■ **WHAT IS THE QUALITY OF
 "SHARING" IN YOUR LIFE?**

Stewardship: being a steward is today's and next weekend's theme. The word describes our fundamental relationship to everything: That we are here for others and for the world. The root English word for a steward is "Guardian of the Hall." We are not owners. **We are the protectors.**

The Stewardship word is a very positive word. **We are protectors. We are promoters** of life, promoters of sharing, promoters of helping. We realize that our life is a gift and that we are grateful for the gift. **Being grateful generates generosity.**

St. Bonaventure has promoted the spirituality of stewardship for the last 20 years. That is why we have many parishioners reaching out in many ways, within and outside of our parish community. We have helped to build a hospital in Africa, a center for street children in India, a grammar school in El Salvador. **Stewardship promotes a vision for life.** The prayers of stewardship create action, put money toward excellent purposes, enrich the lives which give and the lives which receive.

A steward has to have the intention of being a steward. A steward has to have been touched in some personal way by Jesus. A real steward breathes a fresh, spiritual, wholesome air. It is not a matter of "do I have to," but rather, "I really want to." It is more than giving time to serve, talent, know-how to do something for someone and treasure to fund a project.

You can become a steward at any age. We teach our young children to know their own personal gifts and to share them in natural and trusting ways. One can be a "big time" steward and a "small time" steward. God loves "cheerful, joyful givers." The reward is what God gifts back - the prize of a rich personal fullness. **A steward does not need things** and certainly does not clutch them as if they cannot separate themselves from them.

Actually, **the world exists because God is the First Steward.** From out of the life

and love energy that is God, everything and everyone else begins. Life and love shared is Stewardship. Our life and love shared is Stewardship. I encourage you to share your life and your love.

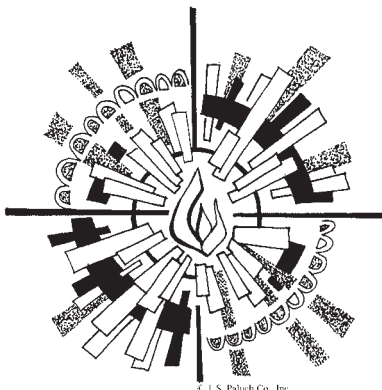

■ **ANNUAL REPORT FROM OUR ST
 BONAVENTURE SVDP CONFERENCE**

The St Bonaventure Conference of St Vincent de Paul (SVdP) is privileged to be supported by such a generous parish as ours. Ours is a rewarding ministry, and we Vincentians are repeatedly witness to the face of Christ in those we serve. Fr Mangini was recently briefed in detail on the scope of our work last year, and here are some highlights of that report:

- Conducted 269 family visits, helping a total of 780 individuals.

- Distributed \$22,833 in financial aid including rent, utilities, transportation, and food.
- Distributed an additional \$22,919 of in-kind goods and services, mostly our Friday Foods program, but also clothing, furniture, auto repair, and moving of household goods.
- Managed to present two families with donated used cars in excellent condition.

Perhaps our most important contribution to the families we serve, however, is our face-to-face compassion and caring. We go to where they are and engage them in relationship. We wish not to merely give out monies and things, but also to include them in community. We are there to help with budgeting, job search and interview skills, and obtaining social services. We don't wish to create dependency on us, but rather encourage reliance on themselves.

All that said, we must still request your continued financial support. Affordable housing is scarce, costs of goods continue to rise, and jobs are still difficult to find. We (again) thank you in advance.

When asked if she would like to say anything to the St. Bonaventure Catholic Community, Zainab stated that thanks are not enough for the gifts and help she and her family have received. She believes

FAITH FORMATION FOR ADULTS

■ I WAS A STRANGER AND YOU DID NOT WELCOME ME

President Trump has announced that he will order the construction of a Mexican border wall, the first in a series of actions to crack down on immigrants, which will include slashing the number of refugees who can resettle in the United States, and blocking Syrians and others from what are called "terror-prone nations" from entering, at least temporarily.

These measures, which mean the rejection of the stranger, the rejection of the person in need, the rejection of those who suffer, are manifestly unchristian and utterly contrary to the Gospel. Indeed, last year, Pope Francis said, "A person who thinks only about building walls, wherever they may be, and not building bridges, is not Christian. This is not the Gospel."

But maybe you don't want to listen to Pope Francis. Maybe you think that he was being too political. Or maybe you think Pope Francis is too progressive for you.

Maybe you think that you have a right to refuse a person in need. And that you have the right to protect yourself. Well, we do have the right of self-protection. But refusing the one in need because you want to protect yourself, especially when the other is in desperate need and obvious danger, is not what Christianity is about. It's about the opposite. It's about helping the stranger, even if it carries some risk. That's the Parable of the Good Samaritan in a nutshell.

But if you still don't want to listen to Pope Francis, then listen to Pope John Paul II, St. John Paul II, who wrote dozens of times about refugees and migrants. "Seek to help our brother and sister refugees in every possible way by providing a welcome... Show them an open mind and a warm heart," he said. And as if predicting our current situation, he said, "It is necessary to guard against the rise of new forms of racism or xenophobic behavior, which attempt to make these brothers and sisters of ours scapegoats for what may be difficult local situations."

For this is an issue of life or death. Migrants flee from profound poverty, which causes suffering and can lead to death. Refugees flee from persecution, terror and war, out of fear for their lives. This is, then, one of the church's life issues, so dear to St. John Paul II.

