in order to follow Him?*
