MY DEAR PARISHIONERS,

As we gather on this "first day of the week" to celebrate the Lord Jesus' Holy Resurrection we come to the $33^{\rm rd}$ Sunday in Ordinary Time. Next Sunday we celebrate the last Sunday in the Ordinary Time – Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ King of the Universe and then we will begin Advent Season our preparation for Christmas.

We live between the first and second coming of Jesus. Whether we are dead or alive when Jesus comes again, we believe that he will judge us. In the Creed which we pray every Sunday we proclaim: "He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end."

Jesus' first coming was a rescue mission - to free the human race from slavery to sin and Satan - the father of lies. His second coming will be the final completion of his mission when he will "make all things new" - a new heavens and a new earth - after he has put down the last enemy which is death and restores our lowly bodies to immortality when death will be no more (Daniel 12:2-3).

What lesson does the Lord Jesus want us to learn from the parable of the budding fig tree? The fig tree was a common and important source of food for the Jews. It bore fruit twice a year, in the autumn and in the early spring. This parable foretells the joy of God's kingdom - the joy of new life and the promise of a new age of peace and blessing.

We do not know the day or hour when the Lord will return again in glory. But now in this present age we can experience the first-fruits of the kingdom of God - the abundant new life in the Holy Spirit who dwells within us, and the fruits of the Spirit - love, peace, joy, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control (Galatians 5:22-23) and so many other qualities which the Spirit works within us - thus enabling us to love and serve others with tenderhearted mercy, patience, and goodness. Do we know and experience in our life the first-fruits of the kingdom of God?

"Lord Jesus, fill me with your Holy Spirit that I may radiate the joy of your kingdom and the fire of your love to all I meet and serve. Direct my life to the glory of your name and to the coming of your kingdom."

FROM FR. SLAWOMIR... St. Josaphat – November 18

Bishop and martyr (1580-1623)

St. Josaphat Kuncewycz was born in Ukraine to Orthodox parents. After learning about the Union of Brest (1596), which brought about union between the Ruthenian Orthodox and Catholic Churches, he became an enthusiastic champion of Church unity and converted to the Byzantine rite.

In 1604 Josaphat entered the Basilian Holy Trinity monastery in Vilnius. Eventually he was ordained and became the bishop of Polatsk in Belarus. In this position he continued to preach and speak out for Church union, though his mission provoked increasingly angry opposition from Orthodox opponents.

In 1623 he preached a series of sermons on Church unity in Vitebsk Cathedral. There, on November 12, an angry mob attacked and killed him on the cathedral steps and afterward threw his body in the River Dvina.

Josaphat was canonized in 1867, the first Eastern-rite saint recognized by the Church. He might also be recognized as an avant-grade witness to the spirit of ecumenism.

TEACHING FROM THE CATECHISM OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH - THE SACRAMENTS OF THE CHURCH The Sacrament of the Eucharist

The Liturgical Celebration of the Eucharist

My dear brothers and sisters from the very beginning Christians have brought, along with the bread and wine for the Eucharist, gifts to share with those in need. This custom of the collection, ever appropriate, is inspired by the example of Christ who became poor to make us rich:

Those who are well off, and who are also willing, give as each chooses. What is gathered is given to him who presides to assist orphans and widows, those whom illness or any other cause has deprived of resources, prisoners, immigrants and, in a word, all who are in need.

The anaphora: with the Eucharistic Prayer - the prayer of thanksgiving and consecration - we come to the heart and summit of the celebration:

In the preface, the Church gives thanks to the Father, through Christ, in the Holy Spirit, for all his works: creation, redemption, and sanctification. The whole community thus joins in the unending praise that the Church in heaven, the angels and all the saints, sing to the thrice-holy God.

In the epiclesis, the Church asks the Father to send his Holy Spirit (or the power of his blessing) on the bread and wine, so that by his power they may become the body and blood of Jesus Christ and so that those who take part in the Eucharist may be one body and one spirit (some liturgical traditions put the epiclesis after the anamnesis).

In the institution narrative, the power of the words and the action of Christ, and the power of the Holy Spirit, make sacramentally present under the species of bread and wine Christ's body and blood, his sacrifice offered on the cross once for all.
