### **king who learned from THE KING to reign over himself first**

In 1917, the Holy City was captured from the Turks and came under the control of a Christian power for the first time since the crusading era. The British commander, General Edmund Allenby, had a deep respect for Jerusalem's sacred heritage, and was unwilling to make his own entry in a manner similar to that of the "King of Kings." Thus, on December 11, 1917, eschewing all elevation upon the backs of horses, or even donkeys, Allenby and his men made their formal entry into the conquered city on foot and in silence. Exactly eight years later, Pope Pius XI promulgated his great encyclical, *Quas Primas*, on the rightful sovereignty of Christ over every human society.

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There was once a king who decided to hold a great race. And all the young men of the kingdom entered. The course began and ended in the king's courtyard, and the prize was a bag of gold. As they ran the race the runners were surprised to find a great pile of stones blocking their way, but they managed to climb over or around it. Finally all the runners but one had crossed the finish line, but still the king did not end the race. Finally a lone runner stumbled through the gate. "I'm sorry I'm late, O king, but you see I discovered this pile of rocks in the road" and here he held up a bleeding hand, "and I injured myself removing them. But O king", and here he held up the other hand, "underneath I found this bag of gold." "You have won the race", said the king, "for that one runs best who makes the way safe for others." That's the reason for "keeping our eye on Jesus, the author and perfecter". For he has run the race too.

### **GIVING TREE 2020**

Due to the pandemic, this year the Giving Tree will take a different shape. The Program Coordinator has asked us for **Gift cards only - NO PRESENTS**. We ask you to provide: Bank cards, Visa or Master cards. *They are good because they can be used anywhere*. Please take a tag from a tree, be sure to tape the tag to the gift card and indicate the amount. There will be a drop box in Church or you may use the Rectory mail slot. **Tags MUST be returned by December 6th**. There will still be tags for Shop-Rite cards which we add to each family's package.

This year we are helping two other charities, HEARTS OF JOY and NEW HOPE PREGNANCY CENTER, INC. These tags will instead have a gift request. They will also be on the trees and have the same time frame.

### **The Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe**

The solemnity of Christ the King was established by Pope Pius XI in 1925 as an antidote to secularism, a way of life which leaves God out of man's thinking and living and organizes his life as if God did not exist. The solemnity is intended to proclaim in a striking and effective manner Christ's royalty over individuals, families, society, governments, and nations.

Today's Mass establishes the titles for Christ's royalty over men: 1) Christ is God, the Creator of the universe and hence wields a supreme power over all things; "All things were created by Him" 2) Christ is our Redeemer, He purchased us by His precious Blood, and made us His property and possession; 3) Christ is Head of the Church, "holding in all things the primacy"; 4) God bestowed upon Christ the nations of the world as His special possession and dominion.

Today's Mass also describes the qualities of Christ's kingdom. This kingdom is: 1) supreme, extending not only to all peoples, but also to their princes and kings 2) universal, extending to all nations and to all places 3) eternal, for "The Lord shall sit as King forever" 4) spiritual, Christ's "kingdom is not of this world".

**Quas Primas:** In the first Encyclical Letter which we addressed at the beginning of our Pontificate to the Bishops of the universal Church, we referred to the chief causes of the difficulties under which mankind was laboring. And we remember saying that these manifold evils in the world were due to the fact that the majority of men had thrust Jesus Christ and His holy law out of their lives; that these had no place either in private affairs or in politics: and we said further, that as long as individuals and states refused to submit to the rule of our Savior, there would be no really hopeful prospect of a lasting peace among nations. Men must look for the peace of Christ in the Kingdom of Christ; and that we promised to do as far as lay in our power. In the Kingdom of Christ, that is, it seemed to us that peace could not be more effectually restored nor fixed upon a firmer basis than through the restoration of the Empire of Our Lord. We were led in the meantime to indulge the hope of a brighter future at the sight of a more widespread and keener interest evinced in Christ and His Church, the one Source of Salvation, a sign that men who had formerly spurned the rule of our Redeemer and had exiled themselves from His kingdom were preparing, and even hastening, to return to the duty of obedience. Encyclical of Pope Pius XI December 11, 1925

**Indulgence for Solemnity of Christ the King:** A partial indulgence is granted to the faithful, who piously recite the Act of Dedication of the Human Race to Jesus Christ King. A plenary indulgence is granted, if it is recited publicly on the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ King.

### **Prayers to Christ the King:**

O Jesus Christ, I acknowledge Thee as universal King. All that has been made, has been created for Thee. Exercise all Thy rights over me. I renew my baptismal vows, renouncing Satan, his pomps and his works; and I promise to live as a good Christian. In particular do I pledge myself to labor, to the best of my ability, for the triumph of the rights of God and Thy Church.

