From Deacon John...

Today's Gospel passage begins with a description of Christ's Second Coming, "He will sit upon his glorious throne, and all the nations will be assembled before him." Then the moment of judgment will come. This judgment will be based not on how influential we became in society, how high we climbed the corporate ladder, nor any "worldly" achievements. Rather our judgment will be based on how we treated those around us, whom Jesus calls His brothers. "Amen, I say to you, whatever you did for one of the least brothers of mine, you did for me." Jesus gives specifics, feeding the hungry, giving drink to the thirsty, showing hospitality to the stranger, caring for the ill and imprisoned. These must be our priorities, too. The more we embrace a stewardship way of life, the more closely our priorities will align with Christ.

El mensaje del Evangelio comienza con una descripción de la segunda venida de Cristo: "Cuando el Hijo del Hombre venga en su gloria, se sentará en su trono glorioso, y todas las naciones se reunirán ante él". Entonces llegará el momento del juicio. Este juicio no se basará en cuán influyentes nos volvimos en la sociedad, cuán alto subimos en la escalera corporativa, ni en ningún logro "mundano". Más bien, nuestro juicio se basará en cómo tratamos a quienes nos rodean, a quienes Jesús llama Sus hermanos. "En verdad, les digo que todo lo que hicieron por uno de mis hermanos más pequeños, lo hicieron por mí". Jesús da detalles, alimenta a los hambrientos, da de beber a los sedientos, muestra hospitalidad al extraño, cuida a los enfermos y presos. Estas también deben ser nuestras prioridades. Cuanto más adoptemos un estilo de vida de coresponsabilidad, más estrechamente se alinearán nuestras prioridades con Jesucristo.

Background on the Gospel Reading

Today's Gospel passage is the conclusion of Jesus' discourse with his disciples. It is about the end of time, the coming of the Son of Man, and the final judgment. We hear this description of the final judgment at the conclusion of our liturgical year, the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ the King. In the context of Matthew's Gospel, this passage might also be read as a conclusion of Matthew's report on Jesus' life and ministry; the remaining chapters report the events of Jesus' Passion and Resurrection.

In today's Gospel, Jesus describes to his disciples the scene of the judgment of the Son of Man. All the nations will be assembled before him, and he will separate them as a shepherd separates sheep and goats upon their return from the pasture. The judgments made by the Son of Man will be based upon the acts of mercy shown to the least ones—the hungry, the thirsty, the naked, the ill, and the imprisoned. Indeed, Jesus, who suffered on the Cross, identifies himself with the least ones.

Recall that last week's parable of the talents

taught us that the gifts that we have been given are intended to be used for the service of others, especially the least among us. Our judgment before God will be based not only on how we have used these gifts and talents, but also on how we have extended ourselves in service to these least ones. Indeed, Jesus tells us that whenever we have served these least ones, we have served Christ himself.

When we read today's Gospel in the context of the chapters that follow in Matthew's Gospel, we learn the extent to which Jesus identifies with the least ones. In accepting death on the cross, Jesus shows himself to be one of the hungry, the naked, the ill, and the imprisoned. To accept Jesus is to accept him who suffered and died on the Cross as one of the least ones.

Family Connection

Jesus teaches us that we will be judged on only one thing: the acts of mercy we have shown to the least among us. Jesus identifies with the least ones; thus we serve Jesus whenever we serve one of the least ones. The Church calls the actions that Jesus described in today's Gospel the Corporal Works of Mercy. These works are to feed the hungry, to clothe the naked, to bury the dead, to shelter the homeless, to visit the sick and imprisoned, and to give alms to the poor. In these actions we show God's compassion and mercy to those in need.

Why it is important that we do these things. Because whenever we show mercy to another person, we show mercy to Jesus himself. Perhaps, choose a work of mercy you will act upon this week such that your family will see and serve Jesus in the least ones among us.
