Reflecting on Living the Gospel

How many people can play on a team? Baseball uses nine players on defense and one at a time on offense, with the possibility of other players on base. But teams are much larger than that. For example, it's not enough to have only nine players. There needs to be more in case some are injured, or to give others a rest. A baseball team with only one pitcher will not win many games in a row. Teams need back-up players. And what about football, basketball, or soccer?

During the ministry of Jesus there were many on the team: crowds, disciples, apostles, and a special few. Luke has an expansive view of discipleship. In Acts, he invents a feminine form of the word to mention Tabitha, a female disciple (9:36). And in today's gospel we have the mission of the seventy-two! In Luke there were many, many disciples. Nearly anyone could be on the team!

According to Luke, men, women, the Twelve, the seventy-two, and many more were in a special relationship with Jesus, chosen to follow him and chosen also to be sent by him. The situation seems to have been dynamic. And that's likely a more accurate reflection of the situation around Jesus' earthly ministry. It would also seem to reflect our lives more accurately too, with dynamic, fluid relationships.

Aside from this story in Luke we never hear about the seventy-two again. But surely these people were likely some of the early evangelizers after the resurrection. It all gives us a brief inkling into the situation of the early church. Though it might be easier to imagine the Twelve with Peter at the head, knowing who is "on the team" and who isn't, today's gospel reading invites us to consider a much more complex picture.

Closing Prayer

Lord Jesus, you called disciples during your time on earth and you continue to call disciples today. Give us an attentive spirit to hear your voice, so we may move from the margins to the inner circle, from the crowds seeking wonders to the disciples seeking wisdom. We ask this in your name. Amen.

For Reflection:

• Jesus sends the disciples out in pairs. Do you have a companion on the journey of faith? How does it change ministry when it is done in a team setting?

Suggestions for group and individual use:

- 1. Pray aloud the "Opening Prayer" (in The Roman Missal called the "collect").
2. One person read aloud the gospel.
3. Each read prayerfully "Reflecting on Living the Gospel" and spend some time in personal prayer.
4. Share together responses to "For Reflection."
5. Pray the "Closing Prayer."

Gospel Luke 10:1-12, 17-20 (or 10:1-9)

At that time the Lord appointed seventy-two others whom he sent ahead of him in pairs to every town and place he intended to visit. He said to them, "The harvest is abundant but the laborers are few; so ask the master of the harvest to send out laborers for his harvest. Go on your way; behold, I am sending you like lambs among wolves.

Carry no money bag, no sack, no sandals; and greet no one along the way. Into whatever house you enter, first say, 'Peace to this household.' If a peaceful person lives there, your peace will rest on him; but if not, it will return to you. Stay in the same house and eat and drink what is offered to you, for the laborer deserves his payment. Do not move about from one house to another. Whatever town you enter and they welcome you, eat what is set before you, cure the sick in it and say to them, 'The kingdom of God is at hand for you.' Whatever town you enter and they do not receive you, go out into the streets and say, 'The dust of your town that clings to our feet, even that we shake off against you.' Yet know this: the kingdom of God is at hand.



I tell you, it will be more tolerable for Sodom on that day than for that town." The seventy-two returned rejoicing, and said, "Lord, even the demons are subject to us because of your name." Jesus said, "I have observed Satan fall like lightning from the sky. Behold, I have given you the power to 'tread upon serpents' and scorpions and upon the full force of the enemy and nothing will harm you. Nevertheless, do not rejoice because the spirits are subject to you, but rejoice because your names are written in heaven."
