**■ NECESSARY FALLING APART**

Most religion is highly “legitimizing religion.” It is used for social control and public order both by the powers that be and by people who want to be in control. This limited use of religion has allowed much of Christian history to participate in a toxic and unjust environment--just as long as we have “a personal relationship with Jesus.” This will not work anymore; in fact, it never did.

The American Bishops, paraphrasing many recent Papal statements, said that “social justice is an integral part of evangelization, a constitutive dimension of preaching the Gospel, and an essential part

of the Church’s mission.” [1] Social critique is not an add-on, an option, a choice, or a unique vocation for a few. If Jesus is indeed “the Savior of the world” (John 4:42), we must not, we cannot, continue to think of salvation as merely a private matter. We are wasting our time trying to convert individuals without also challenging corporate sin and institutionalized evil. Otherwise, we send momentarily changed people back into the world; now they think they are godly, but they are the opposite of godly, and the disguise is perfect. As Jesus says, “the last state of the house is worse than the first” (Matthew 12:45).

It has taken Christians a long time to be able to see the Gospel in a fully historic, social, and political context; although this is clearly God’s concern, starting with the Book of Exodus. Truly transformed people change the world, while fundamentally unchanged people soon conform to the world (see Romans 12:2). Culture will win out every time, if it is not also critiqued. Politicians normally prefer an unaware and superficial populace.

Dorothy Day put it even more strongly: “Our problems stem from our acceptance of this filthy, rotten system.” [2] As long as we unquestioningly buy into the egoic system, where the roots of our narcissism often lie hidden, we’re going to have problems. If we think we can say our private prayers and still genuflect before the self-perpetuating, unjust systems of this world, our conversion will not go very deep or last very long. There is no one more radical than a real person of prayer, because they are not beholden to any ideology or economic system; their identity and motivation is found only in God, not in the pay-offs of “mammon.” Both church and state are threatened by true mystics. Such enlightened people can’t be bought off or manipulated, because their rewards are always elsewhere.

Most of us need to have the status quo shaken now and then, leaving us off balance and askew, feeling alienated for a while from our usual unquestioned loyalties. In this uncomfortable space, we can finally recognize the much larger kingdom of God. Many churches don’t seem to understand this, even flying the national flag

in the sanctuary. After authentic conversion, our old “country” no longer holds any ultimate position. We can’t worship it as we were once trained to do.

This pattern of temporary falling apart precedes every transition to a new level of faith, hope, and love. If one is not prepared to live in temporary chaos and to hold the necessary anxiety that chaos entails, one never moves into a Bigger World. Notice that almost every theophany (revelation of God) begins with the same warning: “Do not be afraid.” Fear is an entirely predictable response to any God encounter, because any authentic experience of the Absolute relativizes everything else. God is actually quite wild and dangerous, but we domesticated divine experience so much that a vast majority of people have left the search entirely, finding most religious people to be fearful conformists instead of adventurous seekers of Love and Mystery.

**■ THE RIGHT TO HOUSING AND  
 CATHOLIC MORAL DISCERNMENT**

As Concord Catholics, we have a very local and immediate moral choice to discern.

In our City of Concord, there are both homeless and those who are struggling to retain their housing in the face of rapidly escalating demands for much higher rent made by landlords. The residents of an apartment complex on Virginia Lane—people who often must choose between paying rent and buying food for their families—are working to seek justice for themselves. They are trying to avoid becoming homeless because of large rent increases. Their repeated requests for dialogue with landlord representatives have not been fruitful, and so they have initiated legal action.

This is not a situation on which Catholic teaching is silent.

In November of 1975, the Catholic Bishops of the United States declared this country to be in the midst of a severe housing crisis - “that millions of American families are condemned to live in poor housing or unsuitable environments unless dramatic action is taken.” Last year while Pope Francis was in Washington DC, he repeatedly emphasized the needs of the poor and our national obligation to do something in response. Immediately after addressing Congress he spent lunchtime with DC residents experiencing homelessness. The Pope said to all, “we can find no social or moral justification, no justification whatsoever, for lack of housing.” And he reminded everyone that Jesus entered the world as a homeless person.

In the 40 years separating these two observations, it is unfortunate that insufficient progress has been made towards addressing the housing plight of the poorest in this country. According to the social and moral teaching of the Church, the poor have a right to housing. And so the bishops stated unequivocally, “In the face of this cruel and discouraging condition, we...cannot remain silent.” They observed that the inherent dignity of all people and their moral right to grow and develop their potential compel a response from Catholics “whenever social and economic forces imprison or degrade people.” They described poor or no housing as one of these debilitating conditions.

It is frequently observed that these rights of the poor exist in tension with the rights of property owners. Church teaching guides us clearly on this as well. In his 1967 encyclical *Populorum Progressio*, Pope Paul VI articulated the ancient position of the Church: “The recent Council reminded us of this: ‘God intended the earth and all that it contains for the use of every human being and people...’ All other rights whatsoever, including those of property and free commerce, are to be subordinated to this principle.” This teaching is known as the “universal destination of material goods,” or the social function of property. It is a long-standing tenet of Christian thought.

It establishes clear moral priorities, ones repeated by Pope Saint John Paul II.

