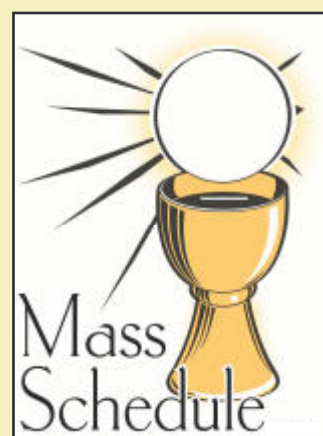

The unity of the new and the old

Which comes first, fasting or feasting? The disciples of John the Baptist were upset with Jesus' disciples because they did not fast. Fasting was one of the three most important religious duties, along with prayer and almsgiving. Jesus gave a simple explanation. There's a time for fasting and a time for feasting (or celebrating).

A time to weep and fast - a time to rejoice and celebrate

To walk as a disciple with Jesus is to experience a whole new joy of relationship akin to the joy of the wedding party in celebrating with the groom and bride their wedding bliss.

But there also comes a time when the Lord's disciples must bear the cross of affliction and purification. For the disciple there is both a time for rejoicing in the Lord's presence and celebrating his goodness and a time for seeking the Lord with humility and fasting and for mourning over sin. Do you take joy in the Lord's presence with you and do you express sorrow and contrition for your sins?

A mind closed to God's wisdom

Jesus goes on to warn his disciples about the problem of the "closed mind" that refuses to learn new things. Jesus used an image familiar to his audience - new and old wine skins. In Jesus' times, wine was stored in wine skins, not bottles. New wine poured into skins was still fermenting. The gases exerted gave pressure. New wine skins were elastic enough to take the pressure, but old wine skins easily burst because they became hard as they aged. What did Jesus mean by this comparison?

The Old Testament points to the New - the New Testament fulfills the Old

Are we to reject the old in place of the new? Just as there is

a right place and a right time for fasting and for feasting, so there is a right place for the old as well as the new. Jesus says *the kingdom of heaven is like a householder who brings out of his treasure what is new and what is old* (Matthew 13:52).

A very common expression, dating back to the early beginnings of the Christian church, states that the New Testament lies hidden in the Old and the Old Testament is unveiled in the New - the two shed light on each other. The New Testament does not replace the Old - rather it unveils and brings into full light the hidden meaning and signs which foreshadow and point to God's plan of redemption which he would accomplish through his Son, Jesus Christ. How impoverished we would be if we only had the Old Testament or the New Testament, rather than both.

New "wine" of the Holy Spirit

The Lord Jesus gives us wisdom so we can make the best use of both the old and the new. He doesn't want us to hold rigidly to the past and to be resistant to the new action of his Holy Spirit in our lives. He wants our minds and hearts to be like the new wine skins - open and ready to receive the *new wine of the Holy Spirit*. Are you eager to grow in the knowledge and understanding of God's word and plan for your life?

"Lord Jesus, fill me with your Holy Spirit that I may grow in the knowledge of your great love and truth. Help me to seek you earnestly in prayer and fasting that I may turn away from sin and willfulness and conform my life more fully to your will. May I always find joy in knowing, loving, and serving you."



Dismissal Policies

If you do not come in a timely manner to pick up your child, he/she will be escorted downstairs to the church hall where he/she will be left with designated personnel. Students in grades 6-8 will be dismissed from their classrooms and do not need to be signed out. If you are unable to pick up your child, we ask that you inform the teacher and please give that person's name to the teacher.

