### HERE WE GO...

We are now less than 4 weeks away from beginning to pray with the third edition of the Roman Missal. Are we ready? Some thoughts to consider....

Am I *personally* ready? The People of God deserve the very best from us. If necessary, have I worked through any negative feelings regarding this change, so I can minister most effectively? Am I studying the new texts, so I can pray them—proclaim or chant them—well?

Are our *communities* ready? Do we have the materials that we need? Have we kept everyone informed... through workshops, small faith-sharing groups, written information, and announcements when the community is gathered? Are we taking time to practice the new texts, and sing the new Mass setting, together? Are parish leaders and ministers ready to model full and active participation?

Are we not only preparing for some changes in the words we use, but are we preparing to be hospitable communities? Will the people have what they need to enter fully and actively into the liturgy? Will hospitality ministers help to make resources available?

## ***THE RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS***

### The Precatechumenate and Catechumenate

As the name implies, the *Rite* of Christian Initiation of Adults is marked by the liturgical celebration of the journey towards full initiation through the Easter Sacraments. Most RCIA teams are well aware that the transition from the Precatechumenate to the Catechumenate is celebrated through the Rite of Acceptance into the Order of Catechumens (RCIA §§ 41-74), and that the transition from Catechumen to one of the Elect is celebrated in the Rite of Election, preceded by the Rite of Sending (§§ 106-117). There are analogous celebrations for those baptized in other Christian communities who are journeying to full communion (§§ 411-458).

During the Catechumenate (see §§ 75-80 for introduction), a number of other rites are available for those not baptized that you may want to use. A number of these may be celebrated by the catechist rather than requiring an ordained minister; please see the texts in question for details.

- Celebrations of the Word of God (§§81-89)
- Minor Exorcisms (§§ 90-94)
- Blessing of Catechumens (§§ 95-97)
- Anointing of Catechumens (§§ 98-103).

In addition, the Presentation of the Creed and Lord's Prayer may be celebrated during this time if necessary (§§ 104-5).

#### Week of Prayer for Christian Unity: January 18-25

During this week, the whole Christian community throughout the world is invited to pray in communion with the prayer of Jesus “that they all may be one” (John 17:21). The theme for this year’s Week of Prayer is “We Will All Be Changed by the Victory of Our Lord Jesus Christ” (cf. 1Corinthians 15:51-58). #### Day of Penance: Monday, January 23

January 22 has been designated by the U.S. Bishops as a —particular day of penance for violations to the dignity of the human person committed through acts of abortion, and of prayer for the full restoration of the legal guarantee of the right to life. Because January 22 falls on a Sunday this year, the observance has been moved to Monday, January 23.

In the third edition of the Roman Missal, two options are given from the Masses for Various Needs and Occasions: (1) For Giving Thanks to God for the Gift of Human Life (#48/1; white vestments) or (2) For the Preservation of Peace and Justice (#30; with violet vestments).
