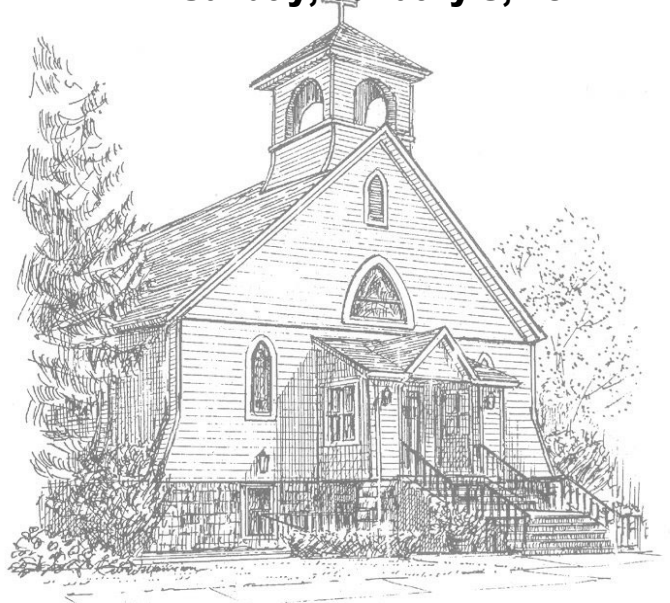

Learning in Utero

Science Daily reported in January that "newborns are much more attuned to the sounds of their native language than first thought. In fact, these linguistic whizzes can pick up on the distinctive sounds of their mother tongue while in utero, a new study has concluded. 'We have known for over 30 years that we begin learning prenatally about voices by listening to the sound of our mother talking,' said Christine Moon, a professor of psychology at Pacific Lutheran University. 'This is the first study that shows we learn about the particular speech sounds of our mother's language before we are born. This study moves the measurable result of experience with individual speech sounds from 6 months of age to before birth.'"

QUESTION:

Are Catholics still required to fast prior to reception of Holy Communion? The General Rule is that Catholics **should fast for one hour** from solid food and beverages, with the exception of water, before going to Holy Communion. The period of fast is reduced for those who are sick, in the hospital, advanced in age and for those caring for them.

DEFEAT GLOBAL TERRORISM

How do you defeat a global terrorist organization like ISIS, whose members are largely hidden throughout the world, and are willing to die in suicide bombings for their diabolical goals of worldwide mass murder and destruction? The ultimate answer is through prayer. The battle against ISIS is, at its roots, a spiritual battle against the Devil and the forces of darkness.

Suddenly, Jesus appeared to the bishop with a sword in his hand. When Jesus handed the sword to the bishop, it turned into a Rosary. Jesus repeated three times: "Boko Haram gone." This confirms that it is heaven's directive that we battle and defeat ISIS through the power of the Rosary.

In this worldwide expression of prayer and unity, please add your name as a sign of your commitment to pray the Rosary daily to defeat ISIS. Let us entrust the spiritual defeat of ISIS to the most powerful intercession of Mary, the Spiritual Mother of all peoples and the Mediatrix of all graces.

The Pink Sisters

PHILADELPHIA — For more than 100 years, the cloistered nuns known as the Pink Sisters have worked in shifts to ensure nonstop prayer in Philadelphia’s Chapel of Divine Love.

Now, to address their shrinking numbers and ensure their prayers continue for another century, the Roman Catholic Holy Spirit Adoration sisters have begun quietly reaching out, seeking to grow their order while carefully maintaining their secluded life.

In the last year, they hung a banner outside their chapel and convent as a way to let other people know about their daily public Masses. They’ve granted more interviews with news reporters. And they have begun inviting Catholic women’s organizations and schools to speak to the sisters — with all conversations taking place through the grille in the convent visiting room, of course.

There’s even a subtle recruitment flier hanging just inside the front door of the chapel. It encourages visitors to ask themselves three questions: Do you love Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament? Do you realize the power of prayer before the Blessed Sacrament? Is Jesus calling you to say “yes” to a life of prayer before the Blessed Sacrament?

“We rarely reached out for vocation promotion before the centennial. But now we want young ladies to see how beautiful the life is and how truer the joy when it is without the trappings of material things,” said Sister Maria Clarissa, 55. “We do our part in addressing these challenges, but at the same time, we leave it to the Lord. He’s the one who calls.”

There were once as many as 40 nuns living in the Philadelphia convent. Now there are 20: The youngest is 52, and the oldest is 90. The order was founded in Holland in 1896 with a focus on the perpetual adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, the consecrated bread they uphold as the body and blood of Christ. The rose-hued habits are meant to symbolize the joy the sisters feel honoring the Holy Spirit.