Divine Heart of Jesus, to Thee do I proffer my poor services, laboring that all hearts may acknowledge Thy Sacred Kingship, and that thus the reign of Thy peace be established throughout the whole universe. Amen.

**Thanksgiving and the Holy Eucharist**

Finally, as Catholics, Thanksgiving means much more than being grateful to God for the food He provides the body. It is a day that we can dedicate to a higher Thanksgiving, a *Eucharistia* (a Greek word meaning "Good Thanks") for the Holy Sacrament of His love, the pledge of our eternal life.


Coincidentally, this raises the question of Lincoln's choice of a Thursday for the holiday feast. Why Thursday? I would like to know the answer to that, but I don't. Maybe a reader can supply that information. This we all do know: The Holy Eucharist was instituted by Christ on the Thursday before Passover. Educated Protestants, especially American Protestants, of the mid-nineteenth century knew more about the Catholic religion than most Catholics today. That is a sad fact. Free thinker that he was, and not even Christian in his views about the divinity of Christ, Thomas Jefferson was well acquainted with the writings of Saint Robert Bellarmine for one, and perhaps some other Catholic writers. This was not unusual in his day. Unless a Protestant was raised in a remote mountain hamlet and had no access to anything Catholic, he would certainly know that Catholics celebrated the Last Supper on Holy Thursday as a feast of the "Holy Eucharist." They knew the meaning of the word "Eucharist." Could that latent knowledge of a word only Catholics and "high churchmen" used have motivated Lincoln to choose a Thursday for a national day of Thanksgiving. I can hardly doubt it.

**Why Giving Thanks is Good for You**

The average American will consume 3,000 calories eating dinner on Thanksgiving Day. Drinks, dessert, and appetizers can bring the total count to 4,500. Experts warn us that half the weight we gain during the holidays can stay with us into next summer. Now aren't you glad it's Thanksgiving Day? Actually, we should be. "Happy Thanksgiving" is more than a wish for today - it's a fact: those who give thanks are happier than those who don't.

Studies show that those who give thanks are happier than those who don't. Neuroscientists have discovered that thankful thoughts not only produce pleasure in the brain, but stimulate areas of the brain regulating stress as well. Multiple studies have connected gratitude with resilience from post-traumatic stress for Vietnam War veterans and 9/11 survivors, likeliness to exhibit patience and self-control, college students slept longer and better, couples tend to be more committed to each other and are more likely to remain in their relationships. In short, thanksgiving is good for us, and the spiritual benefits of gratitude are even more significant.

This week we discover why God calls us to be grateful people. We've learned that thanksgiving encourages our humility and deepens our faith. Here's another reason why gratitude is so central to spiritual health: thanksgiving glorifies God. If you truly give thanks today, someone else is more likely to give thanks tomorrow.

## 4 Daily Habits to Keep Your Faith Alive

**-Morning Offering:** By praying a morning offering you dedicate the rest of the day to God, which then prepares you to tackle anything that comes at you during the day.

**-Nightly Examination:** This is important and it helps prepare you for your next confession. It is healthy to examine your faults and failings and to ask God's help to overcome them.

**-Mental Prayer (15 minutes):** It consists of a "heart-to-heart" with God and leaving time for talking and listening. God is extremely interested in what is going on in your life.

**-Spiritual Reading (15 minutes):** One way to do this is to read the Gospel reading for today and then find a spiritual book that will help you grow in your relationship with God. **Source: Aleteia.org**

Mental prayer, which the early Carmelites promoted and perfected, certainly may include a simple thought of thanksgiving lifted to God in the heart. When we love God, we think of Him always with the consideration of His love for us. This cannot be separated from the truth about who we really are – nothing – in light of the truth about who God is – everything. St. Therese knew that a grateful heart was one full of prayer that needn't be uttered in superfluous words.

**"O God, grant that whatever good things I have, I may share generously with those who have not, and whatever good things I do not have, I may request humbly from those who do."** –**St. Thomas Aquinas**

This quote captures the spirit of Thanksgiving beautifully. It's fitting that we celebrate this American holiday right before the onset of Advent, because we remember that God shows no partiality, and neither should we. Some people are less fortunate than we are, in which case we should generously share what we have with them. But in other cases, we are the ones impoverished, so we can humbly approach those who have what we do not and thank them for their kindness.

At any given moment, life is but a snapshot of the full picture of our lives. If we desire holiness above happiness and if we make concerted efforts to grow in our interior lives, we will live in the way St. John Paul II describes here. We do not recall our past with nostalgia, sadness, or regret, but rather with gratitude for everything God allowed us to experience so that we could deepen our character.
