Individuals living in the same house or family units may sit together, others must remain six feet apart. Those at risk during this crisis, especially those age 65 or older, should strongly consider using the dispensation. Streaming each week's liturgy continues at stmary.church/masses or facebook.com/stmary.life.

Because of public health regulations, we may not be able to seat everyone who wishes to attend mass. We will do our best to avoid this circumstance, but it is possible we will be compelled by regulations to restrict admittance.

From Deacon John...

In this time of upheaval and hate among fellow citizens when discovering paths to agreement and unity seem so urgent, the gospel of the day echoes Jesus' words expressing division and separation. We read He is the source of conflict between parent and child, husband and wife, brother and sister. Jesus promotes individualism knowing that hatred will be an outcome. It is a paradox of Christianity that love between peoples comes only through diversity. Though Jesus is the definition of love, any return, expression or sharing of that love can only exist when individuality and personal freedom exists. Chesterton describes Christianity as the giant who cuts off his arm that it might shake hands with itself. Acceptance, let alone love, of any neighbor is impossible unless we first bind ourselves to Jesus, the single font of unconditional love.

Es una paradoja del cristianismo que el amor entre los pueblos solo viene a través de la diversidad. Aunque Jesús es la definición del amor, cualquier retorno, expresión o compartir ese amor solo puede existir cuando existe la individualidad y la libertad personal. Chesterton describe al cristianismo como el gigante que se corta el brazo para poder estrecharle la mano. La aceptación, y mucho menos el amor, de cualquier prójimo es imposible a menos que primero nos unamos a Jesús, la fuente única del amor incondicional.

Background on the Gospel Reading

Today's Gospel is the conclusion of the instructions and consolations that we have heard Jesus offering to his disciples during the past few weeks. In this passage, Jesus summarizes both the costs of discipleship and its rewards. Once again our understanding of the Gospel is strengthened by considering the context in which it was written and the perspective of Matthew's audience.

The conditions of discipleship outlined in Matthew's Gospel may appear harsh. Yet they underline for us a truth—choosing anything with one's whole heart has consequences. Choosing life with Christ means that every relationship we have must be understood from a new perspective. For many in Matthew's community, this choice brought division to their family.

Matthew also outlines the reward of hospitality offered to Jesus' followers. In today's Gospel, Jesus explains the difficulties of discipleship, yet reveals that those who welcome the disciples have also welcomed him.

Today's Gospel also highlights for us the importance of hospitality in the Christian life. To

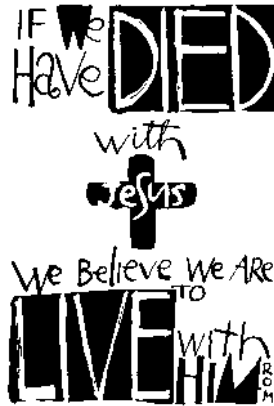
welcome another in Jesus' name is to extend hospitality to Jesus himself. We have many opportunities in our daily life to reach out to others, to be a welcoming presence and a sign of God's love.

Family Connection

One can tell a lot about a family by the way they welcome others into their home.

Despite parental efforts to elicit the best behavior from their children, family efforts to entertain guests are sometimes difficult. Practicing a spirit of Christian hospitality within the family can be an occasion to reflect upon the importance of this virtue. A family spirit of hospitality is a sign of faith.

Then encourage family members to talk about what it means to be a good guest or a good host. You might also talk about ways in which your family's hospitality might be improved upon. Conclude in prayer together that your family grows to be one in which Christian hospitality is experienced by all.

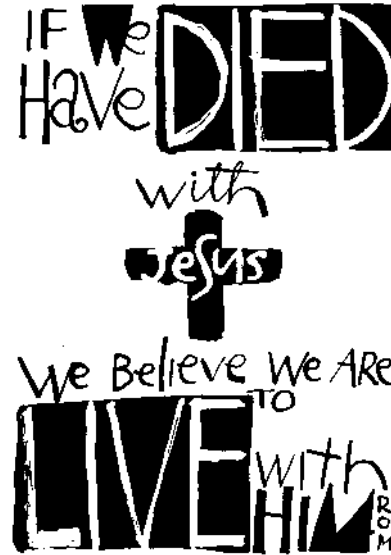