But maybe you don't want to listen to St. John Paul. Maybe you're not Catholic. Then listen to the voice of God in the Book of Exodus, speaking to the people of Israel: "You shall not oppress the resident alien [i.e. the refugee] for you were aliens yourselves once, in the land of Egypt." Every American heart should be stirred by that. Other than the Native Americans, all of us are descendants of immigrants. We were aliens ourselves once.

But maybe you don't want to listen to the Old Testament. Then, in the end, listen to Jesus. In the Gospel of Matthew, he provides a litmus test for entrance into heaven. At the Last Judgment, he will say to people, "I was a stranger and you did not welcome me." And people will say, "When were you a stranger and we did not take care of you?" And he will say,

"Truly I tell you, just as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me."

Jesus himself is speaking to you from the Gospels. It is Christ whom we turn away when we build walls. It is Christ whom we reject when we slash quotas for refugees. It is Christ whom we are killing, by letting them die in poverty and war rather than opening our doors.

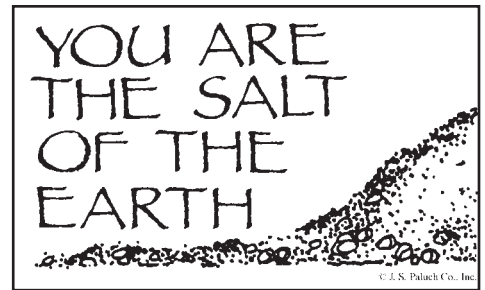
"Today," St. John Paul II said, "the illegal migrant comes before us like that 'stranger' in whom Jesus asks to be recognized. To welcome him and to show him solidarity is a duty of hospitality and fidelity to Christian identity itself."

So, reject these measures and welcome Christ. Call your local legislators and tell them to care for Christ. Write to the White House and ask them to protect Christ. Show up at town hall meetings and advocate for Christ. And pray for our brothers and sisters who are refugees and migrants.

Because if you do not, and you reject Christ, then it is their prayers that you will need.

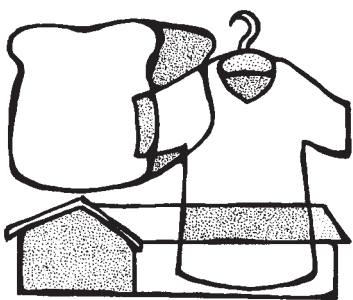

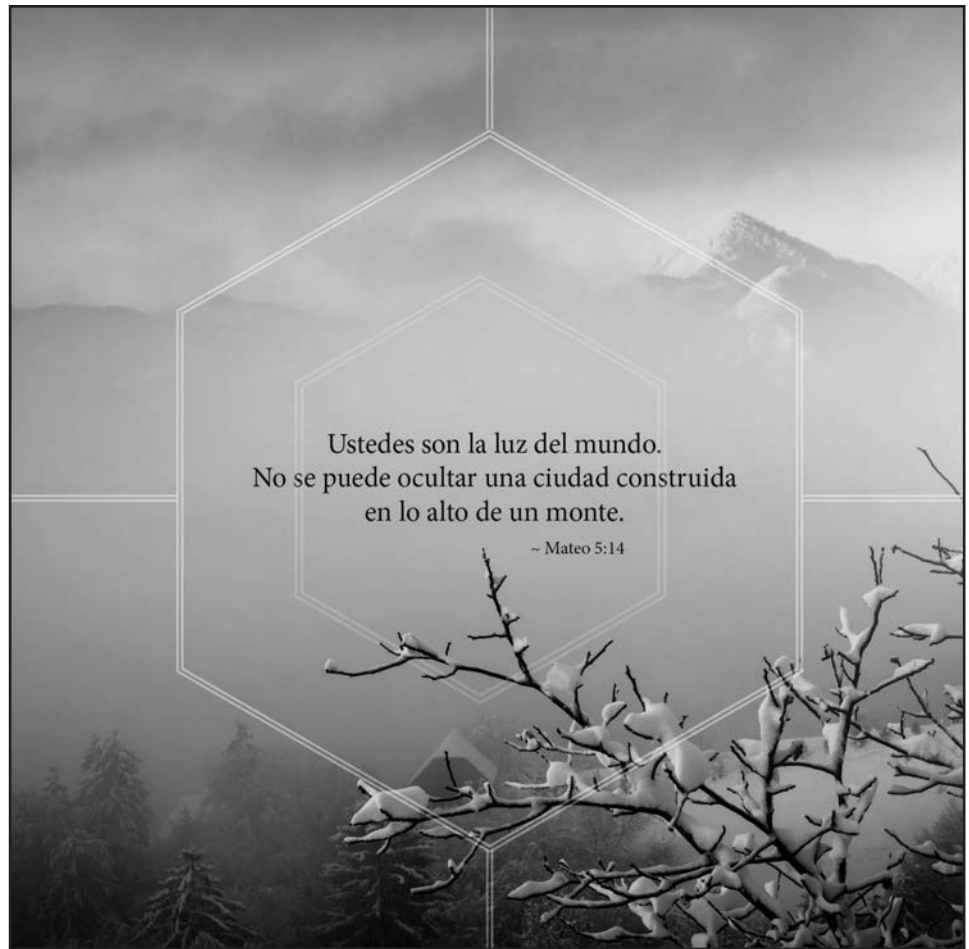
