Fr. Wojciech's Corner...

St. Augustine said,
**"No one eats the Body of Christ
unless he first adores it."**

**Let us review the way we view the Eucharist.
May the love of the Lord for us in the Eucharist inspire us to love
and revere Him in return.**

The church teaches us that: "The Eucharist is the source and the summit of the Christian life...For in the Blessed Eucharist is contained the whole spiritual good of the Church, namely Christ himself...The Eucharist is also the culmination both of God's action, sanctifying the world in Christ and, of the worship men offer to Christ... In brief, the Eucharist is the sum and summary of our faith..."

(Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1324-5).

"Issues" with the Eucharist?

The U.S. bishops next week will vote on whether to draft a teaching document on the Eucharist. At the bishops' virtual spring meeting next week, one agenda item that has received scrutiny is consideration of Eucharistic consistency." The agenda item is a "proposal to draft a formal statement" on "the meaning of the Eucharist in the life of the Church." (so needed)

Archbishop Jose Gomez of Los Angeles, the president of the conference, explained "the focus of this proposed teaching document is on how best to help people to understand the beauty and mystery of the Eucharist as the center of their Christian lives." In its proposal, the bishops' doctrine committee explained the two-fold need for a teaching document on the Eucharist.

First, the bishops' three-year strategic plan – approved in November 2020 – has a Eucharistic title, "Created Anew by the Body and Blood of Christ, Source of Our Healing and Hope." Second, a special working group of the bishops – convened in the aftermath of Joe Biden's election to the presidency – recommended a teaching document on "Eucharistic consistency."

That term has its roots in the 2007 closing document of the Aparecida conference of Latin American and Caribbean bishops – a document which then-Cardinal Jorge Mario Bergoglio had a hand in developing. Used in the document, the term refers to the need for Catholic leaders and legislators to defend life and the family against grave evils such as abortion and euthanasia.

Making specific reference to "legislators, heads of government, and health professionals," the document states, "We must adhere to 'eucharistic coherence,' that is, be conscious that they cannot receive holy communion and at the same time act with deeds or words against the commandments, particularly when abortion, euthanasia, and other grave crimes against life and family are encouraged."

Although individual U.S. bishops have talked about the matter of Communion for pro-abortion politicians in recent months - given that President Biden is Catholic and supports taxpayer-funded abortion - the bishops' Eucharistic document would be "addressed to all Catholics."

"In light of recent surveys, it is clear that there is a lack of understanding among many Catholics about the nature and meaning of the Eucharist," the doctrine committee's proposal stated. —Catholic News Agency by Matt Hadro

Did You Know?



Saint Anthony is known as the patron saint of the poor, of sailors and fishermen, of priests and travelers, a protector and guardian of the mails, and wonder-worker.

Born in Portugal (not in Italy), Saint Anthony was baptized Fernando; he took the name Anthony when he became a friar. He was an Augustinian friar for 10 years before becoming a Franciscan. Saint Anthony has been credited with many miracles.

The reason for invoking **Saint Anthony's help in finding lost or stolen items** is traced back to an incident in his own life. As the story goes, he had a favorite book of psalms that was very valuable to him. As this was before the invention of printing, the book was hand-printed – but of even more value were his personal notes he had made in the Psalter to assist with teaching students in the Franciscan order. It was suspected that a novice leaving the community had stolen the Psalter. Anthony prayed for the return of his beloved possession. Shortly after, the novice returned the book and sought Anthony's forgiveness, which was given.

Saint Anthony is also known as the guardian of the mail as a result of another incident in his life. Although he always sought solitude and time for reflection, Anthony was so popular a preacher that he rarely got time to rest. He dutifully wrote to his superior for permission for a respite and time to travel some distance away for reflection. However, as the story goes, when the messenger arrived for the letter, it was nowhere to be found. Anthony took this as a sign that he was not to go and forgot about the trip. Shortly after, he received permission from his superior to take the trip. Another legend of 1792, tells of a heart-broken wife seeking news of her husband who had traveled from Spain to Peru. Despite writing many times there was no answer. In desperation she went to the chapel and placed a letter in the hands of the statue of Saint Anthony and prayed he would intercede on her behalf and assist with delivery of the letter. The next day when she returned to the chapel, she was disappointed that the letter was still there. Upon removing the letter, she realized her letter had been replaced by a letter from her husband. He wrote that her last letter had been delivered by a Franciscan priest, and that he was overjoyed to receive her letter as he had thought her dead since not hearing from her for so long.

CATHOLIC POSTURE

When you hear the term "Catholic calisthenics?" it refers to our posture during Mass. Sit, stand, kneel, sit, stand, kneel. So why do Catholics do all this during Mass? Is it all just arbitrary? Hardly! Here's the deal. Each different posture helps us get into a different mindset. Sitting is the posture of learning. That's why we sit during the readings and the homily. Standing is the posture of reverence and prayer. Ever notice how you stand when a judge or dignitary enters the room? How much more so, then, should we be in reverence and prayer than when the priest processes in, when we listen to the Gospel proclaimed or join in the prayer of the faithful? And kneeling is the posture of worship and humility. This is why we kneel during the Eucharistic prayer and after receiving Communion. At a typical Mass, you'll sit four times, stand seven and kneel three. Because as Catholics, we don't just worship with our hearts and minds, we put our whole bodies into it!

