# From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

It has now been one month since the lifestyle and patterns to our daily lives changed drastically. We have been assured by our state and federal officials that we will begin a measured return to normalcy in the coming weeks and months. It was saddening to me and Alex to hear that schools in the state of Ohio would remain closed until next fall (and that too has a big question mark behind it at this point in time). It's important for the safety of our children and our families, but not seeing the smiles and having the occasional visit to the lunchroom at Miller City New Cleveland School to see the students, teachers and staff is one reality that is going to be difficult. And then there are the Friday Masses with the school children which we won't be having this spring season. It's just disappointing, but a necessity.

I have tried to look at some of the blessings, or what many call the "silver linings", COVID-19 has caused in a positive way for many of us. As a pastor of souls, I have to think that we are all praying a little more these days, and certainly in ways we never thought. While I can't see all of you in the pews of our churches for the live stream Masses I offer on your behalf, I imagine seeing all of you in the pews where you sit for Sunday Mass. I can imagine, as Deacon Doyle mentioned in his homily last weekend on Divine Mercy Sunday, the crying baby or the rambunctious toddler who might need a time-out with a walk to the bathroom or vestibule during Mass. I miss your singing and your responses to the prayers offered. I know in my heart that all of these things will return eventually, but it is the longing and the ache in the soul to have our communities back together again that is felt now. That says something about us and what we

do together when we gather for Sunday worship.

One of our members recently expressed to me in a written greeting that when he and all of our parishioners are able to receive Holy Communion again, it will be like receiving it the first time. He was referring to the longing, the excitement, the joy and anticipation we all felt in receiving our First Holy Communion. It has been too long. That in itself is a lesson for all of us not to take the Holy Eucharist for granted. We can identify most clearly with the saints of old who longed to receive Holy Communion, but were not able to do so for multiple reasons in their time and circumstance.

I have heard more than once these past weeks the lifestyle change in many of our homes in having a meal together at the dinner table with everyone present. No sporting events, practices or competitions limiting lunch or supper together as a family. No dance lessons or recitals requiring our travel to and from such activities. At least for now. But whenever a parent relays this fact to me, there is a joy felt in the tone of their voice. It's something that doesn't happen much in our culture and time. Could it be that God is calling us to a different perspective on family life? Like bonding our families more tightly? Could it be that we are being moved to spend more time together as a family? Like praying more together?

While we are all learning to be creative about many things these days, there is always a blessing from God emerging. We have some time these next weeks and months to reflect upon that very thought. My prayer for you is that your hearts will be open to what God has in store, to realize that there are a multitude of blessings awaiting us in this life and the next! Hang in.