Solutions to housing problems are neither simple nor easily agreed upon. It is precisely because Catholic teaching provides guidance, however, that Catholics in and around Concord have created a movement for action – *Catholics United for Justice*. Ethics are crucial in guiding the economic and social choices which determine how various rights are to be balanced. Adequate solutions will be found only in ethical choices made by individuals, groups, and even governments. Catholic teaching is also clear that government has an important role to play in ensuring that material possessions are used in ways which will benefit the greatest number of people.

The challenges of the most vulnerable among us present complex moral challenges to those of us who are Catholic. Prayerful consideration of the teaching of the Church on the right to housing will help guide us to choices and actions that will benefit our neighbors, and help us to live out our calling as disciples of Jesus Christ.

### JUBILEE YEAR OF MERCY – Sunday, July 17, 2016 Sixteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time



Last Sunday's "Good Samaritan" parable concluded with Jesus' command: Go provide hands-on mercy to the next person you meet, no conditions, no limits, no exceptions. But today, Jesus seems to criticize Martha's hands-on mercy of hospitality, while praising Mary's "hands-off" as "choosing the better part" (Luke 10:42). Mary sat listening (10:39), leaving Martha "burdened with much serving by herself" (10:40). So, is the contemplative life of prayerful silence "superior," but the active life of earning a living, raising a family, running parishes, schools, hospitals, and social service ministries "second-class" discipleship? No; Jesus' example is not either/or but both/and: silent communion with God, boundless compassion for people. If we do not seek Jesus in silent prayer, how will we find Jesus in all others? If we do not serve Jesus in others, will our worship, despite its beauty, be anything but empty ritual? This Jubilee Year of Mercy offers us Jesus' two-fold challenge: both "go and do" and "sit and listen."

## ■ JESÚS MODELO DE MISERICORDIA

El mensaje bíblico de este Domingo nos trae ejemplos de hospitalidad. En algunas culturas, como en la nuestra, recibir a un forastero con cariño es un deber social. Así era en tiempos de Abrahán, en la cultura de aquella sociedad de nómadas. Algo parecido sucede en nuestra cultura latina. Llega el viajero al hogar del latino, e inmediatamente se le ofrece un café. Y mientras se habla en la sala, en la cocina se preparan los pasteles, el arroz, pupusas, o las enchiladas. Los dueños de casa tienen el orgullo de ofrecer lo mejor que tienen a aquel que lo visita, no importa cuán humilde o estrecha sea la situación. Hay placer en complacer y obsequiar a los demás.

En la segunda lectura de este Domingo, San Pablo continúa este mismo mensaje. Habla no solamente de los sacrificios que uno tiene que hacer en orden a lo material, sino que nos habla también de los sufrimientos espirituales que hemos de soportar en este mundo. Y no es que a San Pablo le guste sufrir, no es tonto. Pero al reconocer que en la vida el sufrimiento es inevitable, piensa: mejor es sufrir por amor que simplemente sufrir. Por eso consagra su vida a los demás por el amor de Cristo. Y lo puede decir que él suple en su propia carne lo que le falta a la pasión de Cristo. Con esto no nos quiere decir que el sac-

rificio de Nuestro Señor sea imperfecto, sino que también nosotros hemos de estar dispuestos a los sacrificios que nos exige el amor al prójimo.

Volviendo al tema de la hospitalidad, podemos decir que ésta se convierte en algo religioso cuando abrimos las puertas de nuestra casa por amor a Cristo. Y este es el ejemplo que Cristo quiere señalar en el Evangelio de hoy. Si nos fijamos en las dos hermanas, Marta trabaja mientras María está al lado del Señor. Nuestra primera reacción es ponernos de parte de Marta: la pobre estaba cansada con los quehaceres del hogar y con razón reclamaba la cooperación de María. Marta se afana para que todo salga bien; por hacer que el Señor se sienta "Como en su casa", ofreciéndole buena comida y buen trato. Pero María se da cuenta de que lo más importante de la visita es la presencia y la compañía de Jesús. Así descubre que junto con la hospitalidad de la casa está la hospitalidad del corazón. Y por eso, el Señor la felicita. Con ello Jesús no recomienda la pereza sino que alaba la visión clara de María y su capacidad de establecer prioridades. Ella ha sabido escoger "La mejor parte". Porque para María el comprender las palabras del Salvador era lo primero. Despues el dedicarse a la actividad cotidiana.

Este es el mensaje de Cristo; primero amar con el corazón: después con las manos. Esto que decimos de la familia, también se aplica con la comunidad.

Hay una ley superior a toda ley creada y esta ley dice: ama al prójimo como a ti mismo. Y en otra parte del Evangelio, Cristo nos dice: "...porque lo que hiciste por uno de ellos, mis hermanos, lo hiciste por mí".

Hoy estamos reunidos para la celebración de la Eucaristía. Cristo es el huésped.

Nos invita a nosotros, peregrinos, a cenar con El. El Cordero Pascual ha sido sacrificado para darnos su propia carne. Y nosotros, los forasteros, somos caminantes que ansiamos comer el alimento de vida. Cansados buscamos refugio y descanso y lo encontramos en los brazos extendidos de Cristo. Pues, si Cristo nos recibe así, si da su vida por satisfacer nuestras necesidades, a nosotros nos toca lo mismo por lo demás, por amor. Dios les ayude. Diácono Mariano Preza.
