

BE NOT AFRAID

If you're like most [...] citizens, you have at least one daily interface with a news report. If you use a cell phone or computer, headlines about breaking events are leaping out at you by the hour. Whether you get your news from television and magazines or electronically delivered services, one common feature of news outlets is that the news is generally bad.

An extraterrestrial tuning in to human history solely by satellite dish might be appalled by the devastation routinely reported. Wars and terrorist attacks, famines and epidemics, waves of needy refugees and tragic injustices seem to rule every corner of the planet. If you feel you live in a safe enclave, think again. Are racism or prejudice, domestic violence or child abuse, material want or addiction part of the fabric of life on your street or in your housing development? Count on it.

How do we live with the weight of such knowledge? Some grow cynical about the humanity of the human race. Others succumb to depression, anxiety, or a life circumscribed by fear. We can give up, give in, or behave like the Thessalonians: party like it's the end-times and hold the effort.

Even prophets like Malachi who envision the day of the Lord as a severe hour of reckoning don't throw in the towel on history altogether. Evil is destined for a bad end, and that's by design. Goodness will last forever and badness has an expiration date tied to this world. What continues to motivate us in the face of the darkest seasons is the brilliant light of justice always on the horizon. The only way to get there is to go there. This is no time to give in to the gloom brought on by corrupt leaders and destructive decisions. Justice waits on our courage to take the journey toward its "healing rays."

Jesus doesn't promise his disciples a cheery, carefree future. Rather, he assures them—us—of the reality of natural disasters and human destruction ahead. Hate is in the world, and with it comes terrorist bombings and lone shootings and horrors we can't yet imagine. The world also contains a lot of willfulness, which means small worlds get shattered too: by divorce, deceit, unkindness, shaming, all the hard words that can't be taken back.

The reality and potency of evil in no way absolves us from our personal and mutual responsibility to work the opposite side of the street. The presence of evil, Jesus says, leads to our giving testimony: When bad things happen, we're required to raise our voices. We're called to answer the lies of our generation with truth. We confront villainy with values. We say no to fear, and yes to courage.

APPEARANCES DECEIVE

Back when she was Norma Jean Baker, not a lot of the smart money was bet on the woman who would become Marilyn Monroe. And who imagined that Bob Dylan, standing on a soda crate singing with his strange alternative voice at local music festivals, would one day be a phenomenon? Those nerdy guys tinkering in garages—Bill Gates and Paul Allen, or Steve Wozniak and Steve Jobs—who would have supposed their eccentric know-how would change the way we engage the world? And consider all the underprivileged kids thumping basketballs in empty lots right now: Which ones will be superstar athletes tomorrow?

Perhaps you and I didn't seem like much of an investment in an earlier incarnation. Yet invest in us people did: parents, teachers, coaches, pastors, friends, and mentors galore. Resources were poured into us to feed and clothe and shelter us. We were educated and medicated and set on a path. No one can foresee the woman or man that resides in the squalling baby, fretful child, or uncommunicative teenager. To be honest, I don't think it was clear in my thirties who I would wind up to be in my fifties. Still, people determined to give me love and friendship, good advice and helpful opportunities all the same.

One percent of us, according to statistics, are born into regal circumstances and are valued pound for pound before we make a single decision. The rest of us face being evaluated by appearances and report cards all along the way. That means we risk being undervalued but for the charitable nature of others. Our last names and addresses may define us to others in cruel ways. The labels on our clothes—Kmart or Christian Dior—may speak before we do. The person with dirt under the nails may be disrespected, while the manicured hand is shaken effusively.

We have to ask: What was there to see in the dirty, bloody criminal hanging between two others at Golgotha? He was being called King and Christ, but both terms were jeered in mockery. No casual onlooker or newcomer to the scene could be expected to see more than met the eye. Jesus was nothing special: infamous, pathetic, but no one worth an investment.

Yet a desperate man facing the same humiliation, dying the same death, does cast all of his hopes on Jesus. Where does such extraordinary faith come from? To see a king in a crucified man, to believe in paradise while undergoing hell itself—this is the last great miracle of an earthly life replete with miracles. On this last Sunday of the church year, we're invited to invest in the unlikeliest hope of all.



BOOK OF THE NAMES OF THE DEAD

In our parish we have a special *Book of the Names of the Dead* as a tangible sign of our solidarity with the rest of the Church in prayer for the repose of the souls of all the faithful departed. You are invited to inscribe the names of your <u>deceased</u> loved ones in this special book. The book has been placed near the sanctuary and remain there for the month of November.

Questions Catholics Ask: Why pray for the dead?

Praying for the dead is an ancient practice. The Jewish community was doing it two centuries before Christ, and inscriptions and ancient liturgies of the church testify that early Christians followed this practice.

The belief in the communion of saints is an acknowledgment that death doesn't break the bonds of our relationships to one another. The holy ones are praying for us, and we are praying for the less-than-holy-ones still working out the details of their journey to total union with God. Because God is love, anything unloving has to be left behind for that union to take place. In the "economy of salvation" the currency we use to assist our friends is prayer.

Praying for the dead means more than only saying prayers for them. It can include any good work performed for their intention. Should we do these things for bad people, even really bad ones who may have hurt us? Those folks more than any others need our help! Jesus tells us to love our enemies and to bless those who injure us. Certainly we can bless others in death as well as in life. Those who have gone before us need our prayers. And someday we will likely need theirs.
