He calls himself Father

Human fatherhood can give us an inkling of what God is; but where fatherhood no longer exists, where genuine fatherhood is no longer experienced as a phenomenon that goes beyond the biological dimension to embrace a human and intellectual sphere as well, it becomes meaningless to speak of God the Father ... Where fatherhood is perceived only as a biological accident on which no genuinely human claims may be based, or the father is seen as a tyrant whose yoke must be thrown off, something in the basic structure of human existence has been damaged. If human existence is to be complete, we need a father, in the true meaning of fatherhood... namely, a responsibility for one's child that does not dominate him but permits him to become his own self ... Responsibility for one's child means the desire that he realize his own innermost truth, which lies in his Creator. And naturally, a fatherhood of this kind is possible only if one accepts one's own status as a child ... If men are to be fathers in the correct way, they must assent in their heart to the words of Jesus: "You have only one Father, who is heaven" (Mt 23,9) ... Here, of course, another point is important: the fact that the primary biblical image of God is the "Father" also means that the mystery of motherhood, too, has its origin in him... Man is not God's "image" (Gn 1,27) as an abstraction, for that would lead in turn only to an abstract God. He is God's image in his concrete reality, which is relationship.

Fathers Day Saints!

St. Joseph, a simple hardworking carpenter, was chosen by God to be the father of Jesus on earth. As such he was the guardian and defender of Jesus and Mary. According to Pope Leo XIII, "St. Joseph, by his work, regularly earned what was necessary for Mary and Jesus' nourishment and clothing." When an angel appeared to Joseph warning him that Herod sought to kill his Child, St. Joseph guarded Jesus and Mary and led them to Egypt. In Nazareth Jesus obeyed St. Joseph and was subject to his paternal authority.

"Saint Joseph was a just man, a tireless worker, the upright guardian of those entrusted to his care. May he always guard, protect and enlighten families entrusted to his care." —St. Pope John Paul II

St. Joachim was the father of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Tradition holds that Joachim and his wife, Anne, first lived in Galilee and then settled in Jerusalem, where Mary was born to them in their latter years. Since St. Joachim was the grandfather of Jesus, he is considered a patron saint for grandfathers.

St. Maximilian Kolbe (1894-1941) gave his life so that a father could live. For this reason, the Franciscan priest is considered a patron saint for fathers. Because of his work as an editor for a controversial religious publication, St. Maximilian was arrested by the Nazis and imprisoned in Warsaw in 1941. When Francis Gajowniczek, a father with young children, was chosen to die at the camp, Maximilian volunteered to take his place so that the father could look after his family.

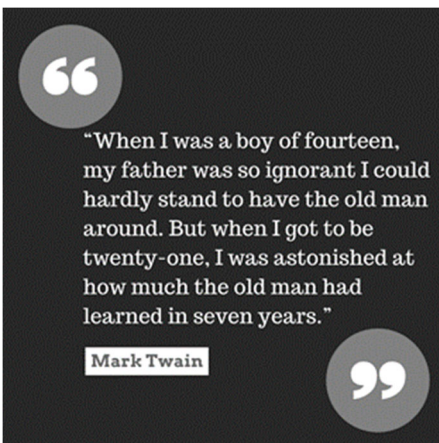
DID YOU KNOW?

Four of the Twelve Apostles had Greek names. The name of Andrew, the first-called (protoclete) among the Twelve, and the elder brother of St. Peter, is derived from the Greek word andros, which means "man." The name Philip is derived from the Greek compound word philippos, which means "fond of horses." The name Bartholomew, which is actually a surname, is derived from the Greek word Ptolemy. This was the name of Alexander the Great's Macedonian general who was the conqueror of Egypt. It was he who gave his name to the Egyptian dynasty of the Ptolemy (323-23 BC), which supplanted the Pharaohs of old. Bar is the Aramaic word for "son of." Matthew is a Greek name that means "accumulator of things." This apostle, writer of the first Gospel, (who called himself "the publican"), is referred to by his Hebrew name, Levi, by the two other synoptic evangelists. The Apostle Thomas' name is derived from the Aramaic word for "twin" and is translated three times in St. John's Gospel into the Greek equivalent Didymus. St. Peter's Hebrew name was Simon. Our Lord changed his name to "Cephas," which is translated into the Greek word petros (rock). Therefore, St. Peter did not originally have a Greek name, as did the first four Apostles mentioned. It was common for the Jews who lived in Galilee during our Lord's mortal lifetime, especially those that settled along the trade routes frequented by the gentiles, to have Greek names in addition to their Hebrew names. All of the other Apostles, the two James (the Greater and the Less), John, the other Simon (the Canaanite), Jude, and Matthias, have Hebrew names. Respectively: James is the English rendering of the Hebrew Jacob, which means "one who seizes by the heel, i.e., supplanter"; John is from the Hebrew Jonas, which means "graced by God"; Simon, or Shimon, in Hebrew means "heard"; Jude is, of course, from Juda (Jew), the royal line from Jacob (the latter's name was changed by an angel to Israel, which means "strong with God"). Juda means "celebrated"; and, finally there is Matthias, which means "gift of the Lord."

A little humor ...

A father was at the beach with his children when his four-year-old son Tommy ran up to him, grabbed his hand, and led him to the shore, where a seagull lay dead in the sand. "Daddy, what happened to him?" Tommy asked. "He died and went to Heaven," the dad replied. Tommy thought a moment and then said, "Did God throw him back down?"

After the church service a little boy told the pastor, "When I grow up, I'm going to give you some money." "Well, thank you," the pastor replied, "but why?" "Because my daddy says you're one of the poorest preachers we've ever had."

DID YOU KNOW?

The custom of signing an "X" as a sign of affection at the conclusion of a letter is actually a Medieval usage that expressed a sacred promise to fulfill one's obligations in the name of St. Andrew the Apostle. Tradition has it that those Christians who were unable to write used to draw this symbol in place of their own name on necessary documents. The signer then kissed the letter to affirm his sincerity in the same way that one kissed the Bible when taking an oath. The "X" was used to honor St. Andrew who was martyred in Achaia, Greece on a cruciform shaped cross.

THE REAL NAME

The original name of Los Angeles, California, as a Franciscan mission, was El Pueblo de Nuestra Senora la Reina de los Angeles de Portiuncula (The Village of our Lady Queen of the Angels of the Portiuncula). The Portiuncula was the original chapel built by Saint Francis of Assisi after receiving God's command to "rebuild My Church." The seal of the city of Los Angeles is encircled by a seven-decade rosary, which was the traditional number of decades on the Franciscan crown. The late Walter O'Malley, the first owner of the L.A. Dodgers, said that when he designed Dodger stadium he surrounded the park with cypress trees in seven groups of ten (one Our Father tree spaced between each) to honor our Lady's Rosary as it was portrayed on her city's seal.
