Are you also Looking for a Pearl of Great Price?

A college professor writing a book on "Human wants and needs" started his research by consulting and asking questions to different kinds of people and age groups about their needs. At the end of his research and meetings, he was amazed on the vast responses from the people. He then summarized: people want to be happy, to be healthy and live longer, and to be able to see the progress of their children and grandchildren. Some groups want to have a professional job, to have enough to pay for their bills and all their needs. They also want more than sufficient for their vacations to exotic places as well as sufficient for retirement, and still a lot more left for the family after they are gone. Nobody ever said they want to do something to help them make a difference in the life of others, or ask for fidelity to God's words and teachings, or even wanting to live a devout life, to make it to heaven. Sometimes, we forget that even if we accomplish our greatest goal or achieve the highest material success, we are never promised comfort, convenience, or a pain-free life.

Solomon understands these needs better in today's first reading. As a young king, Solomon had many legitimate needs. He needed wealth, military might, fame, security, prosperity, long life and happiness. He never asked God for any of these basic needs, but he instead, asked for "an understanding heart to judge people and to distinguish right from wrong." God was very pleased with his request. Hence, He granted wisdom and understanding to Solomon far surpassing anybody or king of his time. For Solomon, the wisdom is "a pearl of great price." And not easy to buy but can only be granted from the above.

Today's readings invite us to look beyond our earthly temporary needs, and rather to reflect on this important question: "Among all the things I desire in life, what is the one desire of my life that once found will bring all my other legitimate desires in its train?" The gospel calls this need, "A pearl of great price which a merchant found and sold everything he has in order to buy it." In a very clear term, "A pearl of great price" is the kingdom of God. Thus, it is not surprising that Jesus said, "Seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added to you" (Matthew 6:33). Brothers and sisters, while your temporal needs here on earth are essential, you must also work hard for your eternal happiness with God in heaven.

ST. JEAN-MARIE VIANNEY 1786-1859

The Life of Saint Jean-Marie Vianney

St. Vianney was born on May 8, 1786, to a poor but devout Catholic family in the French town of Dardilly, France (near Lyon) and was baptized the same day.

His childhood was marked by the tragic events of the French Revolution. While the Jacobins, supported by the Freemasons, were organizing the hunt for priests and sending them and their faithful to the guillotine, Jean-Marie was studying catechism in secret. It was during a Mass celebrated secretly behind barred doors that Jean-Marie received his First Communion.

"I will be a priest", he affirmed.

Overcoming enormous difficulties, he was ordained (in a tiny French town, Ars), to the priesthood on August 13, 1815, in the chapel of the Seminary at Grenoble. The day after his arrival, he was almost alone as he made his way toward the altar to celebrate Mass. A few days later, when some came to see this new priest, the faithful found him on his knees in prayer before the Tabernacle. Father Vianney celebrated Mass early in the morning and it was apparent to everyone that he was fulfilling the Sacrifice of the Son of God on the Cross.

The first treasure to open is God's forgiveness: from the moment he arrived in Ars, Fr. Jean-Marie had become the man consumed by the confessional. His parishioners flocked to him for confession and felt the joy of God's forgiveness and of conversion. Ars became the European capital of reconciliation with God. The faithful from across Europe and around the world would set out for the French village.

The poor boy from Dardilly who became a teacher and model for priests, even Popes who sit on the Chair of Peter who are inspired by him and hold him up for emulation to the entire church.

Sadly, Fr. Jean-Marie Vianney died on August 4, 1859. May 31, 1925, Pope Pius XI enrolled him among the saints and on April 23, 1928, declared him Patron of the world's parish priests.
