ST BENEDICT, ABBOT – **Feast Day Thursday, July 11** – The father of Western Monasticism and patron of Europe, St. Benedict of Nursia (480-547), is the saint we honor today in our liturgy and prayer. Western monasticism is a monument to St. Benedict. and it is also one of the foundations of Western Civilization. It was monasticism that preserved and promoted classical learning for our times. Initially, St. Benedict was interested in a life of solitude, and lived as a hermit for three years. Soon he found that others looked to him for guidance and he convinced them of the value of uniting the spiritual life with the practicality of community living. This eventually resulted in the establishment of monasteries which gave a great stability to the lives of hermits and monks who banded together to form such communities. St. Benedict teaches us that the Lord is the source of wisdom, the giver of knowledge and discernment, and the guardian of justice for those who seek to follow His ways.
