MOST HOLY BODY & BLOOD SUNDAY

DEAR PARISHIONERS

Please hold the priests of the Diocese in prayer as we enter into our annual retreat for prayer, reflection, and worship together. Our hope is to come back renewed in our commitment to God and His People. A Big Thank You to Connie Drake and to those who helped her to advertise, organize, set up and serve at the garage sale for White Pole Road Garage Sale Weekend. It was a free will offering and proceeds will go to the parish. This weekend we celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. We call to mind a central teaching that Christ is truly present in the Most Blessed Sacrament of the Eucharist. We believe the body and blood, together with the soul and divinity, of our Lord Jesus—the whole Christ—is truly, really, and substantially present. This teaching is rooted in Scripture, taught by the Fathers and Doctors of the Church, and reaffirmed by popes and ecumenical councils throughout

Church history. This teaching is summarized in the Catechism of the Catholic Church (nos. 1373–81).

I was reading some meditations from Sr. Kathryn Hermes, FSP (Daughters of St. Paul) concerning the Eucharistic presence of Christ. She echoes the Church's teaching that in Holy Communion we truly receive Jesus under the appearances of bread and wine. "So simply, so humbly, He makes Himself our food and our drink. He wants to be intimately united to us, to become one with us so we can become one with Him. The real presence in the Eucharist is not symbolic. It is truly Jesus Christ, crucified and risen. Just as He manifested Himself in His body after the Resurrection—so real yet so subtle—this same sacred risen body is in the Eucharistic elements of bread and wine." [*Minute Meditations for Lent by Sister Kathryn Hermes, FSP (Daughters of St. Paul)*]

Sr. Kathryn goes on to say, "what I receive from the Eucharistic Liturgy doesn't depend on how I feel or whether I have a

"good experience" at Mass. Rather, it is about what God has done, and all that God promises to do. As Catholics, our daily lives are not fully broken open until joined with others in this art of praising and thanking God in the midst of our human situation. To pray for and with and out of a suffering world, out of our own suffering, is to learn something true about praise and blessing; it is to profess most authentically that God is God." [*Minute Meditations for Lent by Sister Kathryn Hermes, FSP (Daughters of St. Paul)*]

God has not abandoned us, but will be present to us always. Because of this relationship with God, we can bring to Mass the real "stuff of life" all the good and the bad, and we trust ourselves to Him because of who He is: God. Continue to read of our beautiful teachings and pray asking God to send His Spirit to help you not only to understand this mystery, but to truly appreciate Christ in the Eucharist.

“The Availability of Prayer”

"Prayer is an open door which none can shut," wrote Charles Spurgeon in "Morning and Evening." "Devils may surround you on all sides," he continued, "but the way upward is always open, and as long as that road is unobstructed, you will not fall into the enemy's hand."

Is there anywhere we can go where God is not present? Not according to the Bible. Psalm 139:7 asks, "Where can I go from your Spirit? Where can I flee from your presence?" In Jeremiah 23:23-24 we read, "'Am I only a God nearby,' declares the LORD, 'and not a God far away? Can anyone hide in secret places so that I cannot see him?' declares the LORD. 'Do not I fill heaven and earth?' declares the LORD (NIV)."

Prayer and God's Omnipresence

The fact that God is everywhere is known as omnipresence, meaning that He is present everywhere throughout His creation. This does not mean that God is creation, a worldview known as pantheism, but that God is ever-present in His creation. C.S. Lewis likened this relationship between God and His creation to that of a painter to a painting: "A painter is not a picture, and he does not die if his picture is destroyed. You may say, 'He's put a lot of himself into it,' but you only mean that all its beauty and interest has come out of his head. His skill is not in the picture in the same way that it is in his head, or even in his hands."

Because of the reality of God's omnipresence, we are assured that no matter where we are, God will hear our prayers—even

from the belly of a fish: "From inside the fish Jonah prayed to the LORD his God" (Jonah 2:1 NIV). While not the most comfortable place to pray, we know that God heard the prayers of the prophet, even while Jonah was in the ocean depths.

But do we really believe that prayer is always available? If so, we must act on this truth. Nothing, then, can keep a believer from coming before God in prayer, except our own choices: "For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 8:38-39 NIV). Prayer will always connect us to God.

Thoughts from Jodi...

One of the things in life that I find interesting is numbers. Not in a mathematical sort of way, but in a presentation sort of way. In the Bible, certain numbers appear in specific verses for spiritually significant reasons and often multiple times.

For example, the number 40 is mentioned 146 times, symbolizing a period of trial or testing. Notably, it rained upon Noah and the ark for 40 days and 40 nights. Moses was on Mount Sinai two times for 40 days and 40 nights each. As we read earlier this year, Jonah warned Nine-

veh for forty days that it would be destructed due to its sinful ways. The number 12 is also prevalent throughout the bible. God chose twelve apostles to spread His word after Jesus' death on the cross. Twelve is considered a perfect number as it represents God's power and authority. In Exodus, Moses placed at the altar twelve pillars, one for each of the twelve tribes of Israel.

My favorite number is number three, largely due to the number of its references in the bible and also to the frequency of its occurrences in

nature. Just last weekend we celebrated the Most Holy Trinity, which is probably the most basic use of three in the bible. Three is another biblically perfect number, representing completeness. After all, three can stand alone (think tripod). This week, three is represented by the body and the blood of Christ and the covenant sealed by the blood. And this is the core of our faith. Jesus gave his body and blood for our benefit; for the promise of our eternal life. And I think that's a pretty good reason to like the number three.

IN THIS WEEK'S READINGS

Sunday Focus:

Exodus 24:3-8; Hebrews 9:11-15; Mark 14:12-16, 22-26

We cannot afford to take the gift of the Eucharist for granted.

There are many reasons people give for no longer going to church. There is one great reason to attend. It is here as a community of believers we receive the most precious and sacred of all gifts from our God this side of heaven. It is here we receive the most sacred gift of Jesus in the Eucharist.

Monday Focus:

2 Peter 1:2-7; Mark 12:1-12

God's gifts supplement our faith and are used to build His kingdom.

Today we reflect on the gifts God has given us: how those gifts can strengthen our faith, and how we might use those gifts to "bear fruit" for God.

Tuesday Focus:

2 Peter 3:12-15a, 17-18; Mark 12:13-17

Let us be courageous witnesses to God's truth and presence in our lives.

Jesus *amazes* His followers in today's Gospel because of His wise answer to a question about paying taxes. As Jesus' disciples, let us seek the wisdom of the Holy Spirit each day in order to be courageous witnesses of Christ's truth and His presence in our lives.

Wednesday Focus:

2 Timothy 1:1-3, 6-12; Mark 12:18-27

Our strength comes from God.

We are reminded today that all of our strength, all of our power, comes from God. As followers of Jesus, we are asked to use this gift of strength for the good of others—share the Gospel and to give others the sense of hope that comes from knowing that God is all good and all powerful.

Thursday Focus:

2 Timothy 2:8-15; Mark 12:28-34

We preach Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, for the salvation of every person.

We want to do our best to be good and faithful Catholics. Sometimes it seems easy, other times we may doubt our own beliefs or struggle with contrary outside influences. Since we cannot rely only on ourselves to live a vibrant Christian life,

we must allow God's grace to form us into His disciples and to preach Jesus Christ raised from the dead.

Friday Focus:

Hosea 11:1, 3-4, 8c-9; Ephesians 3:8-12, 14-19; John 19:31-37
