

REFLECTION

What to Do When a Friend is Considering Abortion by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops

More women and girls consider abortion than we may realize. Even if someone identifies as being pro-life, the shock of an unexpected pregnancy, the devastation of a difficult prenatal diagnosis, shame, pressures, or fears may influence her to consider abortion. If someone shared with you she was pregnant and hadn't ruled out having an abortion, would you know how to respond?

Listen and Learn: Listen to her story. Ask about her feelings, thoughts, values, beliefs, wants, and fears. Don't interrupt except perhaps to ask her to explain further, for example, "How did you feel when..." or "What are you most afraid of?" Confirm that you understood her correctly, "I hear you saying..."Listen for clues to her needs so you can later bring up helpful ways to address those needs. Listen for her strengths and resources so you can later reflect them back to her, building up her confidence and courage.

Open Options: When her story is fully shared, it is your turn to provide factual information, always in a loving and caring way. You might share about the reality of abortion and the wounds that typically result. You might share experiences about having a baby, adoption, marriage, and how they might apply in her situation, but keep the focus on her.

Vision and Value: Awaken in her a vision for a healthier life. Help her to value herself differently, worthy of love and joy. Made in the image of God, as a woman, her maternity is a gift. Jesus loves her and died for her. Encourage her to set and work towards goals beyond her due date, to see life beyond pregnancy. There is always hope. She is not alone. She can make positive, life-giving choices. She can do it!

Extend and Empower: Provide practical help and support. Her local pregnancy help center can offer consultation, lists of community resources, and ultrasound services. Keep such lists of resources in your car, purse, or wallet, always ready. What would help her? A call from you? How can you contact her?

Pray with her and for her and her baby. Bring Christ's love to your friend at this crucial life-saving and life-defining moment. We are created to walk with and support one another, so do not fear reaching out in love. Help your friend experience the strength of God's message that resounds throughout time: "Do not fear; I am with you" (Isaiah 41:10).

TWENTY-SEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: Isaiah 5:1-7

This passage about the failure of the Lord's vineyard is a metaphor for the ingratitude of the people of Israel and Judah. In tones of sadness and rebuke, the Lord asks, "What more was there to do for my vineyard?"

Second Reading: Philippians 4:6-9

In a moving appeal to the Philippians, Paul exhorts them to embrace all that is pure, decent, and admirable; then God's peace will be theirs.

Gospel: Matthew 21:33-43

In another rebuke to the chief priests and the elders, Jesus recounts a parable in which the owner of a vineyard leases his vineyard to tenant farmers. When the owner sends his servants and even his son to claim his rightful share of the crops, the tenants kill all of them. With some bitterness, Jesus warns the chief priests that "the Kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to people that will yield a rich harvest.