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

We return to using the green vestments of Ordinary Time on Sundays. Changing colors gives a sense of the progress of faith through the seasons of life. For centuries, the number of colors and the reasons underlying them were left to local custom. Over time, we settled on six colors to express the character of a day or season: white, red, green, violet, black, and rose. Black is seldom seen these days, replaced by white or violet. Rose, really a dusty pink shade, appears at most twice a year. What does the color green suggest to you? Green is new growth, olives, evergreens, glistening emeralds, ripening pears, and fields at high summer. It suggests renewal, healing, fertility, peace, and harmony. In medieval Europe, green was the favorite color for brides! Did you know that drivers of green cars are the least likely to be stopped for speeding? Is it because of their own feelings of harmony and well being, or because law enforcement officers are filled with serenity when they see a green car whiz by? Take out a paint chart today and marvel at the many hues and names of green. The Church figured it out centuries ago: color really matters.

What is a Novena??

In Acts 1:4, Jesus told His disciples in Jerusalem to “wait for the promise of the Father.” Between the time of His Ascension and Pentecost, Jesus’ Apostles spent nine days devoted to prayer. After this time of prayerful preparation, the Holy Spirit came upon them and filled them with supernatural grace, giving them the courage and faith to fulfill Christ’s divine mandate. A tradition developed to imitate the Apostles’ prayer in the Upper Room by praying for a particular intention for nine days. This devotion was called a novena. The word novena comes from the Latin word *novem* which means nine.

A novena prayed well increases our faith and helps us grow in virtue through nine consistent days of prayer. (Some “novenas” are shorter, some longer, as various novena devotions have developed over time.) The repetition of certain prayers over multiple days keeps the specific devotion fresh in our minds, helps us grow in patience and perseverance, and can open our hearts to receive any special graces Our Lord may want to give us during that time.

While there are many different types of novenas, over the centuries a few standards have come about. Many novenas also include prayers and reflections for each day, focusing on particular virtues or petitions. The most popular time to pray a novena is during the days leading up to a special feast day. These special feast days include Pentecost, Christmas, the Sacred Heart of Jesus, and Our Lady Undoer of Knots, among many others! If you have a special devotion to a saint, it’s common to pray a novena leading up to that saint’s feast day, or simply any time you have a specific intention that falls under the patronage of that saint. Some popular novenas to saints and angels include St. Thérèse of Lisieux, St. Jude, St. Rita, and St. Michael the Archangel. —getfed@Catholiccompany.com

Stronger than Steel: The Soldiers Who Wrote to St. Thérèse

While many know the Little Flower’s “Story of a Soul” and the numerous letters she wrote during her short life, very few know of the thousands of letters that have flooded her convent - especially from people undergoing extreme distress.

“Stronger than Steel,” a recent book published by Angelico Press, fills this void of knowledge. In doing so, it reminds us all that the saints are our friends and their intercession continues to bring the supernatural to our world.

The vast majority of the letters of this collection came from French soldiers fighting the First World War, mostly on their own land. France entered the war in 1914 - 17 years after Thérèse of the Child Jesus and of the Holy Face died in Lisieux. Yet Thérèse’s autobiography, “Story of a Soul,” had already begun to transform the decaying Catholic landscape of Central Europe. Tens of thousands of men from all walks of life, serving as soldiers and terrorized in the trenches, called for her intercession and received her response.

One French soldier wrote of his experience being shot at: “In my distress, I cried out with absolute faith: ‘Over here, Sister Thérèse!’ No sooner had I uttered these words than the saint suddenly appeared to me, bright and with a large halo. With her mighty hand, she abruptly stopped the enemy’s shooting, and not a single shell was released any more, until I arrived in Verdun.”

Thousands of these soldiers, carrying holy cards, medals, and prayers requesting the intercession of St. Thérèse, wrote during and after the war to the saint’s monastery, Carmel of Lisieux. Their letters expressed their gratitude and told remarkable stories of horrors, miracles, and conversions, without any pretension or embellishment or literary style.

In just 158 pages, this selection of letters - by both unknown soldiers and decorated generals - reinforces the fact that God, through the intercession of the saints, can actually accomplish true miracles. It rekindles our devotion to the “Little Flower,” to the humble young French Carmelite whom Pope St. Pius X called “the greatest saint of modern times.”

The book *Stronger than Steel* is published by Angelico Press.

CONVALIDATION

Best way to start your married life is with God. In Sacramental Marriage God’s own divine life can be experienced and lived. Were you married only civilly by a mayor or justice of the peace and would now like to be married in the Catholic Church? Call Fr. Wojciech for details.

REQUIREMENTS for GODPARENTS

Godparents play a very important role in your child’s spiritual life as role models of the faith. They should support not only the child, but the parents as well. Additionally, in their role as godparent, they represent the larger Church community and this is a tremendous responsibility. The Church has provided guidelines to help parents choose the best possible godparents for their children. In recognizing the importance of the godparent and their duties:

Godparent/Sponsor must be at least 16 years old.

Godparent/Sponsor must be in good standing with the Catholic Church. Must be a practicing Catholic (*attend Sunday Mass weekly*). Must have received the Sacraments of Baptism, Communion, and Confirmation. If married, must be married in the Catholic Church. If single, not living with significant other, nor married civilly only.

Godparent/Sponsor cannot be the candidate’s parent. Each child only requires one Godparent. If you wish to have 2 Godparents there must be one female and one male. (Canon Law 872-874)

CONFESSION/RECONCILIATION
