# The power of keys in our lives

Keys and Locks are used by all of us in our daily life. Have you ever imagined what could have happened if locks and keys were never invented? Keys and Locks provide us much of the security in the current world of crime and theft. The major benefit of locks is that it protects our house and property from unauthorized persons. Perfect and sturdy locks could prevent the entry of unwanted persons into our private premises. When there is a lock, there is also a key to unlock. We have our own personal keys. There are times when keys are handed over to people when they take on a new job or change to a different position. The key is powerful but also speaks volumes of the authority or access giving to the 'key receiver.'

In today's gospel, "Key" is entrusted to the Apostle Peter. When Jesus asked the apostles a question about His true identity, Peter boldly declared Jesus as "Christ, the Son of the living God." Jesus acknowledges Peter's answer as revealed by God. Following his answer, Christ built and entrusted the authority of the Church to Peter. He goes on to say, "I will give you the keys to the kingdom of heaven. Whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven and whatever you loose on earth shall be lost in heaven." Although Peter was not a perfect person, he carried the authority invested on him by Christ properly. Peter denied Christ three times. St. John Chrysostom said, "his falling to sin was a providential grace to teach him from his own experience of his own weakness on how to deal kindly to others also on their own weakness."

In today's first reading, similar authority was also granted to Shebna. He was a servant who moved up to the position of controller or governor of the King's household which would be a very prominent position. Shebna apparently took every advantage that came with it. He became so selfish and focused on his own desires and his own glory. Because of his pride and selfishness, God dethroned him. He was stripped of all his "keys" of authority. Indeed absolute power corrupts.

Many of us hold different "keys" to different places and departments. The 'key' becomes the symbol of authority given to us. It is like the keys, that is, the authority of the kingdom of heaven granted to St. Peter. The lesson is: Do not use the 'key' — the power and the authority given to you to advance your personal agenda, your glory and your personal gains. Those in authority or in power at any given time, should discharge their duties properly, must be willing at every moment to listen and to respect peoples. Most of all, they should be humble and serve according to the needs of the people.

# ST. AUGUSTINE, BISHOP (354-430)

### St. Augustine Of Hippo

Augustine Aurelius was born November 13, 354 in Tagaste, North Africa. His father was a pagan and his mother, St. Monica, was a devout Christian.

Despite being brought up Christian, Augustine lived a life of 'loose living'. This famous son of **St. Monica** spent many years of his **life** in wicked living and in false beliefs. Though he was one of the most intelligent men who ever lived and though he had been brought up Christian, his sins of impurity and his **pride** darkened his mind so much that he could not see or understand the Divine **Truth** anymore. Through the **prayers** of his holy mother and the preaching of St. Ambrose, Augustine finally became convinced that **Christianity** was the one true religion. But that did not happen right away. Augustine thought that he could never live a pure life.

One day, he heard about two men who had been converted on reading the life of St. Anthony and he felt ashamed of himself. Full of bitter sorrow, Augustine cried out to God, "How long more, O Lord? Why does not this hour put an end to my sins?" Just then he heard a child singing" Take up and read!" He knew God intended for him to hear those words. He picked up the book of the letters of St. Paul and read the first passage his eyes fell on. The passage said to put away all impurity and to live in imitation of Jesus. From then on, Augustine began a new life. He became devout and charitable. He practiced great poverty and supported the poor, preached very often and prayed with great fervor up until his death.

Augustine was baptized, became a priest, a bishop, a famous **Catholic** writer, Founder of religious priests and one of the greatest saints that ever lived. With his holy life, he made up for the sins he committed before his conversion. His **feast day** is August 28th.
