First Reading

Sirach 15:15–20

Today's reading comes from the section of Sirach's writing on man's free will and responsibility. The eyes of God see all he has made.

Responsorial Psalm

Psalm 119:1–2,4–5, 17–18,33–34

Happy are those who walk in the way of the Lord.

Second Reading

1 Corinthians 2:6–10

Last week we heard Saint Paul address how his preaching illustrates the fact that man's strength and wisdom are nothing compared to those of God. Today we hear him tell of the true wisdom of God. God has revealed this wisdom to us through the Spirit.

Gospel Reading

Matthew 5:17–37

I have not come to abolish the law and the prophets but to fulfill them.

Background on the Gospel Reading

The Gospel is from St. Matthew 5:17-37.

In this Sermon on the Mount, we have various sayings of Christ, actually spoken on different occasions. Matthew, in his systematic manner, has gathered these sayings into one continuous discourse here. This makes it easier for his readers to grasp the new order of salvation as inaugurated by Christ. For the most part, the Pharisees, put all the stress on the letter of the law and on its external observance. Christ's opening statement, that the attitude of his followers towards the commandments (and other precepts of the law) must be different, and superior to that of the Pharisees.

Christ is not abolishing the ten commandments, but he is demanding of his followers a more perfect, a more sincere, fulfillment of them. The whole moral value of any legal observance (the Mosaic law included), comes from the interior disposition of him who observes or keeps the law. No man serves or honors God by any exterior acts, be they ever so arduous or continuous, unless these acts proceed from an intention and a will to honor and please God. This is the charter, the constitution, of the new law, Christianity. The old law is not abolished but deepened and given a new life.

REFLEXIÓN:

Primera Lectura – Del Libro del Eclesiástico.
El Eclesiástico es un libro con enseñanzas muy profundas. En esta lectura da énfasis en dar a la persona la libertad de escoger sobre el bien y el mal. Dios pone ante nosotros fuego y agua. Echa a mano lo que quieras. Así se nos indica el camino para encontrar la verdadera felicidad, que es el cumplimiento diligente de la Ley de Dios.

Segunda Lectura - De Pablo a los Corintios.
Pablo en esta lectura habla de la sabiduría, pero no de la sabiduría de este mundo, sino de una sabiduría divina y misteriosa, revelada por Dios en Cristo y por medio del Espíritu. Estas palabras son un estímulo para todos los creyentes, especialmente para los agentes pastorales, deseosos de dar a su acción un gran impulso espiritual, sin buscar éxitos personales y humanos, sino solo el Reino de Dios y su Justicia.

Evangelio según San Mateo - En este evangelio Jesús nos habla del cumplimiento de la Ley. Él afirma que no viene a abolir la ley Antigua, sino a que se cumpla. Pero Jesús quiere que sea una ley más completa, perfecta. Pero con esto no se trata de renovar las leyes religiosas o de dar más mandamientos; más bien nos invita a interiorizar el Espíritu de la Ley, o sea el Espíritu de la Ley verdadera. Jesús nos pide que seamos más precisos en el cumplimiento de la Ley ya que en la actualidad esas leyes forman parte de nuestra vida.

El que no cumpla hasta lo más mínimo de la Ley, no entrará al Reino.

En este concepto habrán muchos que pondrán excusas para no cumplir con la ley, otros en cambio al cumplir con la ley, no pensarán haber encontrado un camino más fácil, sino el llamado a una vida más perfecta.
