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THOUGHTS FROM DEACON BILL GALL

This weekend we conclude our series on Catholic Social Teaching. Over the past few weeks our homilists have presented and encouraged us to enter into a dialogue where **people are acting both as speakers and as listeners and “there is an exchange of messages that make possible common understandings, judgements, decisions, and actions.”**

We’ve talked about *Rights and Responsibilities* in the Catholic tradition wherein every person has a fundamental right to life and a right to those things required for human decency. We’ve talked about the *Preferential Option for the Poor*, which instructs us to put the needs of the poor and vulnerable first.

This week we turn our attention to the *Life and Dignity of the Human Person*. The U.S. Bishops have reminded us that “human life is a precious gift from God. Each person who receives this gift has responsibilities toward God, self and others. Society, through its laws and social institutions, must protect and nurture human life at every stage of its existence.”

Pope St. John Paul II has said “in our present social context, marked by a dramatic struggle between the “culture of life” and the “culture of death”, there is need to develop a deep critical sense, capable of discerning true values and authentic needs.”

“Opposing abortion and euthanasia does not excuse indifference to those who suffer from poverty, violence, and injustice. Any politics of human life must work to resist the violence of war and the scandal of capital punishment. Any politics of human dignity must seriously address issues of racism, poverty, hunger, employment, education, housing and health care.” (Living the Gospel of Life, #23) To this list we can add human trafficking and immigration, especially the separation of families at border crossings.



Where do we begin? In today’s Gospel we have the powerful story of Bartimaeus, the blind beggar who appeals to Jesus along the roadside while Jesus is passing as he is leaving Jericho. Bartimaeus cries out, “Jesus, son of David, have pity on me.” Jesus responds to his request by saying, “What do you want me to do for you?” The blind man replied, “Master, I want to see.”

Might that be our request of Jesus today should he ask us that very same question? Not so much as to “see” in a physical sense but in a spiritual sense. What can we do to try and alleviate some of the suffering and restore dignity to those burdened by such afflictions?

The Bishops have called on the entire church to give more attention in four major areas:

1. **“Public Information and Education** to deepen understanding of the sanctity of human life.
2. **Pastoral Care** for women with problems related to pregnancy, for all those who are disabled, sick and dying, for their families and caregivers, to those who have lost loved ones to violent crime, and for those in prison sentenced to death.
3. **Public Policy** efforts directed to restoring legal protection to the lives of unborn children and those vulnerable to pressures to end their lives by assisted suicide.
4. **Prayer and Worship** directed to participation in the sacramental life of the church and in programs of communal and individual prayer, that the culture of death that surrounds us today will be replaced by a culture of life and love.”

May Jesus bless each and every one of you.

STAFF CHANGES IN FACILITIES AND MAINTENANCE

With sad hearts, we say good-bye to our friend Frank Palmeri. Frank retired on October 19 and as you read this, he is enjoying much deserved relaxation with his wife.

The leadership team evaluated our resources and needs and made the decision not to fill the Director of Maintenance vacancy. This decision was driven by our continued process of evaluating expenses and aligning them with our financial resources. With a smaller staff, we will be limited in our ability to support ministries in their set-up and tear-downs as we have under Frank’s direction. We ask that everyone join our volunteer maintenance team as they use the facilities, and look to set up and clean up for their own needs as they are able.

We are dividing the responsibilities into three roles:

The first role is a Maintenance Lead Person. The main responsibilities include: facility appearance, maintenance and repair. Alfredo Diaz is taking on these responsibilities. Alfredo will be the person you contact for the majority of issues or needs which you contacted Frank for.

The second role is responsible for the higher-level administrative responsibilities. This job title is Facilities Safety & Requirements Administrator. Debbie Schnick will be taking on these responsibilities. Her essential role includes ensuring security (i.e. alarms),



safety (staff safety meetings and requirements, binders and accident review). She will also be the person who orders maintenance and facilities supplies.