Our Lady of the Rosary – October 7



In the year 1571 the Moslem Empire of Asia, the Ottoman Empire, had reached a point of great power and military might. Spurred on by the desire for conquest, as well as by hatred of the Christian cross, the Moslem forces had attacked and overcome the outer bastions of the Christian world, and were now making threatening gestures at Italy and the

Christian countries bordering the western Mediterranean Sea. Information was at hand that a huge Moslem fleet stood poised and ready to attack. Pope Saint Pius V, recognizing the danger, organized a papal fleet and found a brave and brilliant commander, Don Juan of Austria, to take command. In the early days of October 1571, he sailed to meet the enemy and encountered them in the Bay of Lepanto. Although the Christian troops were heavily outnumbered, skill in maneuver, together with the bravery of the Christian troops, brought about a great victory and the Moslem fleet was all but destroyed. Before and during the decisive battle, the Christian world led by Pope Saint Pius V, invoked the Blessed Virgin in a special way for her assistance; and they were convinced that the victory at Lepanto was a result of Mary's help. The Pope proclaimed a special feast in honor of Our Lady of Victory, to be celebrated on the first Sunday of October.

Two years later Pope Gregory XIII changed the name of this feast to that of the Holy Rosary, honoring the special prayer to which the victory was ascribed.

The celebration of the feast is now observed on October 7, the date of the Battle of Lepanto. Out of this celebration arose the custom of dedicating the entire month of October to Mary and the Rosary, Our Lady of the Rosary, a custom highly sanctioned and approved by succeeding Pontiffs.

Pope Leo XIII, in more modern times, added to the Litany of Loreto the invocation: "Queen of the most holy rosary, pray for us."

The weapons of war have changed drastically since the battle of Lepanto well over 400 years ago; but without doubt the spiritual weapon of the rosary remains as potent for winning the final victory; if only enough people will properly make use of it. At Lourdes and at Fatima Mary appeared to the favored children holding in her hands a rosary. She made it clear to them, and through them to the world, that the frequent and devout recitation of the rosary was the means by which the world could be brought back to God and lasting peace could be achieved. **Our Lady of the Rosary, pray for us.**

27 Domingo Ordinario

Por eso el hombre abandonará a su padre y a su madre, y se unirá a su mujer y serán los dos una sola cosa”



Las lecturas de hoy nos hablan de la institución del matrimonio y de la familia. La primera lectura nos habla del momento maravilloso de la creación del hombre y la mujer y del original plan de Dios para la pareja humana. En el evangelio vemos cómo cuando los fariseos interrogan a Jesús

acerca del divorcio que -como leemos- Moisés había permitido en algunos casos, el Señor insiste en la indisolubilidad del matrimonio, sin hacer excepciones. Y explica que la permisión de Moisés se debió a la terquedad de los hombres, “a la dureza de corazón de ustedes”, pero insiste en que en el principio, antes del pecado, no fue así, y el mismo Jesús recuerda en este pasaje la narración del Génesis, cuando Dios dispuso que hombre y mujer no fueran dos, sino uno solo. La indisolubilidad del matrimonio siempre ha parecido una exigencia muy difícil de cumplir. En efecto, cuando Jesús insiste en ella, los mismos discípulos exclamaron que era preferible no casarse: “Si ésta es la condición del hombre con la mujer, más vale no casarse”. San Pablo corrobora esa difícil enseñanza de Jesús con una curiosa expresión, la cual nos muestra también que los problemas matrimoniales no son exclusivos de nuestra época: “¿Estás casado? No te separes de tu esposa. ¿Eres soltero? No te cases. Pero si te casas, no haces mal, y si una joven se casa, tampoco hace mal. Sin embargo, los que se casan sufren en esta vida muchas tribulaciones, que yo quisiera evitarles” (1 Cor. 7, 27-28).

“El vínculo matrimonial es establecido por Dios mismo, de modo que el matrimonio celebrado y consumado entre bautizados no puede ser disuelto jamás... es una realidad irrevocable... La Iglesia no tiene poder para pronunciarse contra esta disposición de la sabiduría divina”.

En los casos en que se ha pronunciado, lo hace para declarar que el vínculo nunca fue válido (es lo que se llama comúnmente “anulación”); no lo hace, ni puede hacerlo, para disolver el vínculo.
