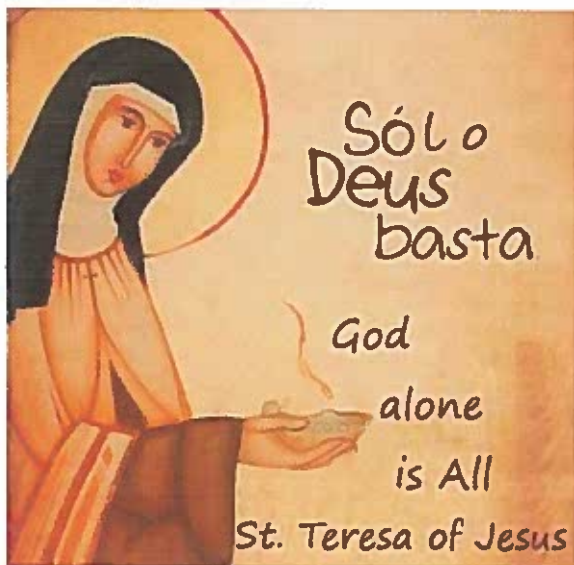

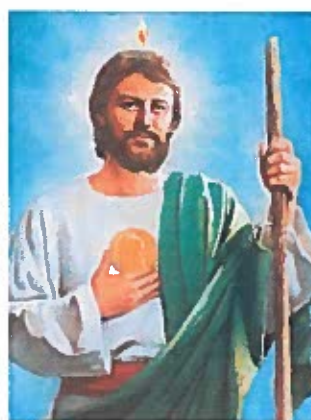

Jesus heals 10 lepers, and one, the Samaritan, returns to give thanks.

**Background on the Gospel Reading**

Today we hear about how Jesus, continuing on his journey to Jerusalem, heals 10 lepers. This story is a lesson about faith and reminds us that faith is sometimes found in unlikely places. Struck with pity, Jesus heals all 10. However, only one is described as glorifying God and returning to thank Jesus. The one who returns is a Samaritan. Samaritans were looked down upon because of the differences between the two communities. It is significant, therefore, that Jesus commends the Samaritan for his faith, which has been his salvation. Throughout Luke's Gospel, faith is found in surprising places. Another lesson for us in this Gospel has to do with salvation. All 10 of the lepers were given the gift of healing, but in his gratitude to God for this gift, the Samaritan found salvation. Our salvation is found in recognizing the gifts we have been given and knowing to whom we must offer our thanks. -*Loyola Press*

**Canonized October 13<sup>th</sup>-**

**St. John Henry Newman**

John Henry Newman, the 19th-century's most important English-speaking Roman Catholic theologian, spent the first half of his life as an Anglican and the second half as a Roman Catholic. He was a priest, popular preacher, writer, and eminent theologian in both Churches. Born in London, England, he studied at Oxford's Trinity College, was a tutor at Oriel College, and for 17 years was vicar of the university church, St. Mary the Virgin. He eventually published eight volumes of Parochial and Plain Sermons as well as two novels. His poem, "Dream of Gerontius," was set to music by Sir Edward Elgar.

After 1833, Newman was a prominent member of the Oxford Movement, which emphasized the Church's debt to the Church Fathers and challenged any tendency to consider truth as completely subjective. Historical research made Newman suspect that the Roman Catholic Church was in closest continuity with the Church that Jesus established. In 1845, he was received into full communion as a Catholic. Two years later he was ordained a Catholic priest in Rome and joined the Congregation of the Oratory, founded three centuries earlier by Saint Philip Neri. Returning to England, Newman founded Oratory houses in Birmingham and London and for seven years served as rector of the Catholic University of Ireland. Newman eventually wrote 40 books and 21,000 letters that survive.

When Newman was named a cardinal in 1879, he took as his motto "Cor ad cor loquitur"—"Heart speaks to heart." He was buried in Rednal 11 years later. After his grave was exhumed in 2008, a new tomb was prepared at the Oratory church in Birmingham. His feast day is October 9<sup>th</sup>.

**REFLEXIÓN:**

Primera Lectura – Del Libro de los Reyes.- En el Antiguo Testamento encontramos historias milagrosas realizadas por los Profetas.- En esta primera lectura vemos la historia de Naamán un jefe del ejército sirio que padecía de lepra y fue curado por el profeta Eliseo con las aguas del río Jordán. El milagro realizado en Naamán nos muestra la sencillez con que Dios hace las cosas y el poder de su palabra.

Segunda Lectura - En esta lectura Pablo continúa alentando a su amigo y hermano en Cristo, Timoteo, sobre la importancia de seguir predicando el Evangelio. En esta lectura se recuerda la gratitud que debemos a Dios por los beneficios de la redención. Aquí Pablo instruye a Timoteo sobre el arduo y siempre escabroso camino del sufrimiento.

Evangelio según San Lucas -La vida de Jesús está llena de Milagros. En algunos pasajes leeremos: los ciegos ven, los cojos andan, los leprosos quedan limpios, etc. Hoy en esta lectura tenemos la historia de cuando Jesús cura a diez leprosos, pero solamente uno regresó a darles las gracias. Era un samaritano, un extranjero. A ése le dijo: tu fe te ha salvado. Porque solamente este fue capaz de dar una respuesta que saliera realmente del Corazón. Mientras los otros se preocupaban por cumplir los trámites legales, él no pensó más que agradecer a Dios, allí mismo donde la gracia de Dios lo había encontrado: esta es la fe que nos salva y nos transforma.

Con el episodio de los diez leprosos, Lucas nos muestra el poder de Dios y el agradecimiento con el que se debe responder a todo lo que Dios hace a nuestro favor.
