



St. Joseph Catholic Church Endowment Stewardship

"Just so, your light must shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your heavenly Father." (Matthew 5:16) This gospel passage calls us to charity. We have an opportunity to live this gospel message by supporting the future of our parish community.

Many parishes in our diocese receive significant financial support through established endowment funds with The Catholic Foundation. As endowment funds grow, it is common for a parish and its ministries to receive \$50,000 to \$250,000 or more each year. Our parish has received as much as \$26,000 in a year from endowments and grants through *The Catholic Foundation*. As we look to the future of our parish needs, it is important to grow our endowment funds to be a perpetual source of funding. Our parish currently has 4 endowment funds:

- St. Joseph Parish, St. Vincent de Paul Society Endowment Fund \$21,522.93

 This fund shall provide scholarship assistance to deserving elementary and high school students of St. Joseph and Sacred Heart Parishes in Plain City, Ohio.
- McGuire Endowment Fund \$19.32
 This fund shall provide for the operating needs of St. Joseph Parish, Plain City, Ohio.
- Fr. Edward Fitzgerald St. Joseph Parish Endowment \$5,698.00

 This fund shall provide for the general needs of the St. Joseph Parish, Plain City, Ohio.

Year of Mercy

In preparation for the Jubilee Year of Mercy, Pope Francis has repeatedly stressed the importance of the corporal and spiritual works of mercy. In the *Bull of Indiction* he wrote:



"It is my burning desire that, during this Jubilee, the Christian people may reflect on the corporal and spiritual works of mercy."

He brought the subject up again in a letter to the Pontifical Council for the Promotion of the New Evangelization. He gave his appeal even more weight by confirming the promise of a Jubilee Indulgence for performing such merciful acts:

"I have asked the Church in this Jubilee Year to rediscover the richness encompassed by the spiritual and corporal works of mercy. The experience of mercy, indeed, becomes visible in the witness of concrete signs as Jesus himself taught us. Each time that one of the faithful personally performs one or more of these actions, he or she shall surely obtain the Jubilee Indulgence."

We must act like arrows, pointing to the truth, bringing these precious souls to those who can instruct them properly. Also, as parents, we have the duty to instruct our children in the Faith to the best of our ability. When our knowledge fails, we turn to the Church for assistance.

Instructing the ignorant must not be done lightly as the fate of a person's soul hangs in the balance.


Bring a water bottle and dress to move. Mats, kettle bells and other equipment will be provided.



THE JUBILEE YEAR OF MERCY



Dear Brothers and Sisters:

In our catechesis for this Holy Year of Mercy, we now consider the Gospel account of the calling of Saint Matthew. Jesus not only invites a tax-collector, a public sinner, to be



his disciple, but also sits at table with him, thus scandalizing the Pharisees. The Lord then explains that he has come to call not the righteous but sinners. The calling of Matthew reminds us that when Christ makes us his disciples, he does not look to our past but to the future. We need but respond to his call with a humble and sincere heart. Jesus invites us to sit with him at the table of the Eucharist, in which he purifies us by the power of his word and by the sacrament unites us ever more deeply to himself. Citing the prophet Hosea, he tells us that what God desires is "mercy, not sacrifice", true conversion of heart and not merely formal acts of religion. May all of us, acknowledging our sins, respond more generously to the Lord's invitation to sit at table with him, and with one another, with immense gratitude for his infinite mercy and saving love.