In 1915, nine of the original sisters left the motherhouse and came to Philadelphia, where they were invited to open the order’s second convent. Today there are about 420 Holy Spirit Adoration sisters living in 22 convents in 12 countries. There are three other US convents — in St. Louis; Corpus Christi, Texas; and Lincoln, Nebraska.

It may come as a surprise to some that a group of 20 nuns live a contemplative, secluded life not far from Philadelphia’s famed museums, historic landmarks and government. The sisters leave the cloister only for emergencies, such as medical appointments. When they do venture out, the sisters wear gray so as not to draw too much attention to themselves.

It is a selfless life, focused on offering intercessory prayers on behalf of people they will never meet living in places they will never see. They pray most of the day, together and individually in shifts before the Blessed Sacrament, generally waking up at 5:15 a.m. to prepare for the first daily service, going to bed after the 8 p.m. final prayers.

All the sisters have jobs. Some craft Mass cards and rosaries, the sales of which support the convent. Other sisters respond to letters and answer the phones. Some callers are lonely; others are suicidal. Just listening, the sisters say, seems to make a difference.

Sister Mary Angelica, 55, said she wants people who have lost touch with their faith to know there is always someone praying for them, “no matter what their need may be.”

An Uncommon Error

Along with the frontal assault on public Christmas displays, there is a concerted effort to remove any quotidian mention of Christ’s birth or life. According to these revisionists, Jesus’ existence must be expunged from the historical record. One means to their end is changing the standard nomenclature of BC and AD to BCE and ACE, that is from Before Christ and Anno Domini (Year of the Lord) to the utterly ambiguous Before the Common Era and After the Common Era.

Elizabeth Ann Seton

Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton feast was celebrated this past week January 4, She was the first American born Saint and in her brief life, (she died at just 46) Mother Seton had been a Protestant who hobnobbed with the rich and powerful; she even hosted George Washington's 1797 birthday bash! After her husband's shipping business crashed, also wrecking his health, she became a bankrupt widow at 30 with five children, two of whom predeceased her. After converting to Catholicism, she was disowned and scorned by her family; thus she's the very busy patron saint of those with irksome in-laws. Dirt poor, this determined "working mother" persisted in her dream of laying the groundwork for the USA's Catholic School system. Ever obedient to God's will, even when it meant embracing many bitter crosses, she remained faithful and strong; she often had to confront and challenge government leaders and bishops, but never became a bitter, radical feminist. The orations for her feast day, the day she died (January 4, 1821), offer further spiritual food for reflection on her heroic life.

Daily service. In a pep talk to her Sisters, Mother Seton said, "The first end I propose in our daily work is to do the will of God; secondly, to do it in the manner He wills it; and thirdly, to do it because it is His will." Unlike many of us, Mother Seton did not work simply to pay the bills, put food on the table, or clothes on the kids; nor was she saving up so she could go back to the days of wining and dining, traveling, and enjoying the latest fad or creature comforts. She strove to live by Christ's words, "Do not work for what perishes but what endures for eternal life." (John 6:27a) Like her, we are called to help build up God's Kingdom on earth. What are you doing to know God's will, and thus please God by living the words we so often pray, "Thy will be done?"

Daily Eucharist. The Protestant community she was baptized into had, and still has, an "almost Catholic" understanding of the Eucharist. But since they lack Apostolic Succession, the outward unity with the Pope and Bishops and Church teaching, they do not have what Catholic would consider a valid Eucharist. One of the main reasons Mother Seton converted was so she could receive, or at least pray before, our Lord's Real Presence in the Sacrament every day! As she once wrote, "To receive the Daily Bread and to do the Sacred Will – that is fixed point." So should it be with us; for at each Mass we are more deeply inserted into the mystery of Christ and His life-giving sacrifice.

Daily Meditation. We say, "Grace builds on nature", for God never forces Himself upon us. Instead, God invites us, each day, to discover our gifts and talents, and to consider how we can use them to meet the world's needs and concerns, challenges, and woes. Each Eucharist graces us with the divine help we need to follow Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton's example of total dedication to serving God...through others!

A coin left on a headstone lets the deceased soldier's family know that somebody stopped by to pay their respect. Leaving a penny means you visited. A nickel means that you and the deceased soldier trained at boot camp together. If you served with the soldier, you leave a dime. A quarter is very significant because it means that you were there when that soldier died.
