4. What are common themes you have found in books you have read? How does this book illustrate one or more of these themes? Give specific examples to illustrate your points.


5. Why do you think the author ended the book the way he/she did? Would a different ending work as well? Why or why not?

6. Write a short review of the book such as you might find in a newspaper or in a style that you have used in the past.


7. Explain what you gained in knowledge, beliefs, understandings, insights, or enjoyment from this book.

Events that caused change




Character at the end of the story






Character at the beginning of the story
