LIFE AND JUSTICE

OCTOBER IS RESPECT LIFE MONTH: RESPECT LIFE MONTH: A CATHOLIC RESPONSE TO THE DEATH PENALTY

October 10 marked the 15th Annual World Against the Death Penalty. I didn't even know there was such a thing until I started doing research for this article. I often think that the church's stand against the death penalty is one of the most difficult for us to accept. And to place it next to the sin of abortion is equally as hard. It's much easier to fight for the life of an innocent unborn child than someone who may have committed a heinous crime.

But that is just what the church (current and past popes and the bishops) asks us to do. When I was living in Healdsburg, I was teaching RCIA at St. Johns and I ran a neophyte program. Not only new Catholics, but their sponsors and spouses were invited to participate, and we were using the US Bishops' Catechism for Adults as our text. We were studying Chapter 29 on the Fifth Commandment: Promote the Culture of Life. One of the husbands, a cradle Catholic, called me on the phone and started by saying, "I don't like you anymore." After the surprise I asked him what was up. He told me that after reading that chapter he had to rethink his stand on the death penalty and it made him really uncomfortable. I told him it was one of the hardest teachings for me to accept also. Ask my family, they will tell you I am all about being "fair". And I had a hard time moving from that "eye for an eye" understanding to where the church stood. It took a long time.

We know that all human life is a gift from God, a gift that God charges us to protect. We affirm that human dignity applies to every human being, to victims as well as those who have committed crimes against life. Our teachings hold that recourse to the death penalty may be justified only under the most narrow circumstance – if it "is the only possible way of effectively defending human lives against the unjust aggressor" (CCC, 2267). The teaching continues that if there are non-lethal ways of protecting society, they are preferable.

With the growing techniques in crime fighting and DNA, there have been a growing number of cases where inmates on Death Row are exonerated of their crimes.



"According to a 2014 study, at least 4% of those sentenced to death in the United States are innocent. The 159 people and counting who have been exonerated due to their innocence since 1973 exemplify that fact." I have to ask myself how I would feel if that one innocent person executed was someone I loved? Or if I were a victim, would I want my attacker to pay that kind of price? Questions I have not had to answer yet, thank God, but still questions that haunt me.

CONCORD RESOLUTION 17-73 PASSED By Greg Colley

On Tuesday, September 26 the City Council of Concord unanimously adopted a resolution consistent with the call of the Catholic Bishops and the Diocese of Oakland for greater support for the dignity of all persons, without regard to immigration status. The resolution affirmed the City of Concord's commitment to being a welcoming, inclusive, tolerant and supportive community for all. This includes maintaining existing city policies not to inquire about immigration status or citizenship when providing city services, and not engaging in federal immigration enforcement activities.

In a statement issued on Ash Wednesday this year, the California bishops called upon Catholics and all people of good will in California to stand in solidarity with the vulnerable and excluded in our communities, most specifically immigrants. The announcement underscored the terrible impact of widespread fear in communities of undocumented immigrants, fear which reflects the reality of tremendous suffering of immigrant families. Easing this fear and restoring a sense of hope remains a high priority for the bishops. In its resolution, the City Council directly addressed this distress and fear, and sought to reassure valued immigrant members of the Concord community.

Catholics United for Justice - a ministry based in the Catholic parishes in and around Concord

 played a very active role in the months of discussion with city officials and elected representatives, which resulted in the final resolution. CUFJ joined numerous community organizations and faith groups in the coalition, which drafted language for the resolution.

This reaffirmation of Concord values is not an end point, however, but rather a beginning. The St Bonaventure Faith in Solidarity ministry continues to organize events and dialogue which will offer further opportunities for parishioners to develop their personal responses to the California bishops' call to welcome, and accompany, and serve those who are afraid and uncertain, many of whom are fellow parishioners. As Christa Fairfield eloquently stated in the April 23 bulletin, "the first and primary element to communication is a shared respect and love for each other." This resolution of the Concord City Council reaffirms that shared respect and love for our immigrant neighbor are core Concord values, and will be reflected in city policies. As Catholics, we recognize in this resolution one particular way of responding to Jesus' call to love our neighbor."



Ellos fueron elegidos a participar del banquete. Sin embargo, ellos rechazaron la invitación del Señor. Por esta razón, el Señor envió la invitación a los Gentiles que eran los no judíos. Buenos y malos fueron invitados al banquete del Rey porque aquellos que él invito, decidieron hacer primero sus propias cosas. Esta invitación para todos refleja la generosidad, abundancia y misericordia de Dios, que alcanza para todos, perdonando nuestros pecados, aquellos con arrepentimiento sincero y que desean vivir una vida justa y feliz.

Hoy Jesús invita a todo bautizado al banquete de la Eucaristía y participar activamente de la fiesta que él nos ha preparado. Como hijos e hijas de Dios debemos perseverar constantemente para participar dignamente del banquete de la Eucaristía, banquete de amor. Sin embargo, debemos reflexionar personalmente ¿Cuál es mi prioridad el día de hoy Domingo día del Señor? El Evangelio de hoy nos presenta la parábola sobre la invitación que envió a los invitados a participar del banquete de boda. El rey dijo: "vengan a la boda'. Pero los invitados no hicieron caso. Uno se fue a su campo, otro a su negocio y los demás se les echaron encima a los criados, los insultaron y los mataron." Cada Domingo El Señor nos envía la invitación a participar de su banquete de su Cuerpo y Sangre de Cristo. El banquete está preparado y no quiere dejarnos fuera de esa fiesta divina. Sin embargo, todos son invitados pero muy pocos aceptamos esa invitación de participar en la fiesta y comer y beber del alimento para el alma. 


