THE EUCHARISTIC

St. Teresa of Jesus - Thursday, October 15th

Born in Avila, Spain, in 1515, Teresa initiated the reform of the Carmelites with John of the Cross in 1562. Enduring intense criticism from her sisters in religion and frequent illness, Teresa founded seventeen convents in her lifetime. She insisted that her sisters live simply, in imitation of Christ's poverty on the cross. In her writings, she shared the abundance of her own inner life. Prayer, she said, "means being on terms of friendship with God, frequently conversing in secret with him who, we know, loves us." Her writings on prayer earned her the title of Doctor of the Church in 1970.

St. Margaret Mary Alacoque - Fri., Oct. 16th

St. Margaret Mary, a French Roman Catholic Visitation nun and mystic, is greatly recognized for her devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. She was born in 1647 in France. St. Margaret Mary experienced visions of Jesus for most of her life, but thought they were a normal part of life and continued to practice austerity. In December 1673, Jesus appeared to Margaret Mary again, and allowed her to rest her head on His heart. His human heart was to be the symbol of His divine-human love. He revealed to her the wonders of His love. He explained to her that he wished to make these wonders known to all the world, and that He chose her for His work. She died on Oct. 17, 1690.

St. Ignatius of Antioch - Saturday, October 17th

Of Syrian origin, Ignatius served as the third Bishop of Antioch for forty years until he was arrested and escorted to Rome, where he died for sport in the amphitheater around the year 107. The seven letters he composed on this journey inspired generations of persecuted Christians. "Let me be food for the wild beasts," he begged his brethren in Rome, "for they are my way to God. I am God's wheat and shall be ground by their teeth so that I may become Christ's pure bread. Pray to Christ for me that the animals will be the means of making me a sacrificial victim for God.

Stewardship Awareness

1406 Jesus said: "I am the living bread that came down from heaven; if any one eats of this bread, he will live for ever;...he who eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life and...abides in me, and I in him"

1407 The Eucharistic is the heart and the summit of the Church's life, for in it Christ associates his Church and all her members with his sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving offered once for all on the cross to his Father; by this sacrifice he pours out the graces of salvation on his Body which is the Church

1408 The Eucharistic celebration always includes: the proclamation of the Word of God; thanksgiving to God the Father for all his benefits, above all the gift of his Son; the consecration of bread and wine; and participation in the liturgical banquet by receiving the Lord's body and blood. These elements constitute one single act of worship.

1409 The Eucharist is the memorial of Christ's Passover, that is, of the work of salvation accomplished by the life, death, and resurrection of Christ, a work made present by the liturgical action.

1410 It is Christ himself, the eternal high priest of the New Covenant who, acting through the ministry of the priests, offers the Eucharistic sacrifice. And it is the same Christ, really present under the species of bread and wine, who is the offering of the Eucharistic sacrifice.

1411 Only validly ordained priests can preside at the Eucharist and consecrate the bread and the wine so that they become the Body and Blood of the Lord.

1412 The essential signs of the Eucharistic sacrament are wheat bread and grape wine, on which the blessing of the Holy Spirit is invoked and the priest pronounces the words of consecration spoken by Jesus during the Last Supper: "This is my body which will be given up for you....This is the cup of my blood...."

1413 By the consecration the transubstantiation of the bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Christ is brought about. Under the consecrated species of bread and wine Christ himself, living and glorious, is present in a true, real, and substantial manner: his Body and his Blood, with his soul and his divinity.

1414 As sacrifice, the eucharist is also offered in reparation for the sins of the living and the dead and to obtain spiritual or temporal benefits from God

1415 Anyone who desires to receive Christ in Eucharistic communion must be in the state of grace.
