North American Martyrs - Sts. John de Brebeuf, Isaac Jogues and Companions - Mon., Oct. 19

Fr. John de Brebeuf and his seven companions, all associated with the Jesuits, were among the first missionaries to the native peoples of North America. Their work among the Huron, Iroquois, and Mohawks say little progress while they lived; the natives blamed the “blackrobes” for every misfortune. The missions grew, watered by their blood, which was spilled in various massacres from 1642-1649. In the years that followed, many of the natives accepted Christ, most notably St. Kateri Tekakwitha, who was born in the same village near Auriesville, New York, where three of the martyrs attained their crowns.

St. Paul of the Cross - Tuesday, October 20

Growing up in Ovada, near Genoa, Italy, Paul lost ten of his fifteen siblings to illness. Yet his devout mother made time to read to her eldest son, sharing with him the writings of the Desert Fathers. At seventeen, Paul felt a call to a life of strict penance. In prayer, he conceived the Rule for a new order: men who would embrace monastic austerity as the foundation for their public proclamation of the Passion of our Lord. Paul and his younger brother John began preaching, and others joined them—the first Passionists. Twelve “retreats,” Passionist religious houses, were founded in his lifetime, Paul died in 1775.

St. John Paul II - Thursday, October 22

John Paul II was born Karol Wojtyla in Wadowice, Poland, in 1920. He labored in a quarry during the Nazi occupation of Poland. He served as a priest and then a bishop under the succeeding Soviet regime. Upon his election as pope in 1978, his first words were those of Christ: “Be not afraid.” Later he wrote, “Peoples and nations of the entire world need to hear these words. Their conscience needs to grow in the certainty that Someone exists who holds in his hands the destiny of this passing world....And this Someone is Love—Love that became man, Love Crucified and risen, Love unceasingly present among men.” John Paul II died on April 2, 2005.

Stewardship Awareness

“Render therefore to Caesar the things that are Caesar’s and to God the things that are God’s” Matthew 22:21
Everything we are and everything we have belongs to God. We aren’t “owners” of anything, we are merely “stewards” of the gifts God has given each of us. CIVIL DUTIES

- 1915 As far as possible citizens should take an active part in *public life*. The manner of this participation may vary from one country or culture to another. “One must pay tribute to those nations whose systems permit the largest possible number of the citizens to take part in public life in a climate of genuine freedom.”
- 2238 Those subject to authority should regard those in authority as representatives of God, who has made them stewards of his gifts: “Be subject for the Lord’s sake to every human institution....Live as free men, yet without using your freedom as a pretext for evil; but live as servants of God.” Their loyal collaboration includes the right, and at times the duty, to voice their just criticisms of that which seems harmful to the dignity of persons and to the good of the community.
- 2239 It is the *duty of citizens* to contribute along with the civil authorities to the good of society in a spirit of truth, justice, solidarity, and freedom. The love and service of *one’s country* follow from the duty of gratitude and belong to the order of charity. Submission to legitimate authorities and service of the common good require citizens to fulfill their roles in the life of the political community.
- 2240 Submission to authority and co-responsibility for the common good make it morally obligatory to pay taxes, to exercise the right to vote, and to defend one’s country.
- Pay to all of them their dues, taxes to whom taxes are due, revenue to whom revenue is due, respect to whom respect is due, honor to whom honor is due. Christians reside in their own nations, but as resident aliens. They participate in all things as citizens and endure all things as foreigners....They obey the established laws and their way of life surpasses the laws....So noble is the position to which God has assigned them that they are not allowed to desert it. The Apostle exhorts us to offer prayers and thanksgiving for kings and all who exercise authority, “that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life, godly and respectful in every way.”
- 2255 It is the duty of citizens to work with civil authority for building up society in a spirit of truth, justice, solidarity, and freedom.
