Jesus is the son of God

INTRODUCTION

Today we hear Jesus asking his followers a difficult question: "Who do you think I am?" Listen carefully, and see which disciple gave the right answer.

SIGN OF THE CROSS

LIGHT THE CANDLES

GOSPEL (MARK 8:27-35)

One day, while Jesus and his disciples were walking along, he asked them, "Who do people say that I am?" "Some say that you are John the Baptist, or Elijah, or a prophet sent by God," they answered.

Then Jesus asked them, "Who do you think I am?" It was Simon Peter who spoke up and said, "You are Christ, the Son of God."

After this, Jesus began to tell them how he would suffer and die, but would rise again after three days. Simon Peter argued with him, "Lord we must not go to Jerusalem. These things must never happen!" Jesus said to him, "Peter, we must do things God's way, even though it will not be easy."

DISCUSSION

People were uncertain about who Jesus was. Some people confused him with John the Baptist; some people had heard him preaching and thought that he was a prophet; to others, he was simply the son of Joseph and Mary. Jesus appeared differently to different people.

Simon Peter recognized who Jesus really was, and said, "You are Christ, the son of God." The apostles had grown to know and love Jesus. On several occasions they had seen Jesus perform miracles which were only possible through the power of God.

If Jesus asked us the same question today, what would we say? We know that Jesus is the son of God, and savior of the world. His love for us is unending, and he is our best friend.

When Simon Peter heard that Jesus would suffer and die in Jerusalem, he wanted to save him and protect him from harm. But Jesus told him that it is more important to follow God's way than the way we might choose, even though sometimes this can mean putting up with difficult times.

We recognize Jesus, the Son of God. We are called to follow him like Simon Peter, but Jesus warns us that this will not always be easy. Just as he carried the cross for us before his death and resurrection, we will all have our own crosses or difficulties to bear in life. Our reward for this will be to share everlasting life with Christ Jesus.

ACTIVITY

Give each child a cross-shaped badge. Help them to pin these on after they have been colored or decorated.
