SCRIPTURES:

August 26th—Twenty First Sunday in Ordinary Time

First Reading: JOSHUA GATHERED ALL THE TRIBES OF ISRAEL AND TOLD THEM IF IT DID NOT PLEASE THEM TO SERVE GOD, THEN THEY MUST DECIDE WHO THEY WOULD SERVE. THE PEOPLE CLAIMED THAT GOD HAD BROUGHT THEM OUT OF SLAVERY AND PROTECTED THEM ON THEIR JOURNEY. THEREFORE, THEY WOULD SERVE THE LORD, THEIR GOD, AND NO ONE ELSE. (JOSHUA 24:1-2A, 15-17, 18B)

SECOND READING: HUSBANDS AND WIVES SHOULD LOVE ONE ANOTHER AS CHRIST LOVED THE CHURCH. THEY SHOULD NOURISH AND CARE FOR EACH OTHER AS CHRIST CARED FOR THE CHURCH. THROUGH THE UNION BETWEEN THE TWO THEY BECOME ONE. (EPHESIANS 5:21-32)

GOSPEL: MANY OF JESUS' FOLLOWERS WERE STILL DISTURBED BY HIS TEACHING OF THE LIVING BREAD, WHICH THEY COULD NOT YET FULLY UNDERSTAND. JESUS EXPLAINED THAT THE SPIRIT GIVES LIFE, AND FLESH IS UNIMPORTANT. SOME OF THE DISCIPLES DECIDED TO LEAVE. JESUS ASKED IF THE TWELVE ALSO WANTED TO LEAVE. ALTHOUGH THEY DO NOT COMPLETELY UNDERSTAND YET, THEY HAVE ENOUGH FAITH IN JESUS TO STAY BECAUSE THEY BELIEVE HE IS GOD'S HOLY ONE. (John 6: 60-69)

A FRESH LOOK AT TWO PEOPLE OF FAITH

For many Catholics the Bible is not very familiar and that is a shame. We are not quite sure how to approach it. Should we begin at Genesis and work our way through Exodus and the rest of the books of the Hebrew Scriptures? Probably not. Even though Genesis tells us about the origins of our world and of human life it appeared in written form many years after Exodus.

These books came out of a believing community, a people of faith, struggling to keep the divine as part of their lives. Faith for them was faith in a person, a person named Yahweh. Faith is personal. Faith is not an intellectual assent to a series of statements or accepting a number of ideas. It is not just saying, "I believe this, I believe that." It is a dynamic reality informing decisions and choices.

Belief in Yahweh led to the development of two other virtues- Hope and Trust. Yahweh invited the leaders to put their hope and trust in him. If they did so they would not be disappointed. People of Faith like Abraham and Moses heard this call of the Lord and responded to it, and in so doing changed human history.

Abraham left his own people in the land of Ur, journeyed to a foreign land on the shores of the Mediterranean Sea and began life over again. In old age he and his wife Sarah had a son Isaac; this boy would succeed his father and be the heir to the promises of Yahweh. Yet the Lord asked Abraham to sacrifice his son Isaac to prove his faith in Yahweh. Abraham was ready to carry out this terrible deed, but Yahweh stopped him at the last second. Abraham was obedient to Yahweh and showed his willingness to sacrifice his only son; then a ram was spotted in the wood and he was sacrificed instead.

The story of Moses is quite different. Moses grew up in the royal household of the Pharaoh. As an infant he had been placed in a basket and left on the shores of the Nile and there was found by Pharaoh's daughter. She adopted him and he was raised as a prince of Egypt. He was asked by Yahweh to leave his life of privilege behind and take on the role of a Hebrew slave and lead his people, the Hebrews, out of slavery in Egypt to the Promised Land. Moses became a slave in order to free his people. That was the sacrifice Yahweh asked of him.

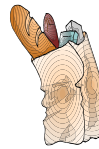
Abraham and Moses were able to accept a life of sacrifice in order to serve Yahweh. They had trust and hope in him.

In these trying times, when life is so uncertain and painful for so many, these two virtues, **Trust and Hope**, are necessary components to help us on our journey of faith. Let us ask the Lord for these two great virtues of trust and hope and then we shall be able to see more clearly His presence in our lives.
