### “UNTO TO US A CHILD IS GIVEN...” Prophet Isaiah

The celebration of Christmas reminds us of the fulfillment of a promise that God made to his people many times in many different ways over the centuries of religious history. From the stories of Genesis we hear of God’s mercy after sin entered into human existence. God promised that sin would not triumph but that God would send a savior into the world to redeem humankind. In the fullness of time God sent Jesus, born of Mary of Nazareth into the world. This week as we enter into the fourth week of Advent our attention is called to the events of Bethlehem (meaning “house of bread”). In this small town located in what is now Palestinian territory is where Mary and Joseph and shepherds along with angels heralded the birth of Jesus (Emmanuel – “God with us”). Jesus was born in poverty. Jesus was born and lived in the time of occupation by a foreign power (Roman Empire). Jesus and his family were forced to become refugees in Egypt to escape the threats of King Herod. As he “grew in wisdom and grace” Jesus would go forth and become a preacher of God’s Word who risked the wrath of established religious leaders of his day because he did not teach the politically correct message. Jesus would go forth and proclaim himself to be “the light of the world”. Jesus would invite the poor, the hungry, and the blind and lame to come to him and be renewed and refreshed in his presence. Jesus asks those who would be his disciples to forget their possessions in order to possess treasure in a kingdom that will never end.

The life of many people in the world today parallels what Jesus was familiar with. Jesus knew poverty. He knew regimes that terrorize people. He knew the unsettledness of being a refugee. He knew the hatred of those who did not agree with his message. He also knew the poor and those in need were special to him because he saw himself in their faces. Jesus calls his followers to open their eyes and hearts to understand that if you really want to see him we too have to look into the faces of those whom others might forget. As we tell the Christmas story this week and celebrate this Christmas the gift of Jesus, be mindful of the blessings we have received from God and give thanks and do not forget to share the joys and blessings we have received with all our brothers and sisters of the human race for Jesus came among...Fr. ### INSTRUCTIONS FOR EPIPHANY POT LUCK LUNCH... St.

Mark’s Epiphany Pot Luck Lunch is a tradition at St. Mark’s. It’s a wonderful time for all of us to get together after the holidays in a relaxed, stress-free way and to welcome our newest parishioners. Signup sheets are in the gathering space. Please look for the letter of your last name – this will tell you what your family should bring. It’s important to let us know what dish you’ll be bringing to share so we don’t have a lot of duplicates. Plan your dish serving approximately 8-10 people. If it’s a hot dish, please bring it hot, we will have sternos set up, but we are not able to heat things up. Please also bring your dish in the disposable aluminum pans that will fit into the sterno set ups. A half tray size is perfect (approx. 9x13) You can bring your dish when you arrive to the lunch at noon, or drop it off before you go to 11:00 mass and we’ll keep it warm with the sternos.

### FOUR PILLAR OF STEWARDSHIP: 3<sup>rd</sup> of 4 articles

The third pillar is Formation... Christian stewardship is a way of life, a call to be mature disciples of the Lord. It is transforming. It leads us on the road that reaches out to people-the sick, the needy, the hungry or anyone yearning to be closer to God.

### ...IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE SCRIPTURES...4<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Advent, December 19-20

Down through history, God provided us with a roadmap. He foretold various signs and conditions through His prophets. These prophets spoke of things that mankind should watch for so that the Messiah would be recognized and believed. These signs or prophecies were given to us in the Old Testament written hundreds of years before Jesus’ birth. There are over 300 prophecies in the Old Testament that Jesus fulfilled through His life, death and resurrection. For example - The Messiah would be Born in Bethlehem .. The Prophecy - Micah 5:1 ... *But you, Bethlehem-Ephrathaha, least among the clans of Judah, from you shall come forth for me one who is to be ruler in Israel; whose origin is from of old, from ancient times.*

The Fulfillment - Matthew 2:1 “*Jesus was born in the town of Bethlehem in Judea, during the reign of King Herod.*”

About the prophecy: Micah was a late eighth century BC prophet, a contemporary of the prophet Isaiah. Unlike Isaiah, who was a native of the holy city, Micah was an outsider from the countryside and must have been a controversial figure. He would have been unpopular with the leaders whom he condemned and the wealthy whom he criticized. His prophecy was first proclaimed to the exiles after Jerusalem fell and her leading citizens deported to Babylon. Not only did the people of Israel lose their city and its Temple, but they also lost hope when Jerusalem fell. Micah offers hope and deliverance by announcing the grand role to be played by little Bethlehem. In the Gospels, Jesus says the last will be first and the least will be greatest. Such is the fate of Bethlehem, the least of the cities of the Kingdom of Judah’s clans, but the future birthplace of Israel’s Messiah.

### WHY WE ARE CATHOLIC...

We are Catholic because we believe:

To the shepherds, the angel announced the birth of Jesus as the Messiah promised to Israel: “To you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord.” From the beginning he was “the one whom the Father consecrated and sent into the world,” conceived as “holy” in Mary’s virginal womb. God called Joseph to “take Mary as your wife, for that which is conceived in her is of the Holy Spirit,” so that Jesus, “who is called Christ,” should be born of Joseph’s spouse into the messianic lineage of David. The Catechism of the Catholic Church paragraph 437

Paul describes to the Hebrews how Jesus came into the world and offered to do God's will. We were saved through his sacrifice, the only offering sufficient for the sins of the world.

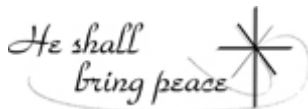
#### Gospel: Luke 1:39-45