The third position will be a part-time position — two to three days a week. Fred Directo and Danny Sullivan will continue to be important members of this team. The additional person will be here to help with custodial work and event support. We are looking to fill this position. If you know anyone who has a flexible schedule, please encourage them to apply. The job posting is in this week's bulletin and on our website.

PENSAMIENTOS DEL DIÁCONO BILL GALL



Este fin de semana concluimos nuestra serie acerca de la **Doctrina Social Católica**. Durante las últimas semanas, nuestros homilistas nos han presentado y nos han animado a iniciar un diálogo en el que las personas actúan como oradores y como oyentes y “hay un intercambio de mensajes que posibilitan entendimientos, juicios, decisiones y acciones comunes”.

Hemos hablado acerca de los **derechos y responsabilidades** en la tradición católica, en donde cada persona tiene un derecho fundamental a la vida y un derecho a las cosas requeridas para vivir dignamente. Hemos hablado sobre la **Opción Preferencial por los Pobres** que nos instruye a poner las necesidades de los pobres y vulnerables primero.

Esta semana dirigimos nuestra atención a la **Vida y Dignidad de la Persona Humana**. Los Obispos de los Estados Unidos nos han recordado que “la vida humana es un precioso regalo de Dios. Cada persona que recibe este regalo tiene responsabilidades para con Dios, para con uno mismo y con los demás. La sociedad, a través de sus leyes e instituciones sociales, debe proteger y nutrir la vida humana en cada etapa de su existencia”.

El Papa Juan Pablo II dijo: “en nuestro contexto social actual, marcado por una lucha dramática entre la” cultura de la vida “y la” cultura de la muerte “, es necesario desarrollar un sentido crítico profundo, capaz de discernir los valores verdaderos y las auténticas necesidades”.

“Oponerse a el aborto y la eutanasia no justifica la indiferencia hacia quienes sufren pobreza, violencia e injusticia. Cualquier política de la vida humana debe trabajar para resistir la violencia de la guerra y el escándalo de la pena capital. Toda política de dignidad humana debe abordar

seriamente temas como el racismo, la pobreza, el hambre, el empleo, la educación, la vivienda y la atención médica”. (Viviendo el Evangelio n. 23). A esta lista podemos sumarle el tráfico humano y la inmigración, especialmente la separación de familias en los cruces fronterizos.

¿Por dónde empezamos? En el Evangelio de hoy, tenemos la poderosa historia de Bartimeo, el mendigo ciego que apela a Jesús a lo largo de la carretera mientras Jesús pasa a su paso cuando abandona Jericó. Bartimeo grita: “¡Jesús, hijo de David, ten piedad de mí!”. Jesús responde a su petición diciendo: “¿Qué quieres que haga por ti?” El ciego respondió: “Maestro, quiero ver”.

¿Podría ser nuestra petición a Jesús hoy, si nos hiciera esa misma pregunta? No tanto como “ver” en un sentido físico, sino en un sentido espiritual. ¿Qué podemos hacer para tratar de aliviar algunos de los sufrimientos y restaurar la dignidad de quienes sufren esas aflicciones?

Los obispos han pedido a toda la Iglesia que preste más atención en cuatro áreas principales:

1. **Información y educación** pública para comprender profundamente la santidad de la vida humana.
2. **Atención pastoral** a mujeres con problemas relacionados con el embarazo; para todos los discapacitados, enfermos y moribundos, para sus familias y cuidadores; a los que han perdido a sus seres queridos por delitos violentos; y para los condenados a muerte.
3. Reforzar las **Políticas públicas** dirigidas a restaurar la protección legal de las vidas de los niños no nacidos y aquellos vulnerables a las presiones para terminar con sus vidas con el suicidio asistido.

4. **Oración y adoración** dirigida a la participación en la vida sacramental de la Iglesia y en los programas de oración comunitaria y individual, para que la cultura de muerte que nos rodea hoy, sea reemplazada por una cultura de vida y amor.” Que Jesús los bendiga a todos y cada uno de ustedes.
