Fourth Sunday of Advent



Fourth Week of Advent

On the fourth Sunday of Advent, the final purple candle is lit to mark the final week of prayer and penance as we wait expectantly for the sooncoming birth of the King of Kings. The fourth Sunday of Advent symbolizes peace with the "Angel's Candle" reminding us of the message of the



angels: "Peace on Earth, Good Will Toward Men." This week is also a time to recollect and to reflect on our Advent journey. To not let anything get in the way of our spiritual preparations for Christmas. The light on the candles on the Advent wreath are a symbol of the light of Christ.

Feast of St. John the Apostle – December 27



St. John who is styled in the Gospel, "The beloved disciple," was a Galilean, son of Zebedee and Salome and brother to St. James the Greater, both of whom were fishermen. They were called by Jesus to be disciples as they were mending their nets by the sea of Galilee. He became the

beloved disciple of Jesus. He wrote the fourth Gospel, three Epistles and the Apocalypse. His passages on the preexistence of the Word, who by His Incarnation became the light of the world and life of our souls, are among the finest of the New Testament. John, with his brother and Simon Peter, was one of the witnesses at the Transfiguration of Christ and was permitted to witness His agony in the garden. At the Last Supper, John leans on Jesus' chest and at the foot of the cross, Jesus entrusts His Mother to his care. St. John was the only one of the Apostles who did not forsake the Savior in the hour of His Passion and Death. John's pure life kept him very close to Jesus and Mary. In years to come John was exiled to the island of Patmos under Emperor Domitian but lived to an old age.

Jesus is the reason for the Christmas Season

Jesus gives meaning to Christmas. Jesus who was God in flesh, perfect, pure, holy, and who died on the cross and rose from the dead, is the one who gives the true meaning to Christmas. Thus, Christmas is supposed to be the time of year when we celebrate the birth of Christ. Unfortunately, it has become a commercial holiday rather than a religious one. It's mostly known as a time for businesses to make money, for people to give gifts, for children to be excited, for parties, etc. The "reason for the season" is supposed to be Jesus, not gifts, not parties and not watching "the big game." Of course, having celebrations, attending parties and watching the big game are not wrong and they are beautiful. It's just that the meaning of Christmas is supposed to be the recognition and appreciation of the birth of the one who loves us and died in our place. Christmas is the celebration of the historic event of when God entered into our world so that he might display the perfection and holiness of God and that through His work of living perfectly and also dying on the cross for our sins, that all who trust in Him would be saved from the righteous judgement of God.

Christmas Wafers

Many cultures have special traditions surrounding Christmas Eve. The Eastern Europeans especially have the tradition of the Christmas wafer. Many Lithuanians call the wafer the "Christ-Child cake". The wafer is a symbol of the living bread which became flesh. The father breaks his wafer first, then each family member breaks off a portion from his own "plotkele" & wishes that person Merry Christmas or a prayer such as "May you live till the next Christmas. God, grant you happiness & health all the coming year until the next Christmas."

*Donated by one of our parishioners, we have Christmas wafers available this year. It's a polish tradition however, you don't have to be Polish to take a wafer. It's available in the hall and in the Sacristy. You are not required to but you may give a free will offering if you need a Christmas wafer.

The celebration of our Lord's nativity is just a few days away. Many homes, offices and some public places has been decorated with a Christmas tree, with lights and ornaments. Others are baking cookies and preparing a Christmas menu for the gathering of family and friends. And of course, exchanging of Christmas cards and gifts are passing from loved ones and friends. For

vast majority of people, it is one of the busiest times of the year because there are banquets and parties they can't afford to miss, family gatherings to plan and cooking to be done. It seems that all of these and many other activities has become our Christmas schedule and invariably overshadow the real meaning of Christmas.

Christmas is many things to all of us: family, faith, tradition, celebrations, memories. For the two women, namely, Mary and Elizabeth we heard in today's Gospel, Christmas was not even on the calendar. It was simply a joyous visit and meeting of two cousins filled with good news. Luke has told the story of the angel Gabriel's visit to Mary of Nazareth announcing that she would be the mother of the savior of the world. After Mary was convinced by the angel that the conception will miraculously happen through the power of the Holy Spirit, Mary accepted this great news without further questions. Today, the gospel tells us how Mary proceeded to travel, to meet and share this great news with her cousin Elizabeth. This was before the time of camera smart phones or any form of social media. Thus, we arrive at what happens at the first meeting of two pregnant women. "Through the light of the Holy Spirit, Elizabeth recognized Mary's privilege as the mother of the longed-for Messiah." In the conversation that follows, Elizabeth praises the Blessed Virgin Mary saying, "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. And how does this happen to me, that the mother of my Lord should come to me."

Mary's visit to her cousin is a pleasant surprise but also a priceless gift offered at the great moment of Elizabeth's need. At her sixth month pregnancy, Mary offered her older cousin much needed support and comfort. It is an act of humility for us to serve others. Mary also carried a baby-Jesus who will emphasize the beautiful act of service to humanity. So, besides buying Christmas gifts, cards, etc., there is another gift many people find difficult to give. That is the gift of themselves. Put simply, being present to others when needed. That is what Mary gave to Elizabeth. It was not only being present but also assisting and serving her needs. This is the gift so many desire today but cannot get it. It is easy to send flowers, it is easy to send a parcel, but to give the gift of ourselves, to make the time to be with somebody, that is the gift that many people long for but do not receive at Christmas. Following Mary's example in today's Gospel story, we must, in addition to other beautiful gifts we offer, also give ourselves, our presence and our time to people who need us. You must find the time to visit and be with people who might need you. Visit to a loved one, to a friend or to the sick can be a priceless gift.
