4th SUNDAY OF EASTER --- DAILY DYING (1 Cor 15:31)

"It was done in the name of Jesus Christ the Nazorean Whom you crucified and Whom God raised from the dead." —Acts 4:10

Jesus said: "I am the Good Shepherd; the Good Shepherd lays down His life for the sheep" (Jn 10:11). "For these sheep I will give My life" (Jn 10:15). "The Father loves Me for this: that I lay down My life to take it up again. No one takes it from Me; I lay it down freely" (Jn 10:17-18). Jesus repeatedly emphasized that He freely laid down His life for us.

"The way we came to understand love was that He laid down His life for us; we too must lay down our lives for our brothers" and sisters (1 Jn 3:16). "Continually we carry about in our bodies the dying of Jesus, so that in our bodies the life of Jesus may also be revealed. While we live we are constantly being delivered to death for Jesus' sake, so that the life of Jesus may be revealed in our mortal flesh" (2 Cor 4:10-11). Paul said: "I swear to you, brothers, by the very pride you take in me, which I cherish in Christ Jesus our Lord, that I face death every day" (1 Cor 15:31). The Christian life is a life of love expressed in a daily dying to self, which culminates in a total and final dying for Jesus and His people.

As we die daily, we bear much fruit for God's kingdom, although we may know this only by faith. Jesus said: "I solemnly assure you, unless the grain of wheat falls to the earth and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat. But if it dies, it produces much fruit" (Jn 12:24). Therefore, die today and every day for love of Jesus.

Prayer: Father, let my faith in Your risen Son free me to die daily, knowing that Your resurrection power is within me.

Every year the Diocese of Amarillo conducts its annual United Catholic Appeal after Easter. The appeal funds approximately 33% of the operational costs of the various ministries and programs the diocese offers to all of our parishes. This is a vital and very important appeal for the ongoing financial stability of our diocese. This year the united catholic appeal commitment Weekend is on April 21 and 22.

Worshipping a Suffering God: The most important difference between Christianity and other world religions — even Judaism, from which our religion grows — is that we follow God as He suffered. We are the religion of the suffering God. In our churches there should be a crucifix. The sign of Christ is the Cross, a sign of terrible punishment and dereliction that has been transformed into a sign of hope. For this reason a Christian is willing to suffer and endure things in order to grow closer to God in the spiritual life. People of other religions also suffer, but they do not have the incredible example of a suffering God. They may have the idea of enduring difficulties and sufferings as a form of worship and dedication and acceptance of the divine will. Obviously, they would do painful things like fasting in order to accomplish God's will and, I assume, offer that as a prayer. There is no way for them, however, to identify with the sufferings of God. Christianity is the religion of the God who weeps, who struggles, who falls on the pavement, who cries out in agony, and who dies offering Himself to the heavenly Father. That is what makes Christianity so obviously different.

Praying Amid the Noise: Prayer is difficult. In our contemporary world we are too often unaware not only of God's thirst for us but even of our own thirst for Him. Prayer is often forgotten: God's call to us to turn to Him in prayer goes ignored or unheard. We live frantic lives that keep us rushing from one task to another. Our days are cluttered with constant and often unimportant activity. Cell phones and the Internet intrude, even when we are alone in our cars. Text messages bombard us with meaningless chatter from which we can find no escape. The whisperings of God become drowned out by the incessant noise of the world. What can we do in such a situation? How can we pray if we barely have time to think? "Be still and know that I am God" (Psalm 46:11), the psalmist tells us, reminding us that prayer demands an end to chatter, an end to distraction, a focus on what really matters. Prayer requires of us that we hear — if only for an instant — the "still small voice" (1 Kings 19:12) of God calling to us, for this voice offers to us a way to live that is different from the one the world offers — different and infinitely better.
