command: 'Master, at your command I will lower the nets'. Simon lets Jesus push him out of his own comfort zone; he takes the risk of stepping into Christ's comfort zone: 'Master, at your command, at your word, because you want it, Lord, I will do it'. That is the formula for Christian revolution, the revolution that brings meaning to life. What has God been asking us to give him? What area of our comfort zone has God been trying to expand? Our comfort zone is made of three main sectors: our relationship with God, our relationships with other people, and our own character, our own inner integrity. Usually, Jesus asks us to put out into deeper water in one sector at a time. Which is he pointing to now for us? Is it our relationship with him? May be we have had a thought in the back of your mind for a long time that we should pray more, or better. May be God has been nudging us to go to confession, and we have been ignoring him. May be he has been gently inviting us to study our faith more, to get to know him better, and we have been resisting. Is it our relationships with others? May be there is someone we need to forgive, or ask forgiveness from. May be we need to cut off or pull back a relationship that is dragging us down. May be we need to renew our commitment to someone we have been neglecting or taking for granted. Is it in our own character and interior integrity? May be we need to leave behind a hidden habit of dishonesty or self-indulgence. May be God is asking us to discipline a particular area of our life. May be we need to leave behind mediocrity and strive again for excellence in one of our responsibilities. Jesus is asking each one of us to put out into deep water, to step out of our comfort zone, not in order to torture us, but because he loves us. We may not understand, but it is OK, because we are not alone. He is in our boats, as he was with Peter, strengthening us, and he will never leave us. Let us trust him. Let us give him whatever he asks. Let his command to each of our hearts revolutionize our lives.

Father Tony's Corner



Jesus was by the Lake of Gennesaret, and saw two boats there alongside the lake. He intentionally got into the one belonging to Simon, and directed him to put out into deep water and lower the nets for a catch. Simon said to him in reply, 'Master, we have worked hard all night and have caught nothing, but at your command I will lower the nets'. Simon is the key character in this gospel narrative. He was a fisherman, and his boat means everything to him. Even though he got skunked the night before he must have been good at what he did. He was successful enough to

buy his own boat, and the boat represented security, and his livelihood. Every time Simon looked at that boat, his heart must have swelled with contentment. And then something changed. Jesus entered into his life and invited him to leave it all behind and follow him. The boat could not come with him. This was a crucial moment for Simon. He had seen the miraculous catch of fish, and experienced the presence of Jesus. He was someone unlike anyone he had ever met. He was so moved that he fells to his knees and told Jesus: 'Depart from me, for I am a sinful man'. But Jesus does not leave. He does something much more beautiful and much more challenging. He invited Simon to leave everything behind and follow him. He invited him to share his own life. And Simon said 'Yes' He and his fishing buddies leave everything behind and follow Jesus. They recognized that they were leaving their boats since they had found Jesus. So Simon Peter teaches us a great lesson today. We may lose something of our personal security, we may feel like we are losing control, but it is worth it. Because when we leave everything and follow Jesus, we find so much more. Our hearts are set free, and Christ becomes our life. For Simon, the humble fisherman from Galilee, this was the first day of the rest of his life. From this day on life became meaningful, purposeful, and fulfilling. On this day there was a revolution in his life. It is the revolution we are all thirsting for. And if we follow Simon Peter's example, we can have it. This revolution had two ingredients: First, Christ had to knock Simon out of his comfort zone. Second, Simon had to step into Christ's comfort zone. Jesus does his part masterfully. Jesus tells Simon to 'Put out into deep water and lower your nets for a catch'. Now, Peter was the expert at fishing, not Jesus. The boat belonged to him; he was the CEO of a fishing company. Simon knew that you do not catch fish in broad daylight, especially after a night without any catch at all. But Jesus just looks right at him, invites him, challenges him: he is pushing Simon Peter out of his comfort zone, into the deep water of the lake, and into the deep spiritual water of faith. That is the first ingredient in the revolution: Jesus knocks Simon out of his comfort zone. Now comes the second ingredient. Simon actually obeys. He does not obey because he understands. He does not obey because he can figure it out. No. He obeys only for one reason: because Christ is the one issuing the (continued on back page)

We know we are a sinful people. We are imperfect; we drop the ball. I know I do. I think bad things, I say bad things, I try not to do bad things. But it happens. It happens for all of us. Have you ever wondered why it's so easy to let things slip out our mouths when we know it could be hurtful or offensive to others? Why do we assume or think things about others, that may or may not be true, but that cause us to think badly of them? How often do we do something that causes a difficulty for someone else?

In our first reading, Isaiah proclaimed himself to be doomed, as a man of unclean lips, living among those with unclean lips. A seraphim touched his lips with an ember from the altar, removing Isaiah's sin.

Think about that. Wickedness removed by fire. How would we change our actions if we knew our reconciliation would be purging by a hot ember? Would we speak more kindly and less profanely? Would we be more forgiving of others? Would we feel we qualify to serve the Lord? I think I would give more concern to my language and thoughts if I knew that my lips would be burned. Perhaps we need to consider that option, even though it's not likely to happen that way, to remind us to be better people.
