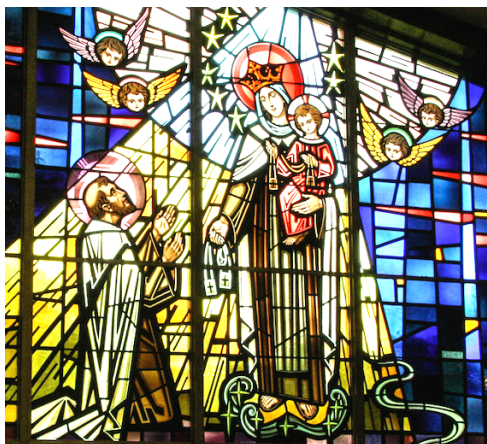

"This is my Son my beloved, with Him I am well pleased. Listen to him."

Nobody is allowed to drive a vehicle without evidence of learning to drive and being licensed. In marriage, dating sets the stage for this learning and partners build trust and get to know each other very well. In friendship, hang outs, visiting places and dinner set the stage for this learning process. For the apostles to learn and know more about Jesus, they must go out with Him, visit places and experience His incredible miracles.

So, in today's gospel, prior to the final week of Jesus in Jerusalem, He invited three of the apostles: Peter, James and John to accompany Him on the top of the Mountain. On this mountain, He transfigures: "His countenance shone like the sun. Jesus' clothes became "dazzlingly white." Saint Gregory Nazianzen tells us that this whiteness was the Divinity, manifested to the disciples." Through the transfiguration, Jesus gives the three men the glimpse of His inner life and His glory. The presence of Moses and Elijah at the transfiguration symbolizes that the law and prophets are fulfilled in Jesus. The climax of the event was when Peter's master plan of electing three tents for the trio was interrupted by God's voice: "This is my Son my beloved, with Him I am well pleased. Listen to Him."

The apostles continued listening to Jesus till the end of His earthly ministry. At the Last Supper, He instituted the Sacrament of Eucharist and commanded them, "Do this in memory of me." After His resurrection, He appeared to them: "Peace be with you. Then He breathed on them and said, receive the Holy, whose sins you forgive, they are forgiven them, whose sins you retain, they are retained." That power of celebrating Eucharist and offering forgiveness has come to us through the apostolic succession. This is because the apostles listened to Jesus and continued His work of offering love and forgiveness to the people. However, listening to Jesus or God doesn't always come easy. For instance, in the Garden of Gethsemane, Jesus took with Him again the same three apostles. But, at this point, it was a little challenging for Jesus to listen to the voice of the Father. "He was in such a state of terror and distress at the prospect of crucifixion that He was tempted, as never before, to give up on His messianic mission and get out from under the cross." "My soul is sorrowful to the point of death," He continues, "Father, if You are willing, remove this cup from Me; yet not My will, but Yours be done." With this, He gave us an example to follow: to listen to God always, and when it is difficult to listen or to follow the will of God to pray as He did, "Father let your will be done."

ST. CLARE OF ASSISI 1194-1253

St. Clare was born in Assisi, Italy in 1193 to wealthy parents. She was taught to read and write as well as spin yarn and do needle work. But she had little interest in her luxurious surroundings. Because Clare was influenced by her mother's religious devotion, she decided to dedicate her life to God at an early age. Her calling would involve helping the poor and would set aside food from her family table to give to the needy on the streets.

When Clare was 18, she met Francis of Assisi when he came to preach in the church of San Giorgio at Assisi. Clare asked Francis to help her in dedicating her life to God and he vowed to do so.

The following year (1211), Clare's parents chose a wealthy young man for her to marry but she refused and fled soon after to Porziuncola Chapel where Francis received her. She took her vows dedicating her life to God on March 20, 1212, marking the beginning of the Second Order of St. Francis. (Clare was one of the first followers of St. Francis.) Soon after, her sister Agnes joined her and they moved to the Church of San Damiano which had recently been rebuilt by Francis. Other women joined them and they became known as the "Poor Ladies" also known as the Order of San Damiano. The Order became known for its life of abject poverty and committed life of prayer. Clare became the abbess of San Damiano in 1216.

On two occasions Clare is credited with saving Assisi. The first involved Clare raising the Host up in a window causing Frederick II's invading troops to fall back. The second attack on Assisi, Clare and her nuns prayed for the safety of their town and a storm swept in and scattered the attackers.

Clare cared for Francis toward the end of his life until he died in 1226. Despite being ill, Clare continued to promote her Order until her death in 1253.

In August 1255, Pope Alexander IV canonized Clare and today the Order of St. Clare has more than 20,000 sisters worldwide in more than 70 countries.
